

VISIT BY THE R.H.S.V.

On Wednesday March 21st our Society's Museum will be visited by a party of approximately 50 members from the Royal Historical Society of Victoria - a first for us! This tour organised by Dr Mary Chennells, a member of the RHSV Council, will cover an overnight stay at Apollo Bay where the Old cable station Museum will be one of the venues visited. On the return trip a member of the Lorne Historical Society will board the coach at Wye River to give a commentary on the coastline from there to Anglesea when our historian, Keith Cecil, will take over at O'Donohues Road - from there the party will proceed to the McMillan Bark Hut where the host will be Gavin Cook. This will be followed by afternoon tea served at the Museum where the visitors will also have the opportunity to see our display. To have our premises in tip top order for this special occasion there will be a working bee on Tuesday afternoon, March 20th if you can assist with either broom, duster or shovel, please join us about 2.30pm.

ANOTHER GROUP, associated with the University of the 3rd Age visited the Museum recently, their host Mr Salvado a member of our Society. He arranged details thru' our President Mrs Lawn who was able to join them prior to their visit for a BBQ lunch. They were all enthusiastic about what they saw, dubbing the Museum the best kept secret along the west coast.

During a Lions' executive get-together in February, the visitors' wives were given the opportunity to see our great collection of photos. It is worth mentioning too, that a group of these photos is on display at Debonair and once the extensions have been completed at the Community Health Centre, another set will be exhibited there.

SPEAKERS

Mrs L Lane, from Geelong spoke to a large audience (almost 50) at our February meeting about the Aborigines who lived in the area and their lifestyles. She was most interested in the midden at Point Addis and evidence of their activities at Roadknight - lots of questions were forthcoming which pleased Mrs Lane. She is an extremely dedicated exponent of what is obviously her "pet" subject - she was also happy to comment on a number of artifacts owned by members and hopes to visit us again some time in the future. All her notes are available for perusal by members.

Mr Ken Merry spoke to us in March for a second time, on this occasion his subject being the Institute of Sport in Canberra. Ken handed out little brochures containing information about the Institute and thus enabled members to visualise the set-up of buildings and tracks etc from the pictures. Once again there was an eager response to his call for questions", and even from members we've come to know as "non-sportspersons"!!!Ken was thanked by new member Phil Lewtas for giving such an insight into life at the Institute. We'd all heard the organisation mentioned frequently during the Commonwealth Games.

PROJECTS

At a recent working bee a start was made on cataloguing our photo collection. Placed into groups, each to have a numbered color code will facilitate the location of a selection on a special theme, e.g., The Regatta, Old Hotel etc. Shelves will be constructed to house the plastic crates, already purchased, which will also be color coded to match the particular group. We are hoping this innovation will be ready for our RHSV visitors.

More photos are to be reproduced - an an economy measure, they will be placed on the backs of existing boards - an alternative exhibition will be achieveable simply by reversing the picture boards on our racks.

Plans are being drawn up for a show case to house Alcoa fossils - we had hoped to do this with a grant from the Ministry for the Arts - however, it does not seem to be forthcoming, so we are going ahead using funds in hand. The possibility of a lighting system to "show off" our collection is also being investigated.
