Guest speaker: Miles Lewis The Melbourne Mansion

Miles Lewis AM FAHA is an architectural historian with a special interest in the cultural history of buildings and his online Melbourne Mansions database is a valuable resource for researchers.

We understand the larger houses of nineteenth century Melbourne mostly in terms of the grand rooms of a few preserved examples, most of them in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs. Some are indeed very interesting, but what do we know of the servants' hall, the privy, the bells and speaking tubes, the stables and the tennis court? What do we know about where these houses came from, what they imitated, or how they were financed? This illustrated talk will survey the evolution of the Melbourne mansion in that broader context.

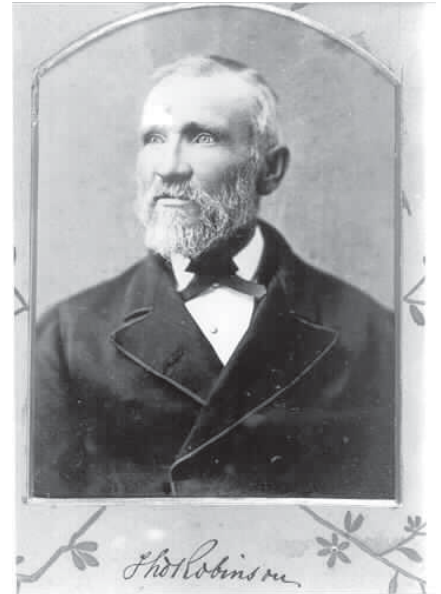

Thomas Robinson

‘Thomas Robinson and his wife Emily came to Gardiner from Shropshire, a West Midland County, on the Welsh border, a county of cattle, sheep, and orchards. Robinson, who was a short stocky man of the British bucolic type, arrived in the colony in 1852. He settled in Glen Iris as a market gardener. For twenty-five years he tilled the soil of Glen Iris valley, before he retired to live in Elizabeth Street, on a property that had an area of four acres. On a portion of this land he grew a few vegetables, but he leased the greater part of his property to tenants more able than he was to cultivate the rich hillside soil. He became a member of the Malvern Shire Council. On August 26, 1874, Robinson applied to the Gardiner Shire Council for its consent to launch a movement for the annexation, of a portion of the Shire of Boroondara, to the Shire of Gardiner. He assured the Council that the request was made, at the almost unanimous wish of the Boroondara residents, living in the portion of land on the north side of Gardiner’s Creek proposed to be annexed. A special meeting of the Gardiner Shire Council was held to consider the question. The Council approved of the proposal on certain conditions which were not acceptable to the Boroondara ratepayers, and nothing came of Robinson’s suggestion. Robinson was “stuck up” by bush-rangers at Glen Iris in October, 1852. The sunny slopes of Malvern Hill on the east side suggested to Robinson vineyards. He planted some vines, and subsequently made some wine, but he did not continue the vineyard.’

The European hare

The Malvern Historical Society was approached by Philip Stott, from the School of Animal and Veterinary Sciences, University of Adelaide. Philip is the only scientist (and vet) in Australia who has undertaken research work on the ecology of the European hare in Australia. Hares were introduced into Australia early in the period of European settlement. Philip wanted to find out if William Philpott, who lived in Malvern in the 1850s and 1860s, was the same William Philpott who imported two hares on the ship *Result* on 8th January 1860.

William Philpott (1818-1891) arrived in Melbourne in 1844. By 1845 he was playing cricket for the newly established Melbourne Cricket Club. In 1856, William Philpott, now a Commission agent, and his wife Rosetta Wilhelmina Rucker, purchased a 20-acre allotment at the south east corner of Glenferrie Road and Toorak Road Malvern.

Philpott’s land became the site of their home *Rosehill*. The family occupied *Rosehill* until 1874.

Rosehill was later demolished with the exception of a small bluestone chapel.

Philip’s research found that William Philpott was acting as Melbourne pastoralist William Lyall’s agent when, in 1860, he imported hares on the *Result*. At the time Lyall owned *Yallock*, a farm between Tooradin and Koo Wee Rup on the shores of Westernport Bay in Victoria.

