
Meet the author: Daniel Oakman

The Declaration of the Armistice

At the Malvern Council meeting, following the declaration of the Armistice, the National Anthem was sung, and a resolution of gratification at the cessation of the war was passed with patriotic fervour. At the same meeting Councillor Henderson mentioned that in connection with the Seventh War Loan, the quota allotted to Malvern was £345,000. The sum raised was £276,000. Mr. Charles Wood, of Matson Lodge, Hopetoun Road, Malvern, expressed a wish to the Council to present a war memorial in honour of Malvern residents who had lost their lives fighting in the Great War. The Council accepted his offer.

The granite memorial bears the inscription:—

In Memory of Those Brave Men Residents of Malvern, who gave their lives in the Great War 1914—1919. Erected by a Grateful Englishman.

On Sunday afternoon, March 18, 1922, the gift was the subject of a ceremony at which about 3,000 persons were present. On the various panels are recorded the names of the fallen, but unfortunately the list does not contain the names of all the men who enlisted from Malvern, and who were killed. All the missing names are to be found on the many honour boards displayed in the churches and State schools of Malvern and other public institutions, as for instance on the Prahran and Malvern Tramways Trust Honour Board there are the names of 140 men. The ceremony of unveiling that honour board was performed by General Williams on September 28, 1918. A memorial service and a church parade was held on October 13, 1918, in memory of those tramway men, in the Central Park of Malvern. To commemorate the landing at Gallipoli a service was held in the Town Hall on Anzac Day, April 25, 1922, and the service has been continued to be held on each recurring anniversary. *History of Malvern, from its first settlement to a City (1935)* J.B. Malvern Soldiers' War Memorial from 'A Grateful Englishman'

The Memorial was designed in the Gothic style, the ground plan taking the form of a cross. The whole of the superstructure is carried out in dressed grey Harcourt granite. The four faces of the central pier have polished panels bearing the names of the fallen soldiers cut in sunk and gilded lettering. The architects were Messrs. Beaver & Purnell, and the stonework was carried out by the well known firm of Chambers & Clutten. Originally situated at Malvern Cricket Ground (1922), it was moved to the corner of Malvern Town Hall in 1932 (pictured). It was relocated to Central Park in 1992.

Soldiers' Memorial in the Malvern Town Hall Foyer

In the foyer of the City Hall was placed a Malvern War Civic Memorial of great beauty as a reminder to all who enter the hall that 1,500 men from Malvern went to the war. The memorial is in white marble, and represents a soldier standing, and a woman sitting with a child on her knee. The soldier and the woman are both looking down on the Book of Remembrance, on which is engraved the names of the men who died in the war. A laurel wreath surrounds the arms of the A.I.F. The memorial was sculptured by Paul Montford. Fran Bader, Moorabbin Historical Society, has undertaken detailed research on Paul Raphael Montford (1868-1938). A copy of her research notes has been added to the Stonnington History Collection. One of her sources was Catherine Moriarty's *Making Melbourne Monuments: The sculpture of Paul Montford* (Australian Scholarly Publishing, 2013) which included transcripts/extracts of Paul Montford's letters, 1927-1929, to his brother Louis, a stone carver in England.

In 1927 Paul was commissioned to produce the Malvern memorial as well as the external sculptures of Melbourne's Shrine of Remembrance. Fran noted that additional research has shown that the Malvern Memorial was rough carved by August Rietman from 1930 to 1931 in the original Box Cottage workshop in Ormond The memorial was unveiled on August 23, 1931, by the Mayor, Councillor C. J. Waters. A memorial service was held in the City Hall before the unveiling ceremony, which was attended by the Mayor, Councillors, civic staff, the clergy of the diocese, and Sir Stanley Argyle, representing the State Parliament. Sir Stanley in his address, said that "Most memorials were not so much 'sermons in stone' as historical records, and he was pleased to see that the city fathers of Malvern had thought fit to place in the foyer of the town hall a work of art that would tell the future generation a story of sacrifice; a story that their children's children would read, and learn from it of the soul of the people of this country. It was a memorial of sacrifice; of the sacrifice of the men who went away, and also of the sacrifice of the fathers, mothers, sisters, and wives who stayed waiting at home, which sacrifice had not been recognised as it should have been. In that respect Malvern had taken the lead.

