ANGUS McMILLAN - PATHFINDER (Continued)

We have the dutiful overseer giving to his employer an accurate account of the land discovered by him and calmly contemplating the use of such a large area of land. To-day it embraces many hundreds of properous farms.

They never relied on fences. Natural boundaries and periodical musters were the main forms of stations.

McMillan allowed himself no time to recover from the harrowing journey. Leaving the party at Ensay he immediately proceeded to Monaro. Here he found Lachlan Macalister who was pleased with the account of the overseers near success in reaching Corner Inlet. One thing was clear to the squatters the overseer must not mention his discovery to anyone else.

Macallister wanted to occupy the new country without delay from Monaro to the sea, he would then have a chain of stations embracing Omeo, Ensay and the country to Corner Inlet from which his cattle could be shipped to Tasmania and through which he could obtain supplies along the track from Clifton to Monaro.

Macallister was elated but the attitude to his overseer was a trifle cool, to McMillan he was the employer, the wealthy squatter who had worked his way up from soldiering to a position of strength.

Angus found his attitude condescending and without a full realisation of the hardship and effort his journey must have entailed. He agreed to keep his discovery a secret with the mental reservation that in view of his employers attitude, he would henceforth look to his own situation as well. The last thing they both wanted was a rush of squatters from Monaro pushing South with drays and stock.

This did not prevent McMillan from writing in confidence to a friend in Sydney acquainting him of his discovery and seeking advice. He pointed out that as an overseer on forty pounds a year, he could never hope to succeed unless he took the step of breaking loose and forming his own property. McMillan would need stock and capital. Perhaps this friend could assist in such a matter.

Macallister returned to Clifton after again telling Angus the need to keep his mouth shut, and requesting that McMillan write a full report of the expedition for submission by Macallister on a confidential basis to his bankers and stock agents. Although McMillan kept a copy of his letter it was lost. McMillan told Macallister that with all his friends he could not half stock the new territory with its rich land and good climate.