Edwin and Emma Robinson

Peggy, a NSW resident, found her mother's old photos when she was researching her family history. For years she was puzzled by them, especially the one showing her great grandparents, Edwin and Emma Robinson, until a cousin mentioned that there was a link to Woodmason's Dairy in Malvern in Victoria.

Edwin, the second youngest of Thomas and Emily Robinson's sons, was born in 1846 in Middlesex England, and died in 1930 at his home at 137 Malvern Road, Malvern. He married Emma Wiber on 25 December 1876. Emma was born at sea near the Cape of Good Hope in 1858, on board the *Parsee*. Edwin and Emma had 8 children. Entries in the Malvern Rate Books from 1882 include: Edwin Robinson carpenter, owner house & land, Lot Sec 24. Net Value £15, Edwin Robinson owner house land & shop Net Value £20, and Thomas Robinson gentleman owner/occupier house & land £18. Other details listed note that Edwin owned and occupied wood houses of varying sizes from four to seven rooms. It appears that Lot 24 was part of the subdivision of the Woodmason Estate Malvern. The 1889 Rates Books list: No 241, Edwin Robinson (carpenter) owner and occupant W.H.; No 243, Edwin Robinson owner, W.H. with occupant Henry Kleine, labourer; No 244, Edwin Robinson owner house and shop with occupant Attwell Edwards, dairyman. Edwin's father, Thomas Robinson, is listed next door, gentleman owner/occup, house & land. Research by the Stonnington History Centre found that the street numbering on Malvern Road has changed at least 3 times. The 1924 Post Office Directory lists E Robinson (builder) at 137 Malvern Road, Malvern. This is between Acre Place and Elizabeth Street, east of the Malvern Hotel. It seems that Edwin's house was on the site now occupied by the Mecwacare Malvern Centre (1245 Malvern Road).

The Malvern Hill Hotel was located on the corner of Glenferrie and Malvern Street, Malvern. The Woodmason's Dairy was opposite. Edwin was the publican of the Malvern Hotel in the 1880s. In 1885 Geoff Woodmason is listed as the owner of the hotel and Edwin the publican.

One of the photos Peggy sent through shows Edwin and Emma Robinson visiting a farm. Unfortunately there was not enough detail to accurately confirm whether the photo was taken on one of the Woodmason properties. It may have been, for the Woodmason's Melrose Dairy was located close by. The Woodmasons had a Jersey cow stud and the cows in the photo are definitely Jerseys. The Woodmasons were a large and prominent family in the district.

William Clapperton's 90th birthday

According to an article in *Table Talk*, September 1902, William Clapperton had two celebrations for his birthday; the first on 12 August at the home of his son, Mr A. Clapperton, at Northcote. A second celebration was held at *Myamyn*, in Glenferrie Road, opposite the Malvern Shire (Town) Hall. The extract from *Table Talk*, follows:

'Mr. William Clapperton's Birthday was also celebrated on August 16, at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. James Ballantyne, *Myamyn*, Glenferrie Road, Malvern, for the convenience of those who were unable to be present on August 12. There was a very large gathering of the family and friends. The day was beautifully fine, which contributed to make the gathering a source of pleasure to all. The old gentleman sat down in warm sunshine, to have a crack with his auld friends. The younger members of the family enjoyed themselves with games on the lawn or strolled through the beautiful grounds. To commemorate his birthday, a photographer was engaged to take the family group, the great-grandfather and his youngest great-grandchild, James Ballantyne Wilson, with his mother, being the central figures. In the evening, after tea came the time for song, music, recitation and speech. The old gentleman, who is musical, was asked to favour the company with a song. He sang the auld Scotch song, "Tak yer Auld Cloak about Ye." His son-in-law, Mr. James Ballantyne, gave a very amusing recitation, "The difference between a hymn and an anthem." His grand-daughter, Mrs. E. Davis (Miss Marie Stuart), Mrs. J. H. Taylor, Miss Annie Notman, Mrs. W. J. and E. Ballantyne, also favoured the company with songs. Miss Rita Hume, Councillor J. Notman, Mr. Douglas Hart, and Mr. J. H. Taylor, Town Clerk of Brighton, gave recitations. After supper the company dispersed, feeling that they had spent a very enjoyable evening.'

