The Commins and Lionnet Families

The Commins and Lionnet family connection with Australia dates from when Theophile Lionnet came from Mauritius to Bendigo during the gold rush era in the mid 19th century. Theophile married Jane Bone, from Cornwall, after which they returned to Mauritius. Some of Theophile's grandchildren migrated to Australia after World War II and his descendants are now living throughout Australia. Family researcher Pierre Commins believes his family were the first Franco Mauritians to arrive in Australia after the Second World War. Their story is represented in the book *Mauritian Heritage: an anthology of the Lionnet, Commins and related families* by Edward Duyker.

Pierre Commins lived in Malvern from 1949 until the 1990s. His grandmother, Mrs Cecile Lionnet, purchased three houses in Armadale, Glen Iris and Malvern in the 1950s and 1960s to facilitate the migration of her children and grandchildren to Melbourne. The first property, purchased in 1950, was 15 Inverness Avenue, Armadale, the second in 1951 was 9

Viva Street, Glen Iris and the third purchased in 1962 for her daughters Emily, Cecile and Louise Lionnet, was in Wheatland Road, Malvern.

Pierre's cousins Richard and Serge Lionnet lived in Claremont Avenue, Malvern and his sister, Maryse Duyker, lived at 18 Horace Street, Malvern. The Commins family lived at 5 Childers Road, Malvern from the mid 1950s until the mid 1990s. Pierre's mother was Madelaine Commins (nee Lionnet). Madelaine was killed crossing Wattletree Road while on her way to St Joseph's Church in Malvern. Due to this tragedy the Commins family organised a petition to establish the pedestrian crossing opposite Cabrini Hospital.

Warwick Girls' School

An article in the July 1919 issue of the journal "The Graphic of Australia", includes photos with the title 'The children of Warwick preparatory school, Malvern, one of the foremost institutions of the kind in

Melbourne. Warwick is under the direction of Miss Turner, who is exceedingly popular with the scholars.'

Warwick was established in 1895 in Manning Road by Miss K. Gregory, who was the principal until 1907. In 1908 the new principal, Adelaide Mary Turner, who had helped establish Warwick, moved the school to a larger premises, previously called *Walla Walla*, on the corner of Finch and Kerferd Streets, East Malvern.

Miss Turner pioneered the concept of 'open-air' classrooms and the school included boarders and day pupils. According to the prospectus, the school had a laboratory and library, with extensive sports grounds. It was divided into four Houses named School, Davington (after the English birthplace of Miss Turner's father), Gregory and Professor. With over 200 pupils the classes went from Kindergarten to Leaving Honours, with the younger grades including boys.

Miss Turner's younger sister, Ivy Victoria, supervised the boarding school and according

to memoirs of previous students, she was regarded as the mother of the school. Family sources state that Adelaide and Ivy's mother, Ellen Turner, also lived at

Warwick school for a time. The R.A.A.F. commandeered Warwick for use in 1942, which caused the closure of the school and the retirement of Miss Turner. The building was demolished in later years.

Drewe family, Prahran and Malvern

James Drewe was born at Bradford, in Wiltshire, England. He arrived in Melbourne in March 1854 with his wife, Sarah Ann Gauntlett, and son William Henry Drewe, who was approximately one year old. James and Sarah went on to have another five children, three sons and two daughters, most of whom were born in the Prahran/Windsor district. James Drewe worked as a journeyman before setting up his own business as a house decorator in Windsor c1856. He is listed as a paperhanger on the west side of Chapel Street, Windsor, between Peel and Union Streets, in the 1862 postal directory. He remained there until the mid-1870s. Sometime in the mid-1870s William Henry Drewe joined his father in the business, and they went into partnership as James Drewe & Son. Together they ran the Federal Paperhanging Warehouse. The address was originally known as 11 Dandenong Road in Windsor, and it was between Chapel Street and the railway bridge. It was renumbered 161 Dandenong Road c1890, by which time James and Sarah also had a property at 157 Dandenong Road.

