Dr Hadden of Walhalla

As told by Irene Arnott

In a little cemetery close by where the old Shady Creek Hotel first stood lie the remains of several that are now forgotten. Near the grave of "Billy" the mailman, who was shot on that eventful evening many years earlier still stands a small tombstone to the memory of the first medical practitioner in Walhalla. Dr. Hadden died in the coach between Brandy Creek and Shady Creek. His death was recorded as suffocation, but on further investigation he appeared to be "Under the influence" and toppled over into the luggage well in the middle of the coach where he suffocated on May 29th 1869 age 47. His sisters in Ireland provided the money for the headstone. There had been a scare and near panic in March 1869. A woman travelling back from Melbourne with her husband and child had taken ill after leaving the coach at Shady Creek. When they reached Walhalla on horseback, she was delirious, and her husband lodged her at the Junction Hotel. Dr. Hadden's diagnosis was smallpox. Next day a public meeting was organised to take steps to prevent the disease spreading. The family escaped from the Junction Hotel during the night and returned to their own cottage further up the main creek. The cottage and its allotment were immediately enclosed within an 8 ft. high fence, with a small hut on either side of a solitary aperture, On each visit, the doctor stripped in the outer hut, stepped through to the inner one and put on old clothes in which he made the visit. He changed again when leaving, and both sheds were regularly soaked in disinfectant. Food and other items were left in the outer hut at regular times. Just as the crises seemed to be easing, the wife died. Four men agreed to bury the body high on the hill directly above the cottage and surround the grave with a high picket fence. The cottage together with all the family belongings was burnt to ashes. Dr. Hadden actually saved the town from a Small Pox outbreak, which could have been dramatic for the small country town

Members Profile

Helen McLennan

When and why did you get started on your family history?

My father's sister together with a cousin in England, in the 1920s, compiled a Gregson family tree dating back to 1590 including all the descendents to about 1915.

After visiting the village in Yorkshire where the family lived for many generations, I gradually became interested in family history, with a view to more personal information than just dates and places of events.

What names are you researching?

With each new find a new name is added. They include Gregson, Minter, Jeffery, Hardinge, Hewlett, Green, Miller, Grant, McLennan, Bone, Meincke, Baker, Bass and many more.

How far back have you searched?

I have verified the family tree to 1590 through records, and other branches to 1735.

Who were your first ancestors to arrive in Australia?

The first McLennan to arrive in 1842 was Donald from Ross-shire, Scotland, who sailed on the "Blanche" into Adelaide. My first ancestor who arrived in Melbourne in 1850 from Folkstone, Kent, was Michael Minter who sailed on the "Brothers" with his wife, four children, a niece and a nephew.

Who is your favourite ancestor?

I don't have a favourite. - I find them all interesting.

What is your most interesting find so far?

Finding on the internet 121 paintings by my grandmother which are in the archives of the State Library.

Another find was an obituary to my, great grandfather in an 1864 Geelong newspaper.

Traralgon Land Sale

Messrs. A. McLean and Co., in conjunction with Marriage, Orr and Co., report having a very successful sale of township and suburban blocks on account of C. R. Wilkes. We submitted about 30 allotments in Franklin-street were secured by the Bank of Australasia, one having 46 feet frontage realising £16 15s per foot, whilst the adjoining block, having 20 feet frontage, made £15 per foot.

Morwell Cattle Market

Messrs. Marriage, Orr and Co report:--Good lot of cattle forward, and good attendance of buyers on account of late rains. We sold several drafts at satisfactory prices. Horses.-- Few forward, draught mare to £26.

Ball In the Mechanics

January 5th 1886

On Boxing night a Ball was held in the Mechanics Institute in aid of the funds of the Morwell Roman Catholic Church, and was in every way a great success. Dancing was commenced shortly after 8 p.m., and was kept up with much spirit till after midnight. Messrs. Lott and Moore supplied the music and Mr. J Rintoull acted as M.C. £15 has been added to the funds of the church.

Morwell and Mirboo Gazette

Tuesday, November 16, 1886

A Most Determined Case of Suicide

Intelligence from Mirboo North, received yesterday morning, reports a most determined case of suicide. A knockabout hand who goes by the name of "Sandy," and employed by Mr. Fitzpatrick, took a dose of strychnine on Sunday afternoon. As he had said goodbye to several friends, and was noticed to be peculiar in his manner, he was watched, and when first found he was suffering severely from the effects of the poison, and strong emeties (sic) were immediately administered. In order to keep the mouth open a bar of iron had to be forced between the unfortunate mans teeth. Although every effort was made to save the mans life, they proved futile, and he gradually sank, dying in great agony about 11.30 p.m. No cause has been assigned for the rash act. It is supposed that deceased was a married man but the whereabouts of his family is not known.

