Decorated Tramcar

'Since the arrival of the HRH Edward VIII, the Prince of Wales interest has been aroused each night by the appearance on the various electric tramway lines of a handsomely decorated and illuminated tram-car. The car is ornamented with flags, shields and banners, and on each side are oil paintings of the King, the Queen, and the Prince. Paintings of the Prince are also placed at the front and the rear. On each side of the car there is a large representation of the rising sun, executed in electric light bulbs of various hues, and surmounted with the word "Welcome." When illuminated, the car makes a brilliant show, the coloured lights blending happily with the general decorative scheme. The paintings are the work of Mr Walter Corless of the Malvern Tramway Depot, who supervised the whole of the undertaking. The work was carried out at the Malvern depot.

Stow family, Bride Street, Malvern

Thomas Alfred Stow, dairyman, lived with his wife Sarah and their children in a timber cottage in Bride Street Malvern. The 1902 MMBW plan shows the house on the east side of the street between two other timber cottages. The small building at the rear of the house was likely to be stables.

Prior to his marriage in 1900 Thomas Alfred Stow lived in Errol Street Prahran and followed in his father's footsteps working as a dairyman. The Stow family lived in Prahran from the time of their arrival in Melbourne in 1852. In 1900 Thomas Stow married Sarah Edwards. Initially the couple lived in Armadale where they had two daughters Phyliss and Marjorie. By 1905 the family had moved to a timber cottage in Bride Street Malvern where they established their dairy business.

The 1905 & 1917 Sands & McDougall Directories list Thomas Stow as a dairyman in Bride Street. It appears Thomas and Sarah Stow were independent suppliers of milk. Whether they sold milk from their house, or by delivery using a horse-drawn vehicle (or both) is uncertain. The milk would have been in cans, initially supplied by a farm in Lyndhurst (according to a 1913 news report).

At this time, no evidence was found to suggest that Thomas Stow was attached to any of the larger dairies in Malvern. A 1913 news article indicates Thomas was buying milk from other providers. Following the death of Thomas Stow in 1918, his wife Sarah, is listed as a 'dairyman' indicating she continued to run the family business. Sarah ran the dairy until she died in 1924. Soon after Sarah's death, her daughter Marjorie married Clyde Eastman. The newly married couple lived in the

Stow's house in Bride Street for a few years before moving to nearby Hornsby Street Malvern.

Malvern dairies

Malvern Historical Society recently purchased a Grimes dairy milk bottle. The seller donated a second milk bottle from A. Drummond's Dairy Malvern East. Both bottles will make a valuable addition to the Stonnington History Collection. In 1927, the City of Malvern had more than 30 registered dairies and milk vendors. Drummonds Dairy was in Waverley Road Malvern East. Some of the better-known larger dairies include Woodmason's, corner Glenferrie /Malvern Roads, Nirvana Dairy corner Belgrave Road and Merriman's Dairy in Union Street Armadale.

William Merriman married Emma Carter in 1889. The family initially lived in Oakleigh. William grazed his cows on the east corner of Waverley and Warrigal Roads Chadstone where the Aspro factory was later built. Merriman's building in Union Street Armadale was constructed in 1890. In 1897/99 the

building was listed as a brick shop and dwelling. In 1915 William and Emily's son, Ernest joined his father in the business, which became known as Merriman & Sons. Ernest married Ruby Woodmason in 1907. He died in 1920, the same year as his father. The dairy was purchased by Samuel John Grimes in 1925. Around this time Samuel Grimes had taken over the business of Bellett & Cook Pty Ltd a successful milk distributing business in Camberwell. In 1926 Bellett & Cook's Tower Hill Dairy in Camberwell became one of the first dairies to dispense bottled milk. The Camberwell dairy included stables, a hay loft, a large cart shed, boiler house, steam room, brine cooler and horse paddock.