The Malvern Repatriation Local Committee

The Malvern Repatriation Local Committee was formed on October 28, 1918. The members who were appointed on the executive by the Defence Department were W. A. Sanderson, President; J. W. Hill, J. H. Moss, W. T. Williams, R. H. Stainthorpe, Honorary Secretary and Treasurer; Councillors F. H. Francis, M.H.R., and L. W. Holmes, the two last mentioned were Government nominees. In addition to these men, who were the executive, there was a sub-committee consisting of Councillor Waters and Messrs. F. Cason, J. Turner, and N. Jenkins. This sub-committee did excellent work. The Repatriation Local Committee started without any funds, and it had to depend upon local subscriptions, receipts from concerts, and such like efforts for its funds. Up to April 1,

1922, the Committee had collected the sum of £913/11/-. Cases to the number of 1,600 went before the Committee, and were dealt with in a sympathetic and helpful manner. Every soldier who enlisted from Malvern received on his return from the war a personal letter of welcome from Miss Ruby Stainthorpe, the honorary assistant secretary of the Repatriation Committee.

Naming of Bretonneux Square and Villers Square, Malvern East

Land was purchased by the War Service Commission in 1919 to be sold to returned servicemen and their families. The streets were named after WWI places of battle (Bretonneaux, Fontaine, Villers) or Buddhist philosophy (Karma, Nirvana). The sale of allotments was administered by the Commonwealth Department of Repatriation, which offered low-interest loans to assist with house-building on this land. In October 1920 a meeting was held at the Melbourne Town Hall where it was decided that the city 'adopt' Villers-Bretonneux in France, 'in memory of the great Australian victory in August 1918'. A Villers-Bretonneux Appeal Fund raised well in excess of the 20,000 pounds it had aimed for, with much of the money coming from school children, following a drive by the Education Department. The money raised was used to rebuild the school in the French town, which may still have a plaque commemorating the donation from Victorian school children. Along with signs which read 'N'oublions Jamais L'Australie' (Never let us forget Australia). Australian soldiers were instrumental in saving Villers-Bretonneux from two invasions by the Germans in April 1918, and about 1200 Anzacs lost their lives protecting the town. The French town has streets called Anzac, Melbourne and Victoria, so it is possible that this strong connection between Melbourne and Villers-Bretonneux led to the choosing of these names for the War Service Commission streets in Malvern East.

Malvern Presbyterian Church

From around 1865 the Presbyterians were having religious meetings in East Malvern, and the influence of the Presbyterian community extended throughout Malvern where worship was conducted in private houses. Later there was a Presbyterian Church in Grace Street, another in Winter Street with the Rev. W. L. Morton acting as its minister. A timber Church hall in Pine Grove was the original church built in 1884-85 for the Malvern Presbyterians in Glenferrie Road. It was moved from Glenferrie Road to Pine Grove in 1885. Today the Malvern Presbyterian Church can be found in Wattletree Road, west of Cabrini. The present church was built in 1906 to accommodate the growing church membership and it was officially dedicated on 27th July, 1906. The seating initially accommodated 600 and the first minister was Rev. McCrae Stewart. For a time the church was named "The Young Men's Church House" and under Stewart's ministry the congregation increased greatly. The gates in front of the church were

erected as a memorial to Mr and Mrs Stewart. The church organ was built by George Fincham & Son and was installed in the church when the building was completed in 1906. The organ was electrified in 1956 and later additions included a further bank of pipes, known as the "memorial pipes".

According to the National Trust of Australia, the church is a rare design by Architect Robert Haddon, built in red brick with cement detailing. The church has 'a broad nave, sloping floors, porches, transepts and vestries'. The west window 'is bisected by central mullions which rise into a diminutive turret capped by a wrought iron finial'. The Trust described the church as one of Australia's major Arts and Crafts churches. In 1921, the Governor, the Earl of Stradbroke, unveiled a wall tablet memorial to fallen soldiers in the Malvern Presbyterian Church. The monument stands 9 feet in height, and it is composed of dark grey Buchan marble. It bears the inscription, "To the glory of God and in enduring remembrance of our gallant soldiers who fell in the Great War, 1914-18." The names of 37 men are on the marble with the words, 'Their name liveth for evermore."

