Memories of Malvern East in the 1960's

Sue Hedley recently decided to spend a long plane flight writing down memories from her childhood in Malvern East!

Sue remembers living at 42 Abbotsford Avenue. Her home phone number was 56-5241 but other digits were added in later years. She remembers visiting her cousin Julie at 3 Ivanhoe Grove where they had chooks and clearly remembers eating the chook pellets and seeds!

The milkman delivering milk in 1 pint bottles with silver foil lids in the early morning. He had a horse drawn cart and the family had a special place near the letter box where the milk was placed. They had a bread box on the verandah, a briquette heater, a washing machine with a ringer and the children were always being told to 'watch your fingers'. White clothes were soaked with Blue Bags to make them whiter. Sue remembers sitting at the kitchen table in the middle of the kitchen, making minced meat from the left over lamb roast by pushing it into mincer, and again having to watch her fingers! Home-made ice cream was made in silver trays in the

freezer and the mix master was used every night to make the mashed potato creamy smooth. Sue regarded roast chicken for Sunday lunch as very exotic and they would often have lunch sitting at a card table in front of the T.V. Loy's soft drinks were a feature of visits to her grandparents' home. Her Dad was allowed to smoke his Craven A cigarettes inside and Lines, the dog, was allowed to wander off the lead. Dogs took themselves on their own walks in those days. The night cart man would come and empty the drop box toilet in the back yard. There was only one toilet so the household would have to wait for ages for her Dad to come out!

A strong childhood memory was Guy Fawkes night where there was a bonfire at the creek and lots of fireworks. Sue especially remember the "penny bangers". There was a creek at the end of Rebecca Road around Ivanhoe Grove and all the children were warned to stay away from the bodgees and widgees who hung around the creek.

At the end of Abbotsford Ave in Quentin Rd were the "little shops" as her family called them as opposed to Chaddy Shopping Centre. There was Corsgrill's lolly shop at the one end of the shops and Sue remembers her mother buying her sister and her a milkshake to share – either blue heaven or spearmint and getting into trouble making loud noises at the end sucking the last bit out. There were little silver trays full of lollies (her passion!) and Sue remembers even after all this time the numbers per penny! 3 raspberries: 1 penny, 2 bananas: 1 penny, 4 mint leaves: 1 penny, 4 freckles: 1 penny, 8 bullets: 1 penny, 4 aniseed balls: 1 penny, gobstoppers and small liquorice blocks. Mintz the Grocer, was another favourite shop. Sue remembers sitting on the counter and being given a broken biscuit. Biscuits were chosen from tins and weighed in a paper bag; teddy bears, malted milks and chocolate ripple and the favourite, tic tocs with coloured icing on one side and a clock face on the other side. There was a Chinese restaurant nearby and the family would take their own containers when they collected the food.

School memories include standing in line for vaccinations with the strong smell of methylated spirits, sitting in a row on a long swing at school and singing "In a cottage in a wood". At school there were crates of small milk bottles delivered for morning play time and you had to pierce the lid to put a straw in it. There was a large layer of cream on top and often it was warm so not very palatable. Every Friday Sue and her cousin were allowed to buy lunch at the fish and chips shop near the corner of Chadstone Road and Waverley Road. They would take approx. 1 shilling for a piece of flake and 2 pennies for a potato cake and take it back to the school for lunch.

The Chadstone Shopping Centre was within walking distance. Sue and her sister loved going to the Chaddy shops on a Saturday morning. Her sister would always get Princess magazines and PK chewing gum and a vanilla slice and Sue would get Teddy Bear magazine, juicy fruit and a cream donut. Both enjoyed the Dairy Queen ice cream from Coles and the Downyflake donuts, especially watching donuts coming out of the machine and being cooked.

Prahran Horse Racing

Racing commenced in Prahran in the early 1850s. The first course was on land adjacent to the Mt Erica Hotel, on the corner of High St and Williams Rd.

In 1865 the races became more professional with the formation of the Prahran Racing Club. The club sought permission from the Prahran Council to use the 'Council reserve' for its course, which was ageed to by the Council, although it declined to make a donation to the club's funds, saying it would be a misappropriation of Council funds. The club's first meeting took place on the Council reserve on 29 and 30 December, 1865. The program comprised a Maiden Plate, Publican's Purse, the Prahran Handicap, the Stewards' Purse, a Handicap Trotting Purse, and a Handicap Hurdle.

A similar two day meeting was held in January 1867. Commenting on the first day's racing, the Argus correspondent struck a generally positive note: "The Christmas and New Year holiday fever yet progresses with an intensity scarcely intelligible to the sober-going citizens of older and less favoured lands than ours. There seems yet to be no symptoms of surfeit of pleasure with our colonists. There could not have been less than three thousand determined holiday-making folks on the somewhat rough and unplanned course at Prahran, and they were very sufficiently gratified with a pleasant afternoon's racing for the promised prizes. The handicapping was not of the best in the two races in which the stewards adjusted the weights, but there was some very good sport afforded, and there were no loud complaints of the measures taken by the compilers of the handicaps'. At the conclusion of the second day, the correspondent added: 'The energetic stewards who have taken an active share in the management of turf affairs in this locality must have been very well satisfied with the amount of public patronage realise".

The Prahran Racing Club's use of the Council reserve appears to have come to an end with that meeting, as there is no further reference to it in the press or the Turf Register. The club was probably denied use of the site which was soon to be transformed into the Fawkner Park which exists today.

The Prahran Racing Club, however, continued in existence, and there are frequent press references in the 1880s and 1890s to it holding meetings at Sherwood Park in Camberwell.



