BOOK REVIEW:

SETTLERS AND SELECTORS - "TANGIL HILLS TO TANJIL SOUTH" by J.G. Rogers and Joan Hasthorpe.

"Settlers and Selectors" contains the history of the district of Tangil South, formerly the area covered by the "Tanjil Hills" pastoral run. The district namechange taking place following the placing of the school in the area in 1887.

Tanjil Hills/Tanjil South is a rural area north of Moe in Gippsland and was used firstly as a cattle run until such time as it was broken up for selection commencing about 1877/78.

The book "Settlers and Selectors" was written to coincide with the centenary of the Tanjil South School and to commemorate the work of the early pioneers in the region. The book was recently released in March 1987 and at this time a school and district centenary was held.

Part one of the book contains genealogical and biographical histories of the early pioneering families of Tanjil South while part two deals with the social features of the districts development - the school and church, sporting clubs, military records of individuals, floods, fire and other miscellaneous events.

In addition to their pioneering and agricultural abilities, the original selectors number among their descendants a remarkable group of people who have achieved a high degree of recognition in entomology, the armed forces, politics, the church, education, sport, music and the arts.

Settlers and Selectors - "Tangil Hills to Tanjil South" is a very readable book of 345 pages. Fully indexed and has included a district selection map. Numerous photos are also included and the book is available in both case and limp bound editions.

- * About 30,000 rolls of film are photographed per month and only one released per month from Salt Lake City explains the need for patience.
- * Family Register where people throughout the world can notify names being researched. It is more up to date than the I.G.I. Commenced with 6 microfische now up to 91. Genealogical Department, 50 East North Temple St., Salt Lake City.

BEGINNER'S CORNER

- * Allocate a specific area (preferably large!!) for storing your family history findings and material. It may be a drawer, a cupboard, a box or the like.
- * Buy a large notebook or exercise book to carry with you on research jaunts. Scraps of paper are easily lost.
- * Decide on a system of recording and filing your findings something which can readily expand such as filing cards, loose leaf binders, purchased family history sheets, etc. and transfer information from your notebook to the appropriate sheet as soon as practicable.
- * A small tape recorder is excellent for recording oral information. Take it with you when you talk to great aunt, grandpa's brother or the old local identity who knows everybody's background. Ask their permission to record your conversation.

A MATTER OF RECORD FOR IRISH:

Irish Australians should be able to trace the leg-irons in their family tree when the Prime Minister, Mr. Hawke hands over a gift he received in Dublin. The gift is a computer holding the records of 40,000 convicts transported to Australia.