We honour the wartime service and sacrifice of our local municipality's military service people and locals who supported Australia's military cause including the following:

Edward Beken Ashcroft Labourer, Windsor, enlisted aged 19 Died of wounds, France, May 1917, aged 21



Alfred Garfield Hawkins Clerk, Malvern East Killed in action, France 1916, aged 25

The gatehouse, Stonington, 336 Glenferrie Road Malvern

Karen Oliver recently shared her family's links to the gatehouse at *Stonington* in Glenferrie Road Malvern. She thinks her family moved there in about 1953. Karen and her twin sister Margaret were born in 1954.

Karen's father, Kenneth Stott's first job, prior to moving to the gatehouse at *Stonington*, was delivering ice blocks to homes with ice chests. He was offered the caretaker position for *Stonington* and the use of the gatehouse free of rent. Karen remembers her mother telling her that the back of the gatehouse was renovated with a bathroom and wash house added so that the family would be more comfortable. She also remembers her Dad telling her that there was a room above *Stonington's* front entrance, with the small windows, but he could never find the door. He did find a hidden staircase which he never went up as the stairs were rickety and he didn't think they were safe.

The family left the gatehouse in about 1956 and lived in Preston, Chadstone and then Boronia. After finishing his caretaker duties he became a chauffeur for the Premier's Department in Melbourne, driving many politicians

including Billy McMahon, Henry Bolte and Steve Crabb, until his retirement in 1986. Karen remembers her parents saying they thoroughly enjoyed living in the gatehouse. In 1957 the Victoria Department of Education took over the property from the Department of Health.

Stonington and Stonnington

Stonington was built in 1890 as a private residence for John Wagner, to the design of London-born architect Charles D'Ebro. Wagner was a partner with A.W. Robertson in Cobb & Co. coaches. The residence was named Stonington after Stonington Connecticut, U.S.A., the birthplace of Wagner's wife Mary. Wagner lived with his family at Stonington until his death in 1901. From 1901 the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia was located in Melbourne. For the next thirty years, when State Government House in The Domain in South Yarra was required as the residence for the Governor-General, Stonington became the Vice-Regal residence for the Governor of Victoria. Seven Governors lived at Stonington. During this era the spelling of the name was changed to Stonnington. The Victorian Government purchased Stonington (and its contents) in 1928 for £35,000. Stonington's association with education began when St Margaret's school used the property from 1931-1938. The mansion was also used as an after-care centre for polio patients and following the outbreak of World War II, the house and grounds were used by the Australian Red Cross as a convalescent hospital. From 1953 the Health

Department occupied the site. Since 1957, the site has played an important role in tertiary education in Victoria. It was home to Toorak Teachers' College from 1957 to 1973, the State College of Victoria - Toorak from 1973 to 1981 and in 1981 it became the Toorak Campus of Victoria College. Victoria College merged with Deakin University in 1992. Deakin University sold the property to private developers in 2006. The residence has now reverted to the original spelling. The City of Stonnington takes its name from *Stonington*.

Congratulations to the Stonnington History staff, Simone, Janet, Jack and Julia for the fantastic 'Service and Sacrifice at Home and at War, 1914-1918' exhibition which presented a unique portrait of the way extraordinary Australians contributed to the war effort at home and overseas. The exhibition also included the Stonnington History Centre's amazing new digital surface table, with a large interactive touch screen which meant that all the images could be scrolled through and zoom into to see the details. One highlight was the large Honour Board. It was printed by Ron Polak. MBE Malvern, on A0 sized fomecor, using Stonnington History Centre research material and featured gold coloured text on a stock image marble photograph background. The Stonnington History Centre were delighted with how well it came out, looking even more realistic than was hoped. This honour board listed the names of casualties of the First World War, including those who died of wounds or disease, as reproduced in



Helen Doyle's *Suburbs at War*. This list of 797 men with links to the Stonnington municipality is not complete, but is as accurate as possible. There were local men who died while serving with the British Army, but it has not been possible to identify them all.

The Committee was pleased to see that a recent planning application for 1268-1270 Glenferrie Road Malvern included Condition 14 - which noted that Archival quality photographic records of the original pressed metal ceiling were required.
