

The Malvern, Victoria, connection

In 1853 barrister Charles Graeme Bruce Skinner subdivided 84 acres of Crown land surrounded by today's Glenferrie, Malvern and Toorak Roads. Skinner named the estate and his

newly built hotel after the Malvern Hills in England where his ancestors had lived. In 1878, on the recommendation of Shire President (Sir) James Lorimer, the name of Gardiner was changed to Malvern.

The origin of the name Malvern

The name 'Malvern' is apparently derived from the Welsh moel bryn meaning bare hills. The Malvern Hills are a range of hills in the English counties of Worcestershire, Herefordshire and a small area of northern Gloucestershire. Until the early 20th century, there was hardly a tree to be seen on the Malvern Hills, partly I think because animals were extensively grazed up there and because I think the soil wasn't deep enough to support the native tree species. There aren't any rivers and streams on the Malvern Hills - only springs that rarely form pools. You may think why use Welsh words? I suppose the alternative would be Anglo-Saxon so Celtic is perhaps preferable. Wales is very close to Malvern and up until the mid-20th century it seems half the population of Malvern had Welsh surnames - Jones, Davies, Williams, Probert, Price, Pritchard, Preece. The P at the beginning of the names is significant - short for 'ap' (ap Richard, ap Robert &c) meaning 'son of'. **Cora Weaver 2017**

Cora Weaver, together with Bruce Osborne, represent the Friends of Malvern's Springs and Wells in the UK. The Friends are the recognised guardians of Malvern's water heritage. The group celebrates the Springs, Spouts, Fountains and Holy Wells of the Malvern Hills, and of Great Malvern as a Spa Town.

Disappearing from the landscape

Di recently spotted a board advertising the planned development at 222 Burke Road Glen Iris. This high profile building is on the south east corner of Burke and Malvern Roads in Glen Iris. The house was designed by architect Marcus Martin in 1923. A copy of the original building plan is in the Stonnington History Centre's collection.

'Marcus Martin became one of Melbourne's most successful domestic architects in the 1920s, a position that was consolidated in the 1930s and the post war period. He was best known for his Georgian and Spanish Mission designs prior to the Depression. After 1932 he became one of the foremost exponents of the conservative, inclusive, modernist mode, characteristic of Toorak and South Yarra. Highly respected within the profession, his practice was especially prolific in Prahran and Malvern. He was renowned for his careful planning, attention to detail and impeccable taste, and was the doyen of architects to the middle class in the inter war period. In the late 1930s and post war period he also became involved in institutional design, most importantly the design of Free Kindergartens'.

Percy Treyvaud Park, Chadstone Road, Malvern East

According to the Stonnington History Centre records, Chadstone Park was renamed the Percy Treyvaud Park in 1972 in honour of the late Malvern Councillor for his service to the people of Chadstone (now Malvern East). Percy Treyvaud was instrumental in the formation of the Chadstone Recreation and Civic Club in 1958. He was foundation president of the bowls section of the club. From the time of the club's formation until his death he was on the executive body and was club president during the sixties. As a result of his efforts, by 1971 some 800 residents of all age groups were involved weekly in bowls, tennis, cricket, football and lacrosse. In addition to his work at Chadstone, he was involved in scouting, school committees and various charities. He was also a Malvern Councillor from 1969/70 to 1971/72. According to ancestry.com: Percy Rodolphe Treyvaud was born in 1913, to William Edmund Treyvaud and Elvira Tribolet. He married Verna Daly in 1939 and he served in the military during WWII. They had one son, Edmund Rodolphe Treyvaud, born in 1940. Percy Treyvaud died in 1972.

Thomas Pockett was born in England on 11 February 1857. He left school at an early age, obtained work in a nursery and by the age of 20 was foreman gardener on an English estate. He won his first prize for chrysanthemums at a Cheltenham flower show when he was 19.

Newly married to Louisa Bayliss, Pockett migrated to Australia, aged 21. Around 1882, Pockett obtained the position of head gardener at *Kenley* in Kooyong Road, Toorak. Here he won the first prize offered by the Horticultural Improvement Society of Victoria, 'for the best arranged and best kept gentleman's garden within five miles of the Melbourne G.P.O.'

Around 1886 Pockett purchased land in Malvern Road at the corner of Shaftesbury Avenue where he built his new home *Hatherley*. Many thousands of chrysanthemums were soon growing on vacant blocks surrounding the house. In 1888, when Pockett relinquished his position at *Kenley* to concentrate on his chrysanthemums, he was approached by Malvern Council to prepare a plan for a Municipal Gardens, the site being a sandy barren paddock in High Street on the corner of Spring Road, Malvern. Pockett was appointed Curator of Parks and Gardens for the Shire of Malvern, a position he held for thirty years. During this time he designed both Malvern Gardens and Central Park.

