#### AN EVENING AT THE MOE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Eighteen members and guests of Mid Gippsland Family History Society recently spent an enjoyable/informative evening at the rooms of the Moe Historical Society. Our hosts for the evening were Andy Ringin, Sheila Mangan and Bill Adams who were on hand to mingle with our members and answer questions. The collection is housed in the old Moe Court House in High Street with rooms devoted to areas such as Yallourn, Walhalla, Moe and surrounding districts.

Mr Andy Ringin entertained the group with recollections of Moe in days gone by, putting stories to photographs of the pioneering identities of the area. He also gave us instructions on how to use the 1902 washing machine which was standing in the corner and a tale about two young women who visited the rooms (they are only in their eighties) who said their father had been the local blacksmith and pointed to where, as children, they had placed their mark on the bellows which were prominently displayed in the room.

One of our hosts, who will remain nameless, commented with a twinkle in the eye, as I was leaving, "some old Judges were sitting at the front of the room with you tonight. Did you happen to feel any other company?"

### Member's Profile

#### Wes Halket -Webmaster

When and why did you get started on your family history? It was my daughter Debbie who first started me on family history, after she had a call from a distant relative enquiring about our family. This was just before my mother died, so I was able to get quite a lot of very accurate information from her, even though she was almost 90 at the time.

Names researching: Harrow, Harborough & Tester (Sussex) Morgan (Bristol)

How far back have you researched? Middle 1600s with absolute certainty, but early 1200s in a very general way.

Who were your first ancestors to arrive in Australia? William Harbrow and his wife Elizabeth Tester with their first three children arrived in 1842 on the Earl Of Durham. They were part of a group nominated by Henry Dendy, as workers for his Brighton estate, but when they arrived he denied knowledge of them and they were left to fend for themselves.

Who is your favourite ancestor? Elizabeth Tester, she had a very hard life in the early part of her time in Australia, raised twelve children and out lived seven of them as well as her husband, William


Most interesting find? For many years I searched every record I could find for my Halket g.grandparents. My father had twin sisters as well as twin aunts and I knew his grandfather was William and grandmother was Margaret Harper. It was when my daughter Debbie and I were searching the 1851 cencus for Fife that we found William Hacket, wife Margaret and the children, with twins who had the same christian names as my aunts. I think we came very close to being thrown out of the CSV Library that day.

If the family tree fairy could give you the answer to one question which would it be? My mother's grandfather, George Morgan, has frustrated me ever sincel started family history. He arrived from Bristol in 1848 and vanished about 1868 after spending three years in Castlemaine gaol for stealing a horse. Apart from those twenty years, his life is a complete mystery.

# From Eastman's Online Newsletter, 4 June Online County Galway Records

'Dan Hamilton sent an e-mail to me this week describing an online database that should be interesting to many people with Irish ancestry. Lalley.com is really designed for genealogists researching Wilmington, Delaware Irish families -- especially those with County Galway connections. However, its resources will be of value to many with Irish ancestors even if those ancestors did not stop in the Wilmington area.

Searchable databases on the site contain almost 9,000 Roman Catholic sacramental records, death records, data from the 1860, 1870, 1880 and 1900 U.S. Wilmington Census, and Wilmington City Directories, passenger lists for ships sailing from Galway to New York in the Famine years 1846 to 1851. Visitors will also find the names of every land occupier recorded in Griffith's 1855 Valuations of Tenements for eight civil parishes in the north County Galway, Ireland as well as information for the Hannon, Hart, and Lalley families including a documented Family History Report for each family.

The same Web site also contains the entire 1901 census returns for the civil parish of Cargin, County Galway. The Web site is planning to add the records of Wilmington, Delaware's Cathedral Parish of St. Peter 1849-1870.

This is an excellent example of a "grass roots" database: a local effort that results in high-quality genealogy information becoming available to millions on the Internet. Web site owner/operator Joseph M. Lalley, Jr. deserves an award for his efforts. To look for yourself, go to:

Knockback Champion Bay Western Australia Auguat Ist 1871

A transcription of a letter written to my ggg grandfather, Philip O'Shea (living somewhere in Melbourne at the time). He later lived in Little Bourke and Little Lonsdale Streets before settling in Stanley Street West Melbourne, where he died in 1903.

My dear brother

I recived your letter about two months since and was glad to hear from you and that you were all well I have not been very well for the last three months I have had a sort of a absess under my jaw keep coming and going but it dont seem to go alltogether as yet- it only stops me from work a few days but it is painful some times and disgreeable but I suppose it will be better before I am twice married

Give my love to my sister and my two little neices I shall be very proud to get your likeness so you must not dispoint me. I promise to send you mine wen I get a chance to get it taken I am three hundred miles from the nearest likeness taker so you can just fancy what a wilderness I live in. They call me Old Shea and I think I am getting old. I am not grey but nearly whiteheaded. I have a rough life of it knocking about the bush and on the road sleeping under the cart five nights out six and when I am at home I have no one like you have to look after me and cheer me up. Mary has forgot me and gave me turnips so I am a lonesome man nothing to look forward to now but Continued next page

workwork. Shearing is nearly here so I will get enough of the road about eight weeks wool carting — but never mind I may be happy yet so I will say goodbye hoping this will find you all well. Urite soon. I wrote home a short time ago to ?? to see if I can hear what is become of Mary — your affectionate brother John Shea

Poor John, I wonder what became of him.
