<u>THE STORY OF "JAMES KING"</u> (great-great grandfather of Nielma Wood)

-Sincere thanks to the late Leslie Miles, John & Barry Hanson, Shirley Muir and Pam Watterson from whose extensive records this short history was extracted.

James King was born in Oxfordshire England in 1795—the sixth child - Alfred James. And Sarah King.

In 1816 he was tried for stealing wheat but was acquitted.

He married Ann Woddington in 1820 and they had one child-Alfred James.

On 4th August 1821 he was again tried for stealing a lamb and was sentenced to death but this was later remitted to transportation for life.

He arrived in Hobart on 23rd July 1822 aboard the "Prince of Orange".

Being a "Stonemason" by trade he was put to work on various public buildings in

And around Hobart and lived in lodgings in the "prisoner barracks" at Hobart.

It appears that James did not take to prison life at all well and became a victim of the "demon drink" and was absent from his lodgings at regular intervals.

Following is a listing of his various "misdemeanours".

About 1832 James arrived at Bothwell in central Tasmania (apparently as part of a work gang) where he met a woman by the name of **Mary White** who was one of 200 women who emigrated to Van Diemen's Land on the ship "Royal Princess" the first ship to bring "free" women to the colony.

This appears to have been a major turning point in the life of James King as his conduct seems to have improved significantly from this point on.

James received his "Ticket of Leave" in 1835 and his "Conditional Pardon" in 1838 when he was described as a man of <u>"correct and sober habits".</u>

Although James was refused permission to marry Mary they remained together in Bothwell producing nine children.

In 1852 James, Mary and family sailed to Melbourne on the steamer "City of Melbourne" And in 1869 moved to Wedderburn in central Victoria where it appears James saw out his days as a bricklayer where he died in 1875 at the age 76, and was described in a local paper as being **"well known and respected in the Inglewood and Wedderburn district"**.

Many descendants of James and Mary King remain in the Wedderburn area, more than 36 of whom are permanent residents in the Wedderburn Cemetery. Others found there way to Williamstown where Nielma was born and remained until moving to Fairhaven in 1996.

Glimpses of the Past

HISTORICAL MARKER ON THE GREAT OCEAN ROAD

Although the Great Ocean Road between Torquay and Lorne was officially opened during 1922, it was not until 1939 that today's well known timber and stone crosspiece came into being. It weighed over 50 tons, had a clearance of 25ft to traffic and an overall width of 50ft. It had been felt by many that since the Memorial Archway over the road at the site of the toll-gate at Springs had been demolished, there was need for a replacement and so, after much deliberation, the one pictured was built.

This was erected to the memory of the former Chairman, the late Major McCormack of The County Roads Board.

General Sir Harry Chauvel officially opened the structure in November 1939.

This was later considered by the CRB to be too low and narrow, and was replaced with a wider span in 1974.

The Ash Wednesday fire destroyed this in 1983.

A new Memorial Archway was rebuilt at the same site
