## TRIP TO P.R.O. LAVERTON:

On the way we talked about research and read the Public Records Holding Book. I, like others on the day, had never ventured to the Laverton P.R.O. and I found it a very large modern complex. The staff were very helpful and showed us how to find a variety of records.

All of us took advantage of the many records including Shipping arrivals, Court Records, Inquests, Wills, Land Titles, Postal Directories, Victorian Directories and an endless supply of other records.

Copying anything was not a problem as costs are reasonable.

After what seemed too short a time, it was time to leave at 4 p.m. We boarded the bus and headed for home. Ian's reward for organising the trip would have to be the excited chatter about successes and failures and hopes of returning one day to Laverton.

Some interesting facts about P.R.O. :

They contain 38.5 km of shelving holding 200 million documents and handle 100,000 enquiries annually. These figures are for 1987 and I'm sure they are increasing all the time.

It was in 1912 that the Royal Historical Society of Victoria called for the establishment of a Central Records Office under the supervision of an expert Archivist.

Another entry from the Cornwall Members Interest Directory :


A South Australian had been wondering where 'Senteth' is. He will find it has been changed to "St. Heath" for that Saint's name is pronounced to rhyme with "death".
