29th June Malvern Scout Group 1908-2008 Sunday 29th June 2pm

Graham Russell, who received his 1st Malvern Certificate of Registration in 1942, will speak about the history of 1st Malvern and his memories of his time in the **1st Malvern Scout Troop**.

"The cradle of Scouting in Victoria was the **Tooronga Rd. State School, Caulfield** (**East Malvern**); where in late 1907 one of the pupils, **Roy McIndoe**, received from a friend in England, who had been a member of the experimental camp at Brownsea Island, some pamphlets which had been issued by the Chief. These he showed to his mates who immediately got red shirts, their father's old felt hats, formed 'patrols' and 'whooped round the place like Red Indians'. Later in 1908 when they received the first copies of Scouting for Boys, they settled down to genuine Scouting" (Victorian Scout Heritage Centre)


Annual General Meeting April 2008

A retired book seller recently approached the Stonnington Local History Service with a small collection of ephemera relating to Stonnington. This small illustration from Melbourne Punch may be of Robert Sellar, the first occupier of Northbrook. Despite further research we have been unable to make the final definite link between the illustration and Robert Sellar, occupier of **Northbrook.** We have discovered through a search of the Sands and McDougell Directories, that there appears to have only been one Robert Sellar living in Melbourne before 1900. He had lived in St Kilda, at Pine Hill, Malvern (close to the present site of **Cabrini Hospital**) and in Malvern Road before being listed as occupying a house in High Street Malvern. From a search of the Malvern Rate Books we know that merchant, Robert Sellar occupied Northbrook 1889-1890 before moving to Alma Road Caulfield. Northbrook had been built in 1888-89 for auctioneer Donald Munro, the son of James Munro, Premier of Victoria. Donald

We regret to record the death of Mr. Robert Sellar, who died at Malvern, on Wednesday last. The deceased was well-known in mercantile circles in Melbourne, having arrived in the colony in 1853, where he opened a branch business for Messrs. Dennistown, Wood, and Co. In 1861 he entered into partnership with Mr. M'Culloch. Mr. Sellar was actively connected with other businesses. He was a director of the Australian Mortgage and Agency Co., a member of the colonial board of directors of the Trust and Agency Co. of Australia, and chairman of the directors of Sands, M'Dougall and Co. Mr. Sellar was also adviser to the Scottish Provident Insurance Co. The deceased gentleman's health entirely failed about four months since, and his death is sincerely regretted by a a large number of friends.

Malvern, Caulfield and Armadale Recorder 7th September 1900

was a partner with **W L Baillieu** in a successful auctioneering business until he was financially ruined by the economic crash of the 1890s. He never lived in *Northbrook*. After discussions with the **Stonnington Local History Service**, the Society has purchased the illustration and it now forms part of the **Stonnington Local History Collection**.

Former Prahran City Fire Station

The former **Prahran City Fire Station** now owned by the **City of Stonnington**, in **Macquarie Street Prahran**, the only known station in Melbourne still surviving from the pre1891 era, has been added to the **Victorian Heritage Register**.

Staid, Starchy and Sanctimonious

Myoora was a grand white stone mansion with two storeys, 11 rooms and a tower, set in spacious 7 acre grounds at the corner of **Toorak** and **Irving Roads**, **Toorak**. It was built in 1876 for **Robert Harper**, a pillar of church and society. **Harper** was born in **Glasgow** in 1842 and migrated to Melbourne with his parents in 1856. He found work with a firm of roasting and grinding millers and after seven years he became a partner in the firm. When the partnership was dissolved in 1865, he established **Robert Harper & Co**, importing tea, coffee and spices. The business expanded into oatmeal and flour and established a factory to process and package its goods. Later a rice dressing mill was established at Port Melbourne. His brothers, William and John, joined the business, which continued to diversify and spread into the other colonies.

In 1868 he married **Jane Cairns**, the youngest daughter of Rev. Dr. Adam Cairns, the minister of **Chalmers' Church** in **East Melbourne**. She was said to have a keen sense of humour and a rather un-Presbyterian love of dancing. They had seven children including three sons, **Robert, William** and **Kennith**, who eventually joined the firm.

Robert and **Jane Harper** were respected for their philanthropy. They supported the **Toorak Presbyterian Church**, the Central Mission, the City Newsboys' Home, the Children's Convalescent Home at Sandringham and the Cairns Memorial Church and every year a substantial cheque was sent to Hospital Sunday. In addition, the grounds of Myoora were frequently lent for charitable functions.

