HELP WANTED

I am researching my mother-in-law's McMillan families. Mr Cecil Rae from Shoreham mentioned the society in his letter.

My mother-in-law is the daughter of the late George Baggaley and Agnes Annie McMillan. Agnes Annie was born in Launceston about 1881 (5-8-1880 or 1881) to Hugh McMillan and Agnes (nee McMillan). They moved to the Armidale NSW, area. After Hugh's death, Agnes married his brother, Lennox and they moved to Comboyne, NSW.

Agnes McMillan was born on 2-2-1862, Launceston, Tasmania to Alexander McMillan and Christina Armour/Armagh. They also moved to the Armidale area. Hugh McMillan was a son of Alexander McMillan and Agnes Cameron. I don't know if Alexander and Agnes moved to Australia, but another son, Lennox was living in the Armidale area.

I have been unable to get any info on these Alexander McMillan's as there were at least 5-6 living in the Armidale area in the 1880's. On the certificate it shows Scotland as place of birth, which isn't very helpful. I have written to a number of McMillan's and Historical Societies in that area but have not had any luck.

I was wondering if some of the members of your society may have come across any of the abovementioned McMillan's or could you suggest where I could start? The Tasmanian Archives found the following:

Birth Certificates for 3 children to Alexander and Christina:

- 1 Agnes 65/1862 Launceston
- 2 Wilhelmina 543/1871 Launceston
- 3 Un named male b. 8.12.1864, 1277/1864 presumably John Henry McMillan.

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
ST ANDREWS DAY CEREMONY



IN the mid-1700s Scots could be sentenced to death or transported to Barbados for wearing their traditional Scottish kilts and tartans.

Fortunately the English law which forbade them to wear highland dress was repealed after 35 years in

Yesterday Melbourne's Scottish community celebrated the anniversary of the law's repeal with a blessing or Kirkin O' the Tartan.

Members of 26 clans decked out in full tartan regalia gathered at Scots Church Two members of each clan carried a piece of their tartan into the church to be blessed.

Victoria's Council of Clans chieftan, John Campbell, said the 26 clans represented twothirds of Victoria's clans,

"But this is only the second time we've had the service in Melbourne," he

"Next year there will probably be 30 or 40. They are all sizes from the very big clans like the Campbells and Camerons there's 12 million Campbells in the world — to the other Scottish families like the McPhersons and Urquharts which are much smaller."

Mr Campbell said about 13 per cent of Victorians had Scottish descendants.

The Scots were the largest group in Victoria when the Scots Church was built, Mr Campbell said, but the population

had changed over the years.

He said the ban on tartan stemmed from the days of Bonny Prince Charlie, the pretender to the throne.

"After his unsuccessful rebellion legislation was

passed in Westminster banning Scots from carrying arms and they were not allowed to wear the national garb - anything tartan."

Church moderator, the Rev Norman Pritchard. led the service and was inducted as first Chaplain to the Council of Clans.

"Today the kirkin ex-

presses common traditions, inheritance and shared values and aspirations," Mr Pritchard said.

During the service the new Council of Clans flag, the Saltire, was blessed.

Mr Colin McKenzie donated the flag in memory of his son, Colin Alexander McKenzie, a policeman killed several years ago.
