Katie's family migrated to Australia 1880. Parents, William and Mary (nee Kelly) Katie was born 1885, Prahan, Vic.

Joy's father, Tasman Lewis, was born 1910, Richmond, Victoria, and was bought up by his maternal grandmother, till he was 12. He did not know anything about his family background except they came from Wales. He died in 1989 and his three brothers died shortly after.

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ave you saved your photos yet? At our May meeting Sharon Wooton spoke about safe photo storage. As most of us know magnetic photo albums (those where you pull a plastic sheet back and place your photo on to the adhesive covered page) are our photos' worst enemy. She gave some tips on getting stubborn photos out of such albums.

- Carefully slide dental floss under the photo and gently move it back and forth
- 2 Cut the page out of the album and open it out (it is just a piece of cardboard folded in half) so the photos are face down. Pull the backing away from the pictures You may need to use a sharp knife or peel the backing off layer by layer.
- If all else fails get out the blow dryer and on the lowest setting blow the front of the phiotos until the adhesive loosens.

Finding information about your convict ... If your convict was tried at the Old Bailey (Middlesex) you may well find a copy of the trial at the Mitchell Library in Sydney on microfilm. Other major libraries may also have them and others may be able to assist there.

If your convict was tried in England (other than the Old Bailey) check the Indent for the trial details. If tried at the Assizes Court then the Public Records Office (PRO) in England may have the records...if tried at the Quarter Sessions then the Country Record Office may hold those records. You may find that local newspapers of the particular area covered the crime also.

When a convict was convicted he/she may have been sent to a Hulk awaiting transportation – check the Hulk Returns 1783 – 1818 at the Archives Office in NSW For the voyage to Australia check the Surgeon Superintendents Journals 1785 – 1856 at the Archives Office NSW. On arrival of the convict – check the Assignment and distributions lists for convict ships at the Archives Office of NSW. A convict on arrival may have been sent to work on/for

- 1. Iron/Road Gang
- 2. Private individual
- 3. Government work with official or private

For Irish convicts you may find information at the Society of Genealogy in Sydney - Irish Transportation Index 1780 - 1870 .. but may also find brief information on the Irish 'gift' to Australia (web site). PeterMayberry aka 'shaking shocker' may enlarge on this subject dear to his heart and his web site is at:

## **Ordering Records:**

All records are stored either at the Laverton Repository or in our new Victorian Archives in North Melbourne. All file based records can be retrieved for your use at the Melbourne Archives Centre. For research using volumes, large format and fragile records we will make space available either at the Laverton or North Melbourne repositories where such records can be Consulted.

To order records you need to provide:

- Your name
- Your researcher number (you can register on your first visit)

And for each record item you want:

- VPRS number and Consignment number (e.g. VPRS 24/P0, VPRS 7591/P2 etc)
- Unit number (usually box number)
- File reference (note that if your research requires it we will issue whole boxes)

From the NSW Registry of Births Deaths & Marriages newsletter, May 2000, some interesting statistics on their internet site.

- from 12/3/2000 to 20/5/2000 the website has had about 2.65 million "hits"
- done about 1.34 million searches an average of 800 per hour
- most active day was 25/4/2000 (Anzac Day), with over 25000 searches performed

#### BIRTH RECORDS OF EXNUPTIAL CHILDREN

I have often been asked why a birth record has been typed rather than a photograph of the certificate being issued. While there are other reasons, one the most common is the display of the word "illegitimate". Legislation does not permit the Registry to issue a certified copy with this displayed.

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A point that was recently raised was that the by issuing a record without "illegitimate" displayed, the Registry was omitting vital information, and that genealogists could be going to great lengths looking for the parents' marriage which may not exist. The details recorded on the birth should indicate this.

When a child is born, it is required that one parent comes forward and registers the child. In the case where parents are married to one another, the parent is required to supply details of both parents and marriage details. These are then recorded on the birth certificate.

When a child is born exnuptial, that is the parents are not married to one another, to enable the father's details to be recorded the father is required to come forward and sign to say he is the father. (if no father is recorded, then no marriage details are either)

When a birth is registered with no father's details or parent marriage details, these columns on the birth record are left blank, and in early times, it was a practice of the Registrars to include the word "illegitimate". This practice ceased in 1934, and births registered since then do not contain this. The fact that the birth is registered without father's details and parent marriage details, indicate the circumstances at birth, without "illegitimate" needing to be displayed.

It is the legislation that governs both historical and non-historical registrations, and as you can imagine, many of us would feel uncomfortable producing our own birth certificate if it contained "illegitimate" displayed.