Mrs. Harper was President of the Woman's Work Association, an organization set up to sell anonymously the produce of needy gentlewomen - embroidery, sewing, cakes and jams. She was President of the Spinners' League, which met in different houses to make clothes for the 'deserving poor' and President of the Ministering Children's League, which ran the Cottage-by-the-Sea at Queenscliff, a convalescent home for sick children. She also initiated a move to collect money to help found kindergartens in poor areas.

A founder and an elder of the **Toorak Presbyterian Church**, **Robert Harper** was a devout Presbyterian with strong religious views. His religiosity also influenced his business practices.

A worker seeking employment was interrogated about his church attendance and whether his children went to Sunday School. The job interview included a little sermon and ended in a prayer.

He stood for parliament as a conservative against **Alfred Deakin** and was elected in 1879. Deakin described him as 'a man of keen intelligence, well-informed on political questions, of strong character, great persistency, marked resoluteness and untiring energy.'

In Parliament, he opposed secular State Schools and the opening of the National Gallery on Sundays. In the 1880s he opposed **Dr. Charles Strong**, the liberal theological teacher and social reformer who advocated reform of the Westminster Confession and condemned social evils. Harper even joined a group of men who bought the **Daily Telegraph** and the **Weekly Times** in 1883 as vehicles for their views.

But there was another side to **Robert Harper**. While a Member of Parliament, in contravention of quarantine laws, he imported some half-breed sheep from England for his property in Gippsland. He had them quietly unloaded at his sugar wharf in Port Melbourne, but his misdemeanour was discovered almost immediately. He was fined and his sheep were confiscated and killed. Robert then had the temerity to demand compensation.

Worse still, down at the **Harper Starch Factory** at **Port Melbourne**, married men were working 54 hours a week for a mere 30 shillings (about \$180 in today's currency) – barely enough to feed and house their families so that most had to rely on the support of relatives to provide clothing. Men on nightshift who worked 63

His men worked in appalling conditions. Rice manufacture involved the use of caustic soda solution, which slopped about the floors, and would rot a man's boots within four weeks. The workers had to supply their own boots from their meagre wages. Much of the work was extremely heavy, requiring the movement of packages weighing up to 2 cwt (100 kg). One job involved stacking blocks of starch weighing up to 7lb, sometimes having to toss them up as much as 20 feet. Another required the men to move materials from a crouching or kneeling position. Every day at one stage of the manufacture they were inhaling dust for $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours. At other times they were exposed to sudden changes in temperature as they moved from the extreme heat of the stoves to the cold.

hours a week were paid time-and-a-quarter overtime for the extra 9 hours.

Then on payday came the ultimate insult. Every Saturday their pay packets could be sure to contain some pennies. As the men filed out the narrow wicket gate, the gatekeeper thrust the 'Hospital Box' at them, and it was a brave or foolish man who declined to put some coppers in the box. This collection was the source of the generous cheque Harper contributed to Hospital Sunday.

About 1915 *Myoora* was demolished and the land was subdivided giving birth to *Myoora Road*. The family dispersed, **Robert** senior to **Domain Road**, **South Yarra** where he died in 1919. **Robert Henry Harper**, the eldest son, lived at *Mayfield* in *Malvern* from about 1900 to 1912 before moving to South Yarra. **Kennith** retired to a property near *Murchison*.

Taking Local History to the Community.

We received excellent publicity in a recent issue of the **Royal Historical Society of Victoria's** newsletter, **History News**. An article, under the heading **Puzzling Local History!** detailed our projects aimed at increasing children's awareness of local history. A large enthusiastic crowd joined us for our walk in the **Union Street Armadale** area in April. In May **President Lorraine Sage** attended a seminar convened by the **Registrar of Geographic Names**, **John Tulloch. Lorraine, Jane Nigro, Roxanne Dennis, and Ronald Richards** attended both the ceremony to mark the **90th Anniversary of Villers Bretonneux** and the celebrations to mark the **150th Anniversary of Holy Trinity Oakleigh (East Malvern)**. **Roxanne** and **Jane** represented the Society at a recent meeting of the **South Metro history group**. Other groups represented at the meeting included the Historical Societies from Port Melbourne, St Kilda, Glen Eira and Brighton. The most recent meeting of the **Stonnington History Committee**, attended by **Lorraine** and **Roxanne**, included a tour of **Northbrook**. Work continues on all our projects with our jigsaw project continuing to attract interest from other historical societies. The Society has donated a copy of each of our jigsaw puzzles to the **Stonnington Toy Library**. **Stonnington Books** in Glenferrie Road are displaying our books on their main counter and they are attracting great interest and sales!
