More Weeties!

We have recently passed the centenary of an iconic Australian product and character, one so strong that it has entered the vernacular as a word, and Malvern was very much involved in its creation. I refer to the product Weeties and the character 'Willie Weeties, the Cereal King'. The Fitzroy History Group has already publicised this centenary (*The Breakfast Cereal Kings: the Spry family in Fitzroy 2016*), but Stonnington should also, as it has a very strong claim.

Weeties was the brainchild of Bob Creaser. Bob travelled to the United States in the early years of the century, noticed the success of the newly introduced breakfast cereal Kellogg's Cornflakes, and decided that a similar product would be successful in Australia. At the time, Bob was living in Fitzroy, next door to an old established family of bootmakers, the Sprys. The Sprys showed some interest in Bob's proposal, and agreed to support him financially. Bob then moved his residence to Chatsworth Road, Prahran, and in 1918 opened a factory on the site of an existing bakery at 6 High Street Malvern. He called it Grain Foods Pty Ltd. In those days, the numbering on High Street started eastwards from Kooyong Road, but number 6 still exists, now an Australia Post Office (1006 High Street Armadale).

Bob registered Weeties as a trademark in 1918, under the Grain Foods address, and the first press advertisements featuring 'Willie Weeties' appeared in 1919, with the High Street Malvern address. In 1920, the company was amalgamated with Purina Crispies, Ltd, which belonged to the Spry family, and the new company was named Purina Grain Foods Ltd, whose Chairman, unsurprisingly, was Mr H. L. Spry. Purina had a factory in Smith Street, Collingwood, as well as in Sydney and Fremantle. The Sprys by this stage had decided to invest heavily in breakfast cereals, and owned two companies, Purina Crispies Ltd and the Cereal Co. It is not recorded if Bob Creaser joined the new company. After a fire in their Collingwood factory, the Sprys moved their factory to Best Street, North Fitzroy. They suffered another fire, also at Best Street, in the mid-1920's. They continued to advertise both products while the factory was being rebuilt, which leads one to assume that production may have also been available at the Malvern Road site at that time. Grain Foods Pty Ltd was wound up 1929 and the factory disappears from Sands & MacDougall at the same time. Purina was eventually taken over by Nabisco, a major American biscuit and cereal manufacturer. Weeties was later acquired by Uncle Toby's Oats, a subsidiary of Burns Philp, and later passed into the ownership of Nestle Foods where it currently resides. Weeties is still manufactured in Australia and New Zealand, although it is very hard to find now amidst the plethora of breakfast cereals in supermarkets. 'King Willie Weeties', however, still wears his crown! Jerry Bell 2019


Heritage Walks: Department Stores of Chapel Street Sunday 13 October 2pm and Wednesday 16 October 11am

19 October Malvern Appreciation Day!

Malverns now exist around the world and their numbers are increasing. One project, masterminded by the Friends of Malvern Springs and Wells from Great Malvern, England, is aiming to bring about active friendship between all Malverns. In 2016 the Mayor of Malverne New York, Patricia Norris-McDonald declared the 19th October to be Malvern Appreciation Day. It is likely that the ancient Britains were responsible for naming Malvern, or moel-bryn meaning 'the bare hill'. The Malvern Hills dominate Worcestershire and Herefordshire, www.malvernwaters.com

Samuel Keith's memories

Tamara recently shared her late father's memories of the start of the Second World War. At the time her father lived in Serrell Street, East Malvern. "The war came to East Malvern very quietly. I do not remember any effect at all on our school affairs at Lloyd Street School. My last two years there were in 1939 and 1940. Indeed, and though it must have happened, I have no recollection of anyone at Lloyd Street ever mentioning the war. Recruiting was taking place for the AIF — the Australian Imperial Force — a volunteer army for service anywhere in the world. Caulfield Racecourse was taken over and became an army camp. On a still night a boy lying in bed in Serrell Street could hear the bugle playing the Last Post, conveying to the camp the message that the day was done. But there was as yet little fighting anywhere except at sea, and the general assumption was that when land and air fighting did come it would be well away from Australia, in Europe or Africa. Just as in the Great War, petrol rationing came but nothing else was rationed yet. That would come later. Meanwhile life in East Malvern continued very much as usual". (Undated)

Presentation Convent Windsor

In 1874, seven Presentation Sisters from Ireland established a parish primary school and a secondary school for girls at St Mary's Church, on the south side of Dandenong Road, East St Kilda. In 1875, the schools moved into a mansion called Turret Lodge on the present site of Presentation Convent Windsor, on the north side of Dandenong Road. At this time the school offered in addition a 'Select' [ie: fee-paying] school for primary, secondary and resident students. In this photo, the Parish School students are shown on the left hand side, Select School and

staff can be seen on the right hand side. The present convent building, replacing *Turret Lodge*, was commenced in 1883. In 2000, the College was the oldest extant school in Prahran. In 2019 the decision was made for the school to close. Christian Brothers College St Kilda, diagonally opposite in Dandenong Road, announced that it will open its doors to all students from PCW when the 146 year old girls' school closes at the end of 2020.