Pockett spent more than 70 years breeding and growing chrysanthemums and as he achieved world acclaim, displays of his prize-winning blooms became a feature of the Malvern gardens. Varieties raised by Pockett were grown all over the world. His blooms were sold internationally and won prizes at leading flower shows. They still feature prominently on Mother's Day.

Pockett also helped with the design of other public gardens including Barkly Gardens (Richmond), Hopetoun Gardens (Elsternwick), Caulfield Park and Alexandra Gardens (Kew, with his brother George). In 1918, when Pockett retired from Malvern, he and Louisa moved to Healesville where Pockett established a successful nursery. In 1945 he was awarded the O.B.E. for services to horticulture and his world-wide success with chrysanthemums.

As well as Malvern's public gardens, Thomas Pockett's other long-standing legacy is the many miles of street trees planted throughout the former municipality of Malvern.

McKellar Press

Permission was sought from Rosalie Strother, the editor of the Scots' Church, Melbourne's bi monthly publication *The Leaflet*, to include one of the Stonnington History Centre images in the April 2017 issue. They planned to include an article about the history of McKellar Press, a company that has been printing *The Leaflet* for about fifty years.

At one time McKellar Press, Glenferrie Road Malvern, printed City of Malvern leaflets including this one for Bubonic Plague Precautions!

For the last 23 years McKellar Press have been responsible for the printing of many of the Malvern Historical Society publications include *Greetings from Malvern, Back when*, and *Amazing History: Amazing Stonnington*.

Samuel Hattam

Samuel Hattam, the youngest son of John and Anne Hattam, was born in Daylesford, Victoria, on 9th June 1873. Samuel married Amelia Albertina Angove on 31st January 1899. Amelia was a milliner prior to her marriage. The couple had seven children, Jack Lyle, Edna Clarice, Vera Mildred, Eric Clifford, Eileen May, Samuel (Jnr) and Dorothy Elwyn.

From the age of 25 Samuel worked as a draper at Walhalla and later became a Director of the Walhalla Gold Mine. After the gold rush ended in Walhalla

c1912 Samuel moved his family to Malvern where he joined his brothers's drapery store. He later opened his own store in Carnegie. Samuel served as a Shire of Malvern councillor from 1921, becoming Mayor of Malvern in 1928/29.

The Frost family

At the turn of the last century 2-4 Elizabeth Street Malvern was occupied by Ernest and Thomas Frost, carters and gardeners. An MMBW plan of Malvern, dated 1907, shows 2-4 Elizabeth Street with front verandahs facing Elizabeth Street and smaller back verandahs. One member of the family, Edward James Frost (Jim), was the gardener for Justice Henry Higgins' home *Doona* in Glenferrie Road Toorak. Jim was also a long standing supporter and committee member of the Tooronga Cricket Club. The sporting pavilion and rooms, used by the Tooronga Football Club and the Tooronga District Cricket Club (formed in 1918), were relocated from the rear of the Malvern Town Hall to an oval close to Gardiners Creek in 1927. The pavilion was named the James Frost Pavilion in 1970 in honour of Jim Frost, Secretary of the Cricket Club for 30 years.





Parer the Magician, 1 Glenarm Road, Gardiner






Melbourne based Tommy Parer, aka 'Parer the Magician', was billed as 'The Ace of Deceivers' and worked primarily in card tricks and manipulation.

Tommy Parer's long career as a magician commenced on 5 October 1940 when he appeared at his first professional engagement - a party for children. Up until his death in 1985 Parer continued to entertain generations of children and adults with his sleight-of-hand magic.

It is for his work on television that Parer is

most well known. On 4 November 1956 he appeared on the opening night of television. Parer presented his act on *The Judy Jack Show* only four minutes into the opening television transmission. Parer continued performing on television up until 1966. He and his magic rabbit Frosty delighted children for many years on *The Happy Show* and *The Tarax Show*. http://collections.artscentremelbourne.com.au

Stonnington Indigenous Marker No 2 - Meeting Place for Corroborees



Chapel St, Prahran (near Prahran Town Hall) Melway: 58 D6.