It has since been ascertained that family matters had something to do with deceased destroying his life. It is also stated that he had carried strychnine about with him for 16 years, and had before threatened to commit suicide. Before he expired he said that he would have to die some time, and the present time was as good as any other. An inquest will be held today.

"The inquest found that 'Sandy' was in fact Alexander Roberts, husband of Ann Roberts. They were married in 1854 but had been parted for 5 years. He left behind one son and two daughters.

Described as a quiet, inoffensive man, he was acting as a stableman at Mr. Fitzpatrick's Hotel" Ed.

Opening of the Church of England at Mirboo North

October 12th 1886

The formal opening of the Church of England, Mirboo North, took place on Friday last, (8-10-86) and proved a great success. Service was held in the new building in the afternoon, when the Rev. Canon Watson, of Sale, preached a most impressive sermon to a large congregation. The tea and concert in the evening, were held in the railway goods shed. A most bountiful supply of good things were spread upon the tables, which were presided over by the following ladies. :-- Mesdames Burchell, Ogilvy, Peters, Napier, and Murray, and the Misses, Nicol, Richards, Edwards, Mitchell, Bair, and Scarlett (2). The following ladies also contributed towards the tables:-- Mesdames Ridgeway, Papley, Gibbs and Coupar, and the Misses Leishman (2). A very large number sat down to tea and judging by the manner in which they fell to, it was evident that the long rides had not impaired their appetites. A concert followed, the following programme (sic) being carried out in the most efficient manner. Overture, Pas de Charge, Mrs. Napier and Miss Mitchell; address, Canon Watson; song, Last Rose of Summer, Mrs Williams; song, Grandfathers Chair, Mr. Roughead; song, Darby and Joan, Miss Mitchell; address, Rev. J Caton; song, The Cobbler, Mr. Pullen; reading, a Woman of Mind, Mr. Benn; address, Mr. Vanston; song, Miss Mitchell. Mr. C Ogilvy occupied the chair, and fulfilled the duties pertaining thereto in his usual happy manner. God save the Queen, by the company, bought the proceedings to a close.

We may add that the Church has been erected at the cost of about £200, Mr. Papley being the contractor. The proceeds of the tea and concert are estimated at about £15. As there is still a heavy dept remaining on the church we hope that every assistance will be given to the committee in their endeavors to wipe it off, and we shall at all times be most happy to acknowledge subscriptions received by us on their behalf.

Library News

New to the Library are the following CDs.:

The Sands and Kenny Melbourne Directory 1857 to 1861.

The contents of this disk are viewed through the Netscape program.

The South Australian Marriage Index 1842 to 1912.

This is a Digger based database similar to the Victorian BDM's and is very easy to use. The records also give more details than Victorian Based records such as the location of the marriage and the father of the bride and groom.

Melbourne General Cemetery Transcriptions and Index.

This CD is not a complete record and will be replaced when the records are updated. Every name in a transcription is indexed and so you may find three entries in the index relating to the one headstone.

Wives and Children of Convicts.

This is a small database of Wives and Children of Convicts in New South Wales 1825 to 1840.

Census Index of County Londonderry 1831 and County Cavan 1841.

Census Records: United Kingdom 1851. (part)

This is an index to a small proportion of the census and you may be lucky to find a relative.

1902 Post Office Directory of London. -

There are two CDs in this set and it is a digital reproduction of the original Directory. The CD is very easy to use via Acrobat Reader and should provide a lot of information for researchers for this era.

Vital Records of United Kingdom (updated version 16 CD).

This disk has been donated and replaces the 6 CD set we already have in the library which was damaged. There is a later version of the Viewer (Version 4 instead of Version 2) which enables better searches to be conducted of the 1881 Census.

Vital Records of Western Europe -

This is a 20 CD package with Births Marriages and Christenings for Spain France Germany and other regions in Western Europe. Some of the entries give a lot of information and others only the bare essentials.

Fawkner and Coburg Cemeteries -

We already have the Fawkner Cemetery on Fiche but this is an update and also includes the Coburg Cemeteries.
