## Upcoming events:



**Family History:** Surf Coast Family History Group is also resuming its program of activities in February. Our first speaker for the year is Pam Jennings whose talks are always of keen interest to members. Pam's topic this time is "inquest records," on which she is a local expert. <u>Note</u> the date is the third Thursday in February.



**Items from the Inverlochy:** We are fortunate to have in our collection several items from the Inverlochy. The most significant of these are: the log book, which has been scanned so that the contents can be viewed as digital files and we do not have to handle the delicate object itself; and the lifebuoy, which used to hang on the side of the change shed by the river, but which now resides at History House. We also have the salvage sled (photo left), which was abandoned after the salvage operation was completed in 1903. Left on the beach, it became covered in sand until a storm in 1976. Local resident Brian Smith hauled it up from the beach and kept it until 2018 when he donated it to the our Historical Society. Other items in our collection include glass and pottery shards recovered from the wreck, a petrified wooden pulley sheave, and a timber railing. On long-term loan we have the "commemorative bell" on display. The original ships bell which hung outside the hotel for many years is no longer in the area. The three masts from the ship were initially installed as flagpoles at different locations around Anglesea including the hotel, and the Mawson's property.



Answers to the Quiz: Q.1  $18^{th}$  December 1902. Q.2 Captain E.R. Kendrick Q.3 The cargo was valued at  $\pounds 40,000$  however what was left after the shipwreck sold for just  $\pounds 160$ . Q.4 One priority for the salvagers was the recovery of 10 miles of cable weighing a total of 50 tons in the Inverlochy's hold, destined for the Melbourne Tramway Company. Q.5 The Marine Board Enquiry charged Captain Kendrick with careless navigation and his certificate was suspended for twelve months and he was ordered to pay costs of  $\pounds 120$ .

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
