



#### The National Archives (TNA), UK

TNA has now doubled the monthly limit on downloading free digital records from the website, from 50 to 100. You can download records digitised by TNA and published through the online catalogue Discovery. These include:

First and Second World War records, including medal index cards

Military records, including unit war diaries

Royal and Merchant Navy records, including Royal Marine service records

Wills from the jurisdiction of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury

Migration records, including aliens' registration cards and naturalisation case papers

20th century Cabinet Papers and Security Service files

The index shows Alice Warburton was also known as


Alice Needham-born 10 March 1826 died 10 May 1883


She was 27 years in 1854. The Pioneer Database is the Utah Mormon Pioneer Overland Travel Database, 1847, 1868

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints travelled for 3 months.



#### **Records showing her Baptism**




Thanks go from all members to Jan Morris who always excels as our Chairperson and President.



#### **Shows People found**

1-20 results of 12,961 if you know the details of the person you are searching for, you can match up very quickly. Now with new updates you can easily merge two matching people.

Follow the prompts or use the help if you have problems.

#### Step by Step help along the way



Merging matching people

Merging two records into one can be an intimidating process. However, new updates to the merging process can help you make the decision. For example, when you begin reviewing possible duplicate records, you may see a merge warning at the top of the screen.

This warning lets you know if the two records have previously been merged and will give you some of the details.

#### Time to write up your family history?

If you have decided it is time to suspend research and write up your family history stories,

I recommend the following book for inspiration: Graeme Davison, Lost Relations: Fortunes of my family in Australia's Golden Age, published 2015. We all want to write something that our audience finds interesting and engaging, and this book certainly achieves that as Davison traces his Hewett family. Davison is an academic historian,

so his work is meticulously researched, and benefits from the depth of his historical understanding. The back cover blurb says it all:

In *Lost Relations*, historian Graeme Davison follows in his family's footsteps, from the picture-postcard village of Newnham to a prison cell in Maitland, from a London slum to a miner's tent in Castlemaine. He takes us back into worlds now largely forgotten, of water-powered mills, free selectors and Methodist evangelists.

The Hewetts were not famous or distinguished, but their story reveals much about the foundation of Australia.