At least three corroborees were staged in Melbourne during March 1839. 'Squint', a commentator whose identity is unknown, wrote of early Prahran in the *South Metropolitan* on 5 May 1906: 'It was generally in Chapel Road, between Commercial Road and Gardener's [sic] Creek Road, that the numerous body of aboriginals — men, women, and children — headed by poor Jimmy Mann, used to meet to hold their corroborees and throw their boomerangs. Their performances at times were unique, interesting, and very exciting — their weird and discordant song and dance of "Whar-ah-gar-we", and "Whar-ah-gar-wan", and their strange and fantastic movements, especially around the camp fires, with their bodies all bare, and their arms in the air, and with the constant accompaniment of their tribes' shouts and yells, were such as one can scarcely forget, and many times were witnessed by hundreds.

Sometimes foolish people supplied them with rum (fire water), and then matters were fairly lively, but still nothing serious happened, generally speaking. They were much more peaceful than many of their white brethren'

'Prahran', where the corroborees were often held, is a corruption of 'Pur-ra-ran', a native name given to this area by George Langhorne, who was in charge of the Aboriginal Mission. Langhorne described it as a compound of two Aboriginal words signifying 'land partially surrounded by water'. Hoddle the surveyor, when obtaining the name from Langhorne, wrote it as it now stands. J B Cooper, in his *History of Prahran*, notes that due to the many swamps in Prahran, Melbourne residents referred to the place as 'swampy poor ann', a play on the native name of 'Pur-ra-ran'. http://www.stonnington.vic.gov.au/Discover/History/Heritage-Markers

Sir Granville Ransome Bantock, British composer of classical music.

The MHS was recently contacted by John Dressler, Professor, Horn and Musicology, Murray State University, USA. John is preparing a book on composer Granville Bantock. Some of his works were performed in Australia in the early 20th century. John has come across two brief advertisements in a Malvern newspaper about concerts performed by the Malvern Choral Society including a part-song or two of Bantock's. Granville Bantock compositions performed at the Malvern Town Hall included 'The Emperor' and 'The Peach flower', 18th July, 1925, and 'Awake, Awake', 'Yung Yang' and 'Spirit of Night' 20th March,1926. Ellen Porter, Team Leader Stonnington History Centre, followed up the enquiry. She discovered that one of the programmes in the Stonnington History Centre's collection notes that the Malvern Choral Society was established in 1925. Further research regarding the 1915 performance showed that the Malvern News, 11 Sept

1915, had an advertisement for a 'Grand Choral Concert'. At the top of the advertisement it says 'Malvern Choral Union', W.C. Frazier, conductor. The March 1926 programme, for the concert in the Malvern Town Hall, has only recently been donated to the SHC.

Albert Phillips – What I remember about living in East Malvern SE5

'In 1945 I moved to 95 Paxton Street, which was the second house from Darling Road. This site is now occupied by flats. During 1945, and years to follow, we had the baker and milk carts deliver bread. We also had

the ice cart deliver ice that was split into blocks that would fit into our ice chest. I used to follow the ice cart to collect small pieces of ice, which was a treat. All carts, thanks to their horses, provided manure for the garden which we collected by following the carts. As the Cranbourne Dairy was just around the corner in Darling Road, between Paxton Street and Rothesay Avenue, we collected our milk at the dairy, mostly in a quart billy.

As a child we made many billy carts and put them to the top of Paxton Street hill, then rode them down the hill and often around the corner into Darling Road.

We had to be aware of the Red Bus that ran from the Central Park Tram Terminus down Paxton Street and on to Oakleigh. In the summer we caught the Brown Bus in Darling Road to Brighton Beach. At our end, this terminated at Gardiner, at the corner of Burke and Malvern Roads. Close to this corner was the Hoyts theatre, where I often would go to see the matinee.

As a schoolboy, I delivered the Sun, Age and Argus to a wide area from Stott's Newsagency, which was on the corner of Darling Road and Malvern Road. Mr Stott was responsible for introducing the fountain pens, made by the WA Shaeffer Pen Company. After school I also delivered medicines for the Macintosh Pharmacy, which was next to the State Savings Bank of Victoria in Malvern Road. In the shopping area in Darling Road, there was a milk bar and behind was Lock's tennis courts. On the south side of Darling Road was another milk bar, an iron monger and Marshall's grocer, on the corner of Brunel Street. On the other corner was the butcher. Not far away was Hedgeley Dene Gardens, where I would often play and catch yabbies. I attended Scouts at 1st Malvern, the oldest scout troop in Victoria. This was located behind the home of Cr Hyslop in Darling Road, opposite Olive Street. Like so many, I attended Lloyd Street School.' (MH 14077, undated)
