Hope to see you at one or more of these events.



Judie has sent me a letter about her trip to Scotland in 1998:

"For five and a half weeks I was continually overawed and overwhelmed by all my experiences.

I just felt so lucky. I went to Finlaystone.

George and Jane were so wonderful and invited me to stay for lunch, along with some MacMillans from New Zealand. The next day Graeme Mckenzie and I caught the train to Edinburgh and went to the Records Centre.

I then started two weeks driving around Scotland having lots of terrific adventures. I went to Kilmory to see Castle Sween and the MacMillan Cross. That was fantastic! It was so special to see and touch the Cross and take a

step back into a past age. I travelled to Fort William, Nairn, Balmoral, Inverness, Plockton and Stirling. I found McMillan graves dating back to 1804 in the Clan Cameron graveyard at Fort William. I went to the Lonarch Highland Gathering at Strathdon. It was very special to see the marching of the Clansmen. I went to Crathie Church one Sunday morning when the Queen was in attendance. I found where my Grandfather lived and worked as a young lad in Nairn. I visited the Battlefield at Culloden. I was fortunate to see the Military Tattoo in Edinburgh. I saw many beautiful scenes of lochs, mountains, wildflowers and castle ruins, and I stayed in many excellent B & B's.

I then took a ferry to Mull to meet up with my Earthwatch Team. Eight of us stayed in Ben Doran Cottage, near the village of Bunessan. We all got on really well and worked together for two weeks. We walked miles and miles every day, seeing lots of wonderful sights and wildlife. We collected lots of bird sightings for Dr. Paul Haworth. He was a fantastic leader and friend during our time there". Judie's project was called "Eagles of Mull".

Thank you Judie - Iam glad you had such a wonderful trip. Thank you also for coming to our A.G.M.It was great to meet up with you again.

In every time and place!


The waters lapped the Point of Knap,

So bless each kinfolk's act and thought