18-20 Leopold Street Glen Iris

Residents in Leopold Street Glen Iris were intrigued when excavation work on a neighbouring property uncovered many old pharmaceutical bottles. They wondered if the property had once been owned by a chemist. The Stonnington History Centre researched the history of the site and found that it had been the site of the Malvern Pound from WWI. The pound appears to have been for large animals, such as horses and cattle, rather than (or as well as) domestic animals such as dogs. There is a letter in the Stonnington History Collection from a Leopold Street resident who wrote to the Malvern Council asking if she could graze her own horses on the pound's land, for a fee. Her request was refused.

Local residents Theo and Satira were very excited when they saw the photo of Form 2F 1961 Malvern Central School on display at Pets in the Park. There was a young Theo in the front row! They identified some of the names of the pupils and the teacher, Mr Cook. Theo remembers that Mr Cook was very nice and very supportive of his group of students. Theo and Satira lived at the time in High Street Prahran and both attended Windsor State School before Malvern Central.

Alan Gregory was President of the Stonnington Branch of the Liberal Party when the idea of a sculpture of Harold Holt was mooted. It was found that a full sculpture and cast bronze bust was beyond the means of the group. A few thousand dollars was raised, but the additional money had to be found elsewhere. Harold Holt's widow, Zara (who became Dame Zara Holt the year following her husband's disappearance, then Dame Zara Bate when she remarried) gave the bust to Malvern Council when the Harold Holt Swimming Centre was opened in 1969.



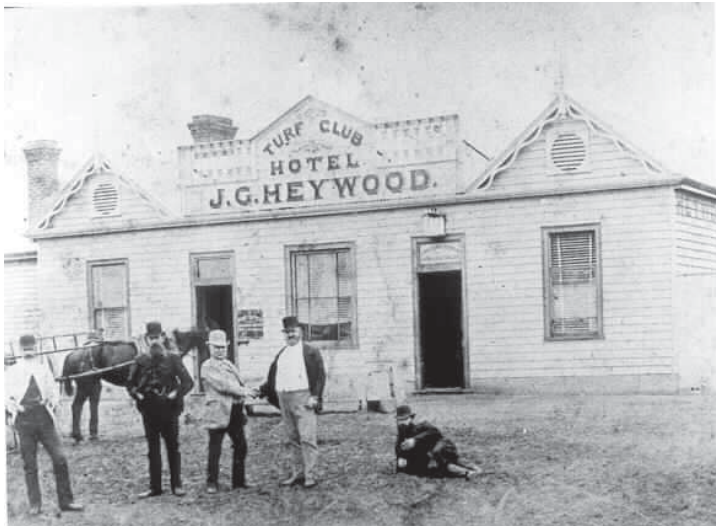

Artist Geoffrey Jones, a resident of East Malvern at the time, was the Art Master at Elwood High School. Geoff used cement and bronze dust for the bust and used photos to accurately create the likeness. The bust of Harold Holt is permanently located at the Harold Holt Swim Centre.

Stonnington Research Enquiries

During the past couple of months we have received enquiries relating to the heritage overlay for the Villers-Bretonneux area, 13 Glenbrook Avenue and the Hedgeley Dene Precinct Neighbourhood Character Overlay.

Gavin, the grandson of the jockey and trainer Harrie Bird, who had his stables at Manchester Grove, Glenhuntly, is keen to find out what happened to the side-saddle that used to be in the bar at the old Turf Club Hotel in Dandenong Road. This saddle belonged to his great-grandmother Kate Ronzio Bird.

Information was sought on Thomas Henderson whose original land purchase in Glen Iris was on the east of Gardiners Creek and the early estate names for the area around Scott Grove and Erica Avenue Glen Iris.

We were asked about a hospital in Tooronga Road in the 1950s. The Stonnington History Centre staff could not locate a hospital in Tooronga Road in that period. The only reference for a hospital in Tooronga Road was in 1919. It was called 'Ganmor' and it was run by Nurse R. V. Henry. There were a few hospitals nearby, the nearest would probably have been 'Amaranth' Hospital which was in Coppin Street. Once again the Stonnington History Centre staff Ellen, Simone, Janet, Julia and Peter have undertaken the research and answered the enquiries. Thank you!