In 1881 William married Jane Paterson. They had two children, Elsie Edith Drewe (b. 1882) and William James Drewe (b. 1884). William James Drewe later joined his father in the family business, which was listed at 161 Dandenong Road Windsor c1906. In 1911 William James Drewe married Daisy Mae Wells, and they had two sons, Royce Burrell Drewe (b. 1914) and Colin Geoffrey Drewe (b. 1916), and a daughter Claire (b. 1925) who passed away later the same year. The family lived in Alma Road, Caulfield in a house they named Llandaff. By now the family business, still operating as J. Drewe & Son at 161 Dandenong Road, was described as being 'decorators and importers'.

As well as working in the family business, William James Drewe also became an architect, and was very active around Malvern. It appears that he and his father went into land development, buying land and building houses to W. J. Drewe's designs, which were then offered for sale from W. H. Drewe. The Stonnington History Centre has a number of plans of houses where the owner of the land is listed as W. H. Drewe, of 60 Kooyong Road, with W. J. Drewe listed as the architect.

William and Daisy moved from Caulfield to Malvern, first to Wattletree Road then Thanet Street. From c1925-c1976 they lived at 42 Stanhope Street in an eight-room brick house of William's own design. The Thanet Street and Stanhope Street houses were also named Llandaff. As well as the houses mentioned above he apparently designed some bluestone churches around Melbourne, including in Malvern, Toorak and South Yarra, although these have yet to be identified. In 1938 the Drewes were invited to a Mayoral Ball held by the then Mayor of Malvern, Cr King, and Acting Mayoress Miss King, but were unable to attend.

Their eldest son, Royce, married Dorothy Watson in 1940, and they moved to the bayside suburbs of Bentleigh then Brighton East. They had three children, the eldest of whom was Robert Duncan Drewe (b. 1943). The family moved to Perth in 1949. Robert Drewe went on to become a well-known journalist and author, and mentions his family's connection to Malvern in his first memoir, The Shark Net: Memories and Murder.



Stonnington Research Enquiries


During the last few months we have received enquiries relating to Agnes Aiken who lived at one time in Darling Road, East Malvern, 1 and 3 Cawkwell Street Malvern, *The Olives*, in Wattletree Road, Malvern East, photos of the Honour Board from the Hawksburn State School Infant School building that now hangs at the Prahran RSL, *Kooralbyn*, a property in Orrong Road Toorak, properties in Stonnington Place Toorak and in Olive Street East Malvern and Denis Hines, an early Glenferrie Road barber. Students have been researching the history of St Mary's

We were asked if we had any information on William Henry (Bill) Bruce (1856-1923). Bill lived in Johnstone Street, Malvern and then later at 8 Kerferd Street, East Malvern. He was married to Annie Hewitt Logan. Bill and his brother John Joseph (Jack) Bruce, worked as road contractors for Malvern Council at one time.

We were asked to discover the fate of the mosaic that was on the wall of the Chadstone Library and the plaques from the buildings that were demolished in Bowen Street, Malvern East and from the newly redeveloped pavilions at HT King and Sr Zelman Cowan Park.

Denis Hines

Denis Hines moved into a shop on the east side of Glenferrie Road, Malvern c1896. Originally it had no street number, but it was numbered 133 in the early 1900s. It was described as a brick shop and dwelling, of five rooms. However, Glenferrie Road was significantly renumbered shortly afterwards (changing not just the direction of the numbers but also odds became even and vice versa), so that by the First World War his address was listed as 58 Glenferrie Road. He remained there until the early 1930s. Around 1933 he moved to 78 Glenferrie Road, which had six shops, where he remained until c1937. He was variously described as a tobacconist or as a hairdresser. A Trove search revealed one of his advertisements in the Malvern, Caulfield and Armadale Recorder in 1900.

The Olives, 253 Wattletree Road, East Malvern

In 1863 and 1864 John Favel Green purchased 22 acres of land at the corner of Wattletree and Tooronga Roads. By 1865 a two roomed weatherboard house was built facing Wattletree Road. The property changed hands several times before being purchased in 1881 by merchant Reuben Horatio White. White Street was created in a subdivision of part of the land in 1888. White named the enlarged weatherboard house *The Olives*. The house was demolished around 1938. The garden included a wistaria, mandarin, walnut tree, fig trees and a persimmon tree.
