OVERSEAS NEWS

Money In Chancery

Many families have stories passed down through the generations of family fortunes being held in Chancery and waiting to be claimed. This article, which was published in "The Weekly Times" April 21st, may not help you to claim your fortune but it does explain "Money In Chancery."

"The Court of Chancery is the Lord Chancellor's division of the High Court of Justice of England,

Among the responsibilities of this court is the care and supervision of the distribution of the estates of deceased persons and money held in trust generally.

It sometimes happens that it is not clear as to the persons who are entitled to share in the estate of a deceased person or in a trust fund.

The person who has the custody of the money, who may sometimes be the executor or administrator of a deceased estate or the holder of trust funds generally, may apply to the court for directions as to the method for ascertaining the identity of the parties entitled to the money.

Sometimes, especially in respect of old estates or settlements, the money may be or may have been paid into court.

Directions and orders may be made by the court as to the nature and extent of inquiries. This will depend upon the circumstances of the case.

Usually notices are published in newspapers in places where it seems according to the situation of each case relatives of the deceased or other persons who may wish to make a claim upon the funds are likely to receive notice of the inquiries.

I suggest that our reader write to the Secretary, The Law Society, Chancery Lane, London WC2, England.

Set out the name of the deceased person or of the trust fund (if known) and any other relevant particulars including what is known of the family history.

The secretary of the society may be able to refer you to the appropriate officer of the Chancery Division of the High Court of England or to a firm of solicitors in London who may be in a position to assist your inquiry."

Charges by English Record Offices

It seems likely that English County Record Offices could begin charging for their services. At present most Record Offices suggest that a small donation would be appreciated, however, Gloucestershire, North Yorkshire and Devon already charge for any research carried out by their office.

Writing Letters Overseas

When writing letters overseas requesting assistance it is courteous (and often necessary if we expect a reply) to include a self-addressed envelope and return postage. In each letter include at least two International Reply Paid Coupons which are available at your Post Office at 65 cents each. (Postage from Britain for an airmail letter is currently 29 p.)
