BOOLARRA CEMETERY VICTORIA

The recent Gippsland fires at Boolarra came right to the edge of this historic Cemetery. In fact in one area the fire reached inside the boundary fence right up to the first row of the lawn section. The photograph below shows the area affected. On the approach to the cemetery, you must pass along a track where fire fighters must have held the fire back at the road. The regrowth can be clearly seen on the young trees at the left. Happily the rest of the cemetery remained unaffected.



The Boolarra Cemetery Trust has been busy of late erecting a rotunda in the grounds of their cemetery. Mounted on the walls inside are complete listings of the graves along with maps of their positions. That's a really great resource for anyone who's able to travel to Boolarra in the Latrobe Valley area of Gippsland.



WE ARE THE CHOSEN

It goes to respecting their hardships and losses, their never giving in or giving up, their resoluteness to go on and build a life for their family.

It goes to deep pride that they fought to make and keep us a Nation. It goes to a deep and immense understanding that they were doing it for us.

That we might be born who we are, that we might 'remember them'. So we do.

With love and caring and scribing each fact of their existence.

Because we are them, and they are us.

So, as a scribe called, I tell the story of my family.

It is up to that one called in the next generation to answer the call and take their place in the long line of family storytellers.

That is why I do my family genealogy, and that is what calls those young and old to step up and put flesh on the bones.

Your trusted friend had given you so freely of her key And later you went into her flat acting suspiciously Why wouldn't you be noticed with the clothes beneath your dress You would have looked so pregnant underneath all that duress Those who saw you every day must have looked at you askance The bulging waist, massive hump had appeared as if by chance! Then down the stairs you flew at ten to catch the man who pawned To sell, get gain and none suspect before the next day dawned. But Margaret, dear, the clues were there, the evidence was clear You had a key, there were witnesses and you had cause to fear.