"In those days milk was delivered in bottles, which were filled by hand, with cardboard wads in the top of them. The various milk distributors printed their name and milk quality on each wad, and Dad [Samuel Grimes] came up with the idea during the depression to promote a special type of milk for expectant mothers". Ron Grimes, Samuel's Song – the story of Carlton's first mascot www.carltonfc.com.au. Samuel Grimes reduced the size of the Camberwell business and moved to Union Street Armadale. Grimes and his wife Lizzie were also involved with Samuel's father's bacon curing business in Moreland.

"The milk was a bit richer because it had a bit more dairy fat than the normal milk, so Dad entered into a contract with a special farm at Coldstream, where the Jersey herd produced richer milk. This helped Dad get a little more business to help him pay back the loan on the business itself." www.carltonfc.com.au

Obituary MR. S. J. GRIMES

Mr. Samuel John Grimes, one of Melbourne's best-known retail dairymen has died ... Mr Grimes was born in Brunswick and was one of the founders of the Retail Dairymen's Association now the Melbourne and Metropolitan Milk Distributors. He was president and a member of the board of management until six months ago ... The vacancy was filled by his son Mr George Grimes. Until his death Mr Grimes retained an active interest in the affairs of the association and was held in high esteem by all members of the trade. ... South east corner of Glenferrie Road and High Street Malvern

Warren Doubleday, Collections Manager, Melbourne Tram Museum Inc. shared this photo of the south east corner of Glenferrie Road and High Street taken by Wal Jack around 1955. In 1885 land on the corner of Glenferrie Road and High Street (40' x 150') was purchased by the E S & A Bank. A condition of sale was that the bank erect on the land a 'substantial brick building to be used as a branch bank', within 24 months. The single-storey four roomed brick bank was built in 1888. In 1907 a second storey, including residential quarters for the manager, was added at a cost of £1400. The original bank building was demolished in 1958-9 and replaced with the present building which is listed on the Victorian Heritage Register as a building of State Significance. In recent months, the sun shading devices (brise-soleil) on the north and west façades, have been restored. The former bank is now the home to a new lighting store.





My memories of living at 15 Netherlee Street Glen Iris

Keith Thomas, born 3 March 1944, was prompted to share his memories after seeing our recent Facebook post about the former Kiosk in Central Park on the corner of Wattletree and Burke Roads, Malvern East.

'I lived at 15 Netherlee Street Glen Iris until I got married in 1969. I then moved to a house off Glen Iris Road. My father grew up in High Street on the bend overlooking Glen Iris Park.

I remember as a kid going to a wedding at the kiosk. I think it was for a Woodmason daughter. There was a band stand behind the Kiosk. I think it got burned down. John Landy used to train in Central Park, he lived in Central Park Road. As kids we played in the park, bird nesting etc. I once shot a boy in the leg with an arrow – I assume he recovered. There was a pond and fountain behind the conservatory, we used to hide in the bushes and watch the 'lovers' at the fountain – teenagers kissing. We also put vanilla slices on Burke Road for the cars to run over. There was a drinking fountain on the edge of the park alongside Wattletree Road, it was frequently coloured by Condy's Crystals. As kids we also played, yabbied and fished for goldfish in the Hedgeley Dene Gardens. We would then go home to have mum hose the mud off.

Opposite the kiosk on the east side, the last shop in Wattletree Road towards Malvern Road was a hardware shop. Next to the hardware was a florist. Opposite

in Wattletree Road was a bank, a cake shop and a newsagency and other shops. On the north west corner of the intersection was Gordon's milk bar. I used a false sixpence to get a drink from his machine. My younger sister Glenda dobbed on me to mum. I was made to go and confess to Gordon. On the corner of the lane behind Gordon's in Burke Road was a hairdresser. Down Burke Road towards Gardiner was, among other premises, a butcher, Allen's deli/groceries, and Hull's chemist. Jimmy Lewis from Hope Street used to do his deliveries, I sometimes did deliveries and sometimes helped count pills for Mr. Hull. Next to the chemist was a greengrocer. Down further was a Kingdom Hall. We got caught stamping our feet on the entrance timber floor during a service. Further along was a woodyard run by Clarrie and Cible Cadman who became family friends.


Victorian Collections

The work during the quarter has been steadily continued, "specials" not being so much in evidence as during the winter months.