Garden Street South Yarra

Kathie Harrison, the administrator for three local Facebook pages, Hawksburn State/Primary, Prahran High and Housing Commission Flats - I survived/ lived in the Prahran/SouthYarra Commission Flats, recently sent through this c1950 photo of the Garden Street South Yarra boys. A similar photo of the Garden Street South Yarra girls appears in the Malvern Historical Society publication *Back when*.

Pattenbringan, Gawith Court Toorak (undated)

The large villa residence known as *Pattenbringan* (also '*Patten-bringan*') was built in 1889-90 for Hugh Wilson in Heyington Place to a design by the notable Melbourne architectural firm, Reed, Henderson & Smart. The Melbourne architectural firm of Reed, Henderson & Smart operated from 1883 until 1890, succeeding the previous partnership (Reed and Barnes) of Joseph Reed (1822-1890) and Frederick Barnes (1822-1883). The firm was responsible for a number of prominent and notable buildings in early Melbourne, including the Melbourne Public Library (1854), *Ripponlea* (1868) and the highly acclaimed Melbourne Exhibition Building (1878).

Tenders were called for in September 1889 for a residence at Toorak for H.T. Wilson (Argus, 28 Sept 1889). Hugh Wilson is listed in the 1889/90 City of Prahran rate books as the owner of vacant land. The following year, a nine-room brick house is listed. The new house was built on the elevated south bank of the Yarra, with views across the river to Richmond. It lies close to the railway line which was constructed in 1879. The name *Pattenbringan* comes from a place name in Aberdeenshire, Scotland. The MMBW Detail Plan No.

929 dated 1905, shows the substantial house and grounds of *Pattenbringan* facing Heyington Place. The main entrance was on the south-east side of the house, accessed by a return verandah. The paddock on the south side of the house block, marked with a 'manure box', possibly belonged to the house. The present-day Duffryn Place is the former lane behind this paddock and possibly marks the original boundary of *Pattenbringan*.

Hugh Thurburn Wilson, the first owner of *Pattenbringan*, was a successful banker, the manager of the Union Bank of Australia. He emigrated to Victoria from Scotland around 1877. He and his wife Annetta were amongst the exclusive list of invitees to the

opening of the first Federal Parliament in Melbourne in 1901. Hugh died in 1933 at home at *Pattenbringan*, aged 81. After his death, there was an executor's auction of the property. Hugh left no family as his wife Annetta and her adopted daughter had been lost at sea when the steamer Waratah sank in 1909. By 1949 the property was owned by Dr and Mrs Arthur Joyce. The Argus newspaper reported in 1949: 'The beautiful garden of *Pattenbringan*, the home of Dr and Mrs Arthur Joyce, in Heyington place, Toorak, made an ideal setting for the late afternoon party they gave on Saturday in perfect weather' (*The Argus* 10 Oct 1949).

The house is described as a single-storey house with walls finished with cement render. The complex roof is clad in slates. There is a fine set of wrought and cast-iron gates at the current vehicular entrance on Gawith Court. *Pattenbringan* is a house that demonstrates the transition from the Italianate to the Queen Anne Revival. The canted bay window, cement-rendered walls and verandah set below the eaves were all common for Italianate houses of the 1880s. Its gable-hipped roof, timber verandah detail and medieval gable treatment all belong to the innovative design that Reed, Henderson & Smart were known for in the 1880s.

Scotchman's Creek bridge.

The Society recently purchased a copy of *Apart From the Roads & the Aqueducts - the Bridges & Civil Works of Harold Irwin*. Patrick Irwin 2019 (Publisher: Patrick Irwin).

Harold Irwin, a civil engineering contractor, was born in 1882. In the 1920s the latest technology in reinforced concrete was used when the rising number of motor vehicles resulted in the need to replace early timber bridges. Harold, considered a construction pioneer, was responsible for a large number of country Victoria's crossings. Between 1911 and 1938 Harold, foreman Tom Scott and a team of labourers, built more than 20 bridges and water supply projects across the state. One crossing was the Waverley Road crossing of Scotchman's Creek in Malvern East. The project involved the redirection of the creek and would have involved major earthwork. Today Scotchman's Creek has been reduced to a culvert under Waverley Road where the Monash Freeway passes overhead.

Giuliano's Fruiterers 80 Glenferrie Road Malvern

Giuliano's Fruiterers was located at 80 Glenferrie Road near the corner of Wattletree Road from about 1958 until it closed in 1998. John (Giuseppe) Giuliano opened the store as a young man of 19 years having only arrived in Australia from Italy three years earlier. Like many of the migrants from the Aeolian Islands in Sicily he chose the fruit and vegetable business. For forty years he would get up at 3.30 am every day to go to the Footscray markets then back to his Malvern shop. The family lived behind the shop for a few years and often the Nonna would cook delicious food for lunch the smells of which wafted down



the hallway into the shop itself. The shop was especially busy on Saturday mornings when it would close at noon. It was one of many fruit shops in Malvern during this time, a typical migrant success story. **Grace Mottram 2019**




Taking Local History to the Community



From the Collection


- -Alan Gregory has donated a copy of a speech he gave to a Prahran Council gathering at the Prahran Town Hall c1990.
