FAMILY ROOTS - IAN & GLENDA RUSSELL'S VISIT TO IRELAND & SCOTLAND

When Ian told me he and Glenda(nee McMillan) were going overseas I asked him if he would tell us about their trip. Thank you Ian for the following:

"We flew to Belfast, collected our rental car and drove to Dublin, not wishing to spend time in the former troubled city. An enjoyable few days were spent there taking in places of historic interest particularly Trinity College and viewing the "Book of Kells".

Our travels through the south of Ireland were wonderful in terms of the beautiful scenery as we travelled to Waterford, Cork(kissed the Blarney Stone), Clonakilty(Dromberg Stone Circle circa 100 BC)along roads skirted with brilliant red fuschia hedges. Our route to Kenmare, around the "Ring of Kerry" and the Dingle Peninsula was through breathtaking coastal scenery and emerald green countryside, to Tralee, Limerick, where my maternal forebears lived, was rewarding in that, with the aid of regional Genealogical centre, I located and visited the place Cahercorney where my forebears had lived and worked.

On to County Clare and the magnificient "Cliffs of Moher", Galway, the Connemara National Park and Carremore Megalithic Cemetery(circa 2500 BC) in County Sligo. Donegal and the Fanad Peninsula, bordering the Atlantic has stunning beauty; rugged cliffs abound and wide sandy beaches.

Travelling east along the northern coastline of Antrim we visited the "Giants Causeway" stepped vertical hexagonal columns of stone, pounded by heavy seas.

On to Bushmills, site of the famous Irish Whiskey distillery(est.1608) where we sampled the "Aqua Vitae".

We left this beautiful country and its people by car ferry at Larne for Cairnryan in Scotland.

Our travel northward along the Scottish coast was rewarded with beautiful rugged scenery prior to our destination "Finlaystone" the Clan MacMillan seat at Langbank near Glasgow. It was late in the afternoon when we arrived but we were fortunate in that Graeme Mckenzie, the researcher, was present and kindly showed us around the Clan Centre and the memorial garden. We met Jane MacMillan, wife of Clan Chief George, who spoke warmly of their recent visit to Australia. Fortunately the sun was shining and Finlaystone House, in its setting of sweeping lawns, has provided a lovely photo reminder of the "MacMillan root" to Glenda's family tree.

Our travels subsequently took us to the Isle of Mull and Iona and then to Skye. The visit to Dunvegan Castle was important being the seat of the McLeod's (my paternal grandmother's family). We also visited Idrigil on Skye where Glenda's grandmother(a McKenzie) was born.

The final leg of our journey from Skye was through Spea Bridge, Aviemore, Dufftown, Huntly to Aberdeen. A pleasant few days was spent there with relatives (McLeods) whom we "discovered" in 1978 at Helmsdale on the east coast south of John O Grouts.

In all it was a rewarding, enjoyable three thousand kilometres journey through beautiful countries and meeting warm, friendly people all the way.

Iam sure all our members will enjoy hearing of Ian and Glenda's wonderful journey through Ireland and Scotland finding family roots along the way.
