August's Activity Report

On a cold day, the usual group of Friends met at Anakie depot, and were pleased to welcome three new Friends, Kim, Kath and Helen. After a cuppa and short meeting, we welcomed Jim Rookes, a plant pathologist from Deakin University. Jim studies cinnamon fungus, and gave us a very interesting talk, discussing the habits and effects of cinnamon fungus (we already knew some of this), and control methods, which at this stage are mostly time-consuming and short term. He also told us about methods for analysing soil for the presence of the fungus (which isn't really a fungus), and ideas for future control methods. He had many slides to show us, including one of a certain bearded ranger making use of the Anakie Scrubber. Two small volunteers, assisted with showing the slides.

After lunch, we all rugged up, and drove to Galatea Mine Track, which is part of the park that many of us had never visited. It was raining, but suggestions that we should shelter in our cars were ignored, and we went for a short walk along a ridge top. The area has many large grass trees. Unfortunately, small patches have died due to cinnamon fungus, and many others show early signs of infection. The rain stopped, and we could see into the valley below us, and start finding other things of interest. Many orchid leaves were found, and there was much speculation as to the sort of flowers they would produce. It could be an interesting spot to revisit in Spring. Even in winter, there are things to find. These included lichens with bright red spore-producing bodies, orange jelly bell fungi on dead wood, and three television aerials nailed to trees, one in use by a nearby house. As we returned to the cars, in the sun, we realised how easy it is to walk past things when everyone has their raincoat hoods on. There were large groups of dwarf (and not-so-dwarf) greenhoods growing right beside the track! After thanking Jim and spraying our boots, we all departed for warmer places.

Reporting illegal activities on Parks Victoria land - call Bush Telegraph

This service enables Victorians to report suspicious activity through a single, easy to remember number, 132874 or 13BUSH on your keypad.

This is a simple, one-stop-shop facility for Victorians to use when they witness behaviour that could damage our environment or is anti-social. Callers can remain anonymous if they wish.

Everybody witnesses incidents from time to time, such as driving in inappropriate areas or removing plants from National Parks, that, although not criminal, they would like to report to someone, but not necessarily the police. This service allows Victorians to register their concern, which is then noted and forwarded on to the appropriate authority.

Victoria will provide the reporting facility through its 7 day a week Information Centre.