Stonnington Research Enquiries

During the past few months the Society and the Stonnington History Centre have received enquiries relating to an old oak tree in Darling Road Malvern East, Scotsburn Grove in Toorak, Regent Street Prahran, Herbert Cutts and the Rose Stereograph Company, historic buildings now used as retail space, George Self Smith, cricket on the Malvern Cricket Ground around 1940, a boarding house in Wattletree Road Malvern opposite the Sacred Heart Hospital (now Cabrini) and Flying Officer Norman Frederick Robinson 401284 who, according to RAAF archive records, recorded his address as 17 Hopetoun Road Toorak.

There have also been enquiries relating to St Leonard's Private Hospital in Turner Street, Malvern East (the hospital was in Turner Street from about 1917 until the early 1940's), Mr Rudd, an early gardener at *Stonington* in Glenferrie Road Malvern, the 'spud' factory in Moira Street, Malvern East, the origin of the name Darling and the plane that crash-landed close to the Malvern Cricket Ground in 1937.

These were just some of the requests handled so expertly by the Stonnington History Centre Staff, David Tuck, Ellen Porter and Simone Sharpe.

The Debutante Ball

Debutante balls originated in Europe, and were traditionally a formal 'rite of passage' for elite women of marriageable age to be introduced within their society. In Australia, municipal councils, churches, schools and other organisations included debutante balls in their social calendars, and it is a practice that still continues in some quarters to this day.

Malvern and Prahran Councils used to hold debutante balls as part of their annual Mayoral Balls, and professional photographs of these events were often published in Council Annual Reports. Most show the debutantes with the Mayoress – and occasionally the Mayor – at either Malvern or Prahran Town Hall. Sometimes the debutantes' names, and even those

of their partners, were also published. Invitees included local residents and businessmen, mayors of other councils, and Members of Parliament. Parents or guardians, or the young ladies themselves, wrote to the Council to request an invitation.

It was traditional for the debutante to invite a young man to partner her. Always very formal, the ball may also have included flower girls and page boys. The debutantes' gowns were often identical in cut or colour, with slight variations. Gloves were almost always worn.

Participants attended dance classes, often over many months, so as to perform a dance set during the main ball. The Leggetts, who ran a popular dance school in Greville Street in Prahran from 1910 to 1970, taught hundreds if not thousands of debutantes and their partners free of charge over the years. The Leggetts also arranged the programme and dance cards for the Prahran Mayoral Balls. These cards, with silk strings and pencil attached, were given to all who entered the hall.

Tales From The Courts

Edited reports of proceedings in the Prahran and Malvern courts as published in contemporary issues of the Prahran Telegraph.

Smoking a public benefit?

The Board of Lands and Works proceeded against Thomas A. Bradshaw for smoking on the platform at the Prahran Railway Station. Dr Fetherston (on the Bench) remarked that he himself smoked on the platform but had not been interfered with. The Bench complimented the stationmaster upon the manner in which he carried out the instructions of the railway but Mr Dixon (on the Bench) remarked that he thought it was rather a public benefit than otherwise to smoke at the station as there was some prospect of the small-pox breaking out. Some time ago local artist Oscar Carlson visited the Stonnington History Centre to view maps showing the back lanes around the Malvern area in which he lived. He was planning an exhibition of drawings depicting these laneways. Oscar is better known for his 'ironman' achievements; however his intricate drawings provide a glimpse of the quieter side of the athlete.

The exhibition, 'The Laneways of Malvern', was held at the Malvern Artists Society in High Street in August. Oscar visited the History Centre after the exhibition to donate one of the framed limited edition prints and scanned copies of the complete works. The Centre staff were so impressed with this generous donation and the quality of the artwork that they decided to purchase two more framed prints to add to the collection. These will be displayed for public viewing in

due course and low resolution copies of all of his works will be placed on the History catalogue.

Oscar's script accompanying the exhibition notes that the laneways in the drawings are bounded by Glenferrie, Dandenong, Tooronga and Wattletree Roads. This was the 'Malvern Station & Caulfield Township Estate', a relatively flat area within the Stonnington Precinct historically used as a stock route and holding yards. The area has underground creeks and springs and is considered a flood plain.

Oscar states that during the 1950s and beyond, the laneways' use changed once underground sewage was installed. No longer needed as access to the 'outdoor dunnies' the lanes remained largely unused. However, by the late 1990s as families acquired more than one vehicle but with limited garage space, the laneways began to be utilised to house garages and cars. Gradually the old dilapidated fences are being replaced by roller doors and gates. The laneways have also become more recreational, with people walking their dogs through or just enjoying a stroll down 'history lane'.

According to Oscar the drawings depict the laneways in their 'cusp' and while change seems to take place slowly, Oscar sees changes occurring around the area and felt the need to record the 'wonderful laneways as they were and as they are becoming'.


Johnson & Davies, Motor Tyre Repairers

Johnson & Davies, Motor Tyre Repairers, were at 160 Glenferrie Road, Malvern (re-numbered from 158 in 1920) from 1918-1930. The man third from the left is Thomas William Johnson (known as William Johnson), who had been secretary of the Rubber Workers Union until 1919. For a short time he lived at *Ivyleigh*, Waverley Road, East Malvern. From 1924 he had a tyre business in Elwood. Johnson may have run both this and the Elwood business at the same time, but it is equally possible that he left to go to Elwood and Victor Davies continued the business under its established name.

The signage on the front of the store advertises 'Steam Vulcanising Done', 'Rebuilding', 'Retreading', and 'Broken Beads a Specialty'. It was painted by Lewis & Skinner.
