Our June meeting was very well attended and final arrangements were made for the Bus Trip to the G.S.V. Library in Melbourne on July 20th.

At this meeting, Mr. Patrick Morgan, a lecturer at the Gippsland Institute of Advanced Education spoke on the history of Gippsland: Its settlement, industries and early families.

He also announced that the Gippsland Institute is setting up a Centre for Gippsland studies. Their idea is to provide facilities for students and members of the public to study the History and Literature of Gippsland. Items pertaining to the area such as photos, films, directories, books of history and literature, newspapers and newsletters cemetery records, etc. will be welcome adjuncts to this centre. It will be open during normal Institute times (9.00 - 5.00 p.m. daily) and perhaps each fourth weekend when external students are there.

Also, a Public Records Office for Gippsland? At present the G.I.A.E. have been requesting the Public Records Office to set up a facility within the Institute similar to that in Ballarat so that family researchers and students can have the same opportunities without having to travel to Melbourne.

At this stage they are lobbying Federal and State Members to push this at their level. We wish them well!

HUGH MCGREGOR

Members of our Group were saddened by the recent death of Hugh McGregor. Hugh passed away on June 30th 1985 after a short illness. SOUTH AUSTRALIAN PRE 1906 BIRTHS, DEATHS AND MARRIAGES:

Pre 1906 Birth, Death and Marriage Register on Micro-fische from South Australia is now available from the Registrar of Birth, Death and Marriages, 59 King William Street, Adelaide, South Australia.

The micro-fische, in three separate sections, covers all of South Australia and Kangaroo Island and is available at the cost of \$67.50 - postage included.

The set is fully indexed by surname, with the christian name appearing in full and at times only by initials. Appearing next to the name is a book and page number. No other identification exists.

The index falls into the following years: 1842 - 62: 1863-77: 1878-86: 1887-95: 1896-1905.

Certificates are available from the above address by quoting the relevant name, book and page number and for a search fee of \$10.00

FROM THE NEWSPAPERS

Valerie Callister says :

"Changes to adoption legislation came into effect from Monday April 15th.

Adults who have been adopted in Victoria, or born in Victoria and adopted elsewhere, will be able to obtain information on their natural parents from that date.

The new Adoption Act was passed by Parliament late last year with the support of all parties.

The new arrangements allow adopted persons, aged 18 and over, to apply to the Department of Community Welfare Services, or the Agency through whom they were adopted, for access to their birth certificate or for other information about their natural parents. The legislation provides for a compulsory counselling process to ensure that adoptees are sensitive to the implications for their parents and themselves."

"Genealogists, historians and interested members of the public will soon have easy access to pre-1900 births, deaths and marriages information.

For some time genealogists have been asking the Victorian Government to have pre-1900 indexes placed on microfilm to assist those who wish to pursue family and historical research using the records of the Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages.

As part of Victoria's 150th anniversary celebrations, funds have now been allocated to the registry to undertake a modernisation program to put this information on microfilm over the next six months.

When work is completed, microfi'che of pre-1900 bixths deaths and marriages will be available to the public on the payment of the prescribed fee and this access will greatly assist people engaged in family research or seeking historical information.

INFO FEE GOES UP :

Finding out more about yourself - or what the Government knows about you - will cost more from July 1.

The Government announced the massive increases in Freedom of Information charges fore-shadowed in the May mini-Budget.

Most requests will now incur a \$20 administration charge plus a \$30 an hour fee for search and retrieval.

The cost of access for personal inspection of documents has been increased by \$1.75 to \$8 a half hour. Transcript costs have been increased by 60c to \$5.00 per page.

CLARKE FAMILY REUNION:

Ron Clarke, Anakie and Don Macreadie, Cowwarr were the organisers of a weekend - May 10,11,12 1985 - family gather:

The venue was the Uniting Church Camp at Adekate near Dean in the Ballarat district. Thirty-five members were at the camp while a further seventy visited and stayed for meals at this most successful reunion.

James Clarke was born in Co. Tyrone, Ireland in 1839, the son of Thomas Clarke and Rebecca Henderson and migrated to Victoria in 1860 after being a member of the Irish Constabulary. He met and married Elizabeth Harren who was Australian born of convict Antecedants at Learmouth in 1862.

Elizabeth's father Henry Harren was transported to Sydney in 1833 but his Ancestry can be followed back through ano ten generations to a marriage in 1535. The name has also been spelt fourteen different ways. In 1846 Henry married Sarah who already was the mother of his three daughters.

Sarah was born in Kent in 1814 and her parents Samuel Holes and Martha Thatcher were both transported to Sydney in 1816 & 1817 but Martha died on the voyage out.

Before her 13th birthday, Sarah was married to James Smith who was also a convict. There were several Smith children.

Samuel Hales died at the age of 84 in 1866 at Maitland and was buried as Samuel Thatcher.

The reunion was also attended by descendants of Ann Harren, Elizabeth's sister and also of May Harren - Henry's sister. Mary had migrated to Tasmania with her husband - Gardiner but by 1843 they were hotelkeepers in Melbourne.

A most rewarding and enjoyable time was had by everyone who attended.
