Educational Records

..... there is a detailed school register which gives the names of children and parents, ages, dates of admission, periods of absence and even reasons for absence. My favourite entry is for ten year old George, son of George Podmore of Dunham Massey, who in 1788 'informed me that his mother had leave for him to absent from school 3 weeks to take care of the family while his mother assisted Mr Carter to make hay. But they took 10 days more'.

THE VAGUE FAMILY REUNION by Ian McGown

The Vague family reunion was held at Ballarat and Creswick over the weekend of the 10th and 11th November 1987. The family had lived and worked there during the major part of the gold rush years.

Like so many other Cornish mining families the Vagues migrated first to South Australia. They were attracted to the copper mines where the huge deposits of malachite were said to be literally sticking out of the ground. In the early 1850's rumour spread of the discovery of gold in Victoria. Cornishmen joined the world wide rush to seek the 'glittering prizes'. The realization of that dream was achieved only by the lucky few. The immigrants universally came to a place of hard work and in this pioneering environment enjoyed only few of the amenities of life.

It was appropriate then, that the programme for the reunion provide for an explanation of the life and times of the early settlers in addition to an outline of the family's ancestry.

On Saturday morning members of the family assembled and registered at Craigs Royal Hotel in Ballarat (partly owned by a Vague). The afternoon was devoted to a conducted tour of the early shallow diggings, the deep leads and the the eventual sluicing operations.

The tour embraced a visit to the nomes and home sites of members of the the family as well as to the cemetery. It was resolved that a suitable memorial should be erected on the now unmarked grave of our great great grandparents. It is hoped to achieve this on the anniversary of this reunion.

The ceremonial dinner was held in the opulent dining room of Craigs where Prince Albert had also once enjoyed the Victorian splendour. This was the occasion to renew old acquaintances and compare foggy memories and ancient photo albums.

The memorial church service on Sunday was conducted entirely by members of the family and proved yet again that the Wesleyans of Cornish stock had lost none of their singing ability albeit quantity and gusto occasionally disguising a lack of quality.


The luncheon menu centred around the ubiquitious Cornish pastie. The aftermoon was a period of great conviviality with old friends and a time to inspect the displays of photos and memorabilia.

Our host welcomed members of the family who visited from as far away as New Zealand and Western Australia. These greetings were returned in messages from absent friends from around the world.

Cutting of the ceremonial cake marked the official opening. Appropriately it was decorated with Celtic symbols and the Coat of Arms of the Duke of Cornwall. The book on the Vague Family History was launched during the ceremony and provided the purchasers with a permanent reminder of the family's background.

The traditional photographs of oldest and youngest and the whole group made welcome additions to many a family album.

The occasion was judged a huge success and was particularly savoured by many of the elderly who realized that perhaps they might never meet as broad a gathering of their relatives again.