National Library's Trove services under threat

The President of the Federation of Australian Historical Societies has written a letter of concern to Senator the Hon Mitch Fifield, Minister for the Arts, regarding recent funding cuts to the National Library of Australia. Of particular concern to the FAHS and historical societies is the threat to one of the most valuable online research tools for historical research, Trove. As a direct result of these cuts, the National Library will cease aggregating content in Trove from museums and universities unless it is fully funded to do so.

In the last decade and a half Trove has facilitated and revolutionised historical research through its marvellous provision of access to newspapers and a myriad of other material via the web. It has become an invaluable tool that is used by millions of researchers and is supported by an enormous community volunteer effort. 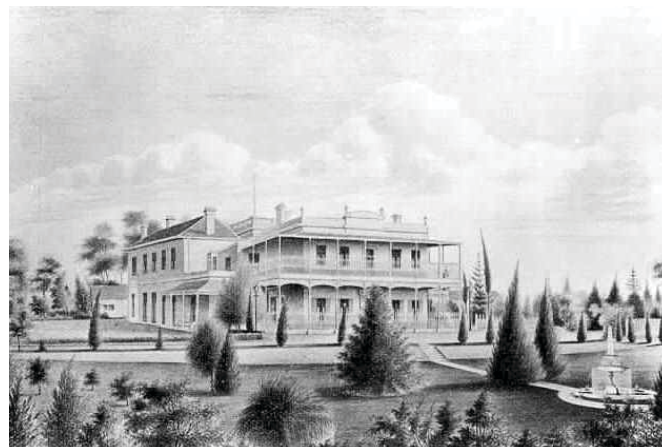

Growing up in East Malvern

In 2003 Ken Dickinson shared recollections of his early years in East Malvern. A small (edited) part is included here. "My parents, Norman and Agnes Dickinson moved into their new home at 12 Karma Avenue, East Malvern in 1928. Because my father was a returned soldier from World War 1, my parents' home was built through the War Service Homes Department. ... two separate sets of plans were available - one set for weatherboard homes and the other for brick homes. Each of these two sets of plans had its own numbering system. My parents found a plan which was to their liking but it was for a weatherboard home and not a brick home which was their preferred construction medium. However, they chose this floor plan but specified that the house be constructed in brick. As the building grew, my parents realised that it was not being constructed to their chosen plan.

The War Service Homes Department staff had merely selected the brick plan which had the same number as my parents' chosen weatherboard plan. As there was no correlation between the plan numbers in the two systems and the respective floor plans, it was inevitable that my parents did not have the home of their choice. The builder was a local man, Mr. Fullard [who] constructed many units and many pairs of flats in the Darling area.

In June 1929 I was born in Sister Woff's private hospital, Manning Road, East Malvern. In December 1955, I married Jean Falloon who, with her parents and brother, lived at 6 Nirvana Avenue. Peter Hollingworth, the former Governor General of Australia and his family, also lived in Nirvana Avenue. Mr. Dan Hardy, radio personality with the ABC and a well known figure in the music world of Melbourne, lived in Nirvana Avenue near Bretonneux Square.

Shopkeepers in the East Malvern shopping centre (Waverley/Malvern Roads) included: Mrs Byron, sweet shop and milk bar (next to Centenary Hall); Mr Howe hairdresser and tobacconist; Mr Redapple, pharmacist and Mr Norman McKay, estate agent. Nirvana Dairy, on the corner of Belgrave Road, was owned by the Spottiswood family. Centenary Hall was used for many purposes. Diver Johnstone gave a lecture on the recovery of gold from the wrecked ship, the *Niagara* and Mr. E. L Browne showed films which he had taken in central Australia. Election rallies also were held in the hall. I was present on one occasion when the U.A.P held a rally and Mr. R. G. Menzies supported the local candidate, Mr. Joe Gullett. Mr. Menzies was in fine form on that occasion enlivening the meeting with his impromptu wit. The hall was used also on a weekly basis as a picture theatre [the Verne]. Various groups such as the Returned Sailors', Soldiers' and Airmen's Imperial League of Australia used the hall for their regular meetings.
