CHAIRMAN'S CHATTER :

Although attendances at our August and September meetings were disappointing due to the onset of winter ills and trips to Expo., the members who were there managed to enjoy themselves. In August, we swapped information on our English County Historical Society connections (See members County interests Page 3). In September Ian McGown entertained us with an interesting talk on "The degree of Certainty" in relation to genealogical research.

SEMINAR REPORT :

Our Seminar held on 8th October was a great success with regard to the quality of speakers but was disappointing in the small number in attendance.

Our speakers were :

MR. ALAN BOX: Military Records for Genealogists

Alan is a member of the Military Historical Society in Australia and also Great Britain. He is a lecturer in Education at G.I.A.E. Churchill. His talk concentrated on the literary sources available on military services involving Australians. He was most entertaining and explained the various books with relevant personal comments on individual people portrayed in the volumes. he concentrated on Soldiers from Gippsland, he generated considerable interest from the audience.

MRS. MARGARET BURNS: Holdings of the Public Records Office

Margaret works in the Archives section of the P.R.O. and looks after reference services. Her talk dealt with the vast amount of records available, the methods and size of the storage area, the procedures involved in retrieving the information and other services supplied by the P.R.O. Interspersed with the talk were some case histories demonstrating how various records can be used to document a person's progress through life and provide some thought provoking moments for the researcher.

If the amount of interest in the publications of the P.R.O. holdings is any guide, I feel they may be inundated with visitors during the next few weeks.

MR. JACK MILLER: Background and Aims of the International Settlers Group.

Jack is a committee member of the International Settlers and is also a council member of the G.S.V. where he acts as the Country Groups Liaison Officer. Jack's talk which focussed on settlers from outside the British Isles, was most enlightening. The problems facing people researching in Europe make the torments of English researchers pale into insignificance. Still, just as the research is so much harder, the rewards, when they come, are to be enjoyed so much more. The International Settlers Group are more than willing to assist any genealogist contemplating European research.

MRS. FRANCES BROWN: An Ordered Approach to Storing and Retrieving Information.

Frances is the genealogy and local history librarian at the state library in Victoria. She spoke on methods of researching in libraries and how to store the information once you have it home. Two books "Family and Local History Sources in Victoria" and "Family and Local History - An Ordered Approach Toward Publication" of which Frances is the co-author of both, were displayed and discussed. They were seen as "must haves" for genealogists, particularly for beginners.

All speakers made reference to the fact that a number of names, joined by lines, is only the skeleton of a family history - when you have enlarged the characters by use of available records and put "flesh on the bones" Genealogy has its impact.

We felt it an enjoyable day, in a very practical venue, not to be missed next year.

With much difficulty it was saved from the flames and not until it was much scorched.
