President's Report 2022

As I sit down to write this report we are now in the third year of living with COVID and thankfully I'm pleased to say that we've all come through nicely to this stage. For much of this last 12 months things have been pretty tough with not a lot of people coming through and the very real threat of eviction hanging over our heads. We have been the only group housed in the old library building for the past 15 or 16 months and despite no heating in the building, our dedicated volunteers have opened almost every Wednesday afternoon over that period. We also managed to hold our monthly meetings regularly.

From March last year when we were initially asked to pack up and leave the building, there have been several more requests for us to do so. But as the council had nowhere to put us, we sat tight and finally got some resolution just a month ago. The Latrobe City Council decided to relocate us to premises at 44 Albert St Moe with an initial 12 month lease and a peppercorn rent. They had arranged removalists to shift our collection, and within one week we had moved.

In the four weeks since then our members have worked very hard to set up our allocated rooms - a library, a research room, a small office and a couple of large cupboards. We are very happy with the space and are cautiously hopeful that we will remain here for the foreseeable future. I thank the Latrobe City Council for supporting the Society in this way.

I would also like to thank the Moe Racing Club for the financial support they gave us this past year. It has certainly helped to keep our heads above water.

With the rejuvenated enthusiasm we have experienced as a result of the recent move, I'd like to suggest we have a concerted effort this coming year to think of ways to increase our membership. A first step would be to resume our monthly themed meetings with interesting topics and speakers of interest to our members as well as to the public.

To all of our active members I would like to thank you very very much for the work you have done to keep us afloat during this difficult last couple of years. I have no intention of naming anyone because I think everybody has really chipped in and helped anytime something had to be done. It's been a great group effort.

Sadly our life member and friend Wes Halkett passed away in April this year. He was a valued member of the Society for over 30 years with a special interest in helping others, especially on our Wednesday afternoons. He is always in our thoughts.

Let's look to the next twelve months with optimism, spread the word about the satisfaction in discovering more about your family - and I'm issuing a challenge to members. The challenge??? That each of us recruits and signs up one new member before the 2023 AGM.



CHANGE OF LOCATION:


For the past almost thirty years our Society has operated from a room in the former Moe library, however in early 2021 we received notification that the building would be no longer available for our use. After a very patient wait, we received the news in early July of this year (2022), that the Latrobe City Council approved our relocation to rooms in the building at 44 Albert Street Moe, and provided removalists to transfer the furniture, equipment and resources held and owned by the Society. This assistance was very welcome and much appreciated by our volunteers.

With all hands on deck for the next two weeks, we only closed for one opening day before reopening our Wednesday afternoon sessions. Big thanks to our wonderful members for the time put in over that period.

The space allocated to our group comprises three rooms and two large cupboards. One small room provides office space and a "signing in" area for visitors and guests, the second room is our library room where all books are on shelves and quite readily accessible, and the third larger room we have made into our research room. It's a lovely large light room housing our three computers, printer, photo copiers, filing cabinets and large CD collection. A large vinyl decal family tree wall mural is a welcoming feature of the room. The large cupboards provide space for bulkier items.



MEMBER'S PROFILE:

Peter McNab Secretary



WHEN DID I BEGIN TO TRACE MY FAMILY TREE?

I started documenting the family after my grandmother got me interested while I was in my early teens. My ambition was to make a family tree with thumbnail photos of all the relatives, but that did not work out. When my children went to high school in the 90's they needed family histories for school assignments. I have been adding to my tree ever since.

WHAT DOES MY LAST NAME MEAN?

Macnab is a shortening of the Gaelic Mac an Aba which means Son of the Abbot. McNab is a short form of Macnab.

WHAT GENEALOGY SOFTWARE DO I USE?

I started with Brother's Keeper but switched to Family Tree Maker a long time ago. Every so often, I upload tree onto Ancestry. Sometimes I run Family Tree Analyzer for a different take on my sources.

AM I RELATED TO SOMEONE FAMOUS?

I guess the most famous part of the family is my father's mother's. She was a Nicholson. One branch of the family went into distilling and made enough money to advance to the MCC when they bought Lord's. That family went into politics and appears in various Peerage databases. One of my father's Christian names is Nicholson.

WHAT IS MY FAMILY COAT OF ARMS?



The Macnab's have a clan crest which memorialises a raid by the clan on the neighbouring McNeishes. The Macnabs carried the boat over to a nearby loch then rowed to the stronghold of the McNeishes which was on an island. All the McNeishes bar one boy were killed. The crest shows the head of The McNeish and a rowing boat.

The Macnab family motto can be rendered in Latin and English: "Timor Omnis Abesto" literally "Let fear be far from all" or "Dreadnought."

WHERE DID MY ANCESTORS COME FROM? ETHNICITY

Based on my tree, my ancestors came from Ireland, Scotland, England, and Jersey. Some passed through Canada and India before arriving in Australia. I have a tiny amount of Indian ethnicity on my mother's side, but Ancestry tells me that I also have a similar amount of Philippine ethnicity on my father's side. That has me stumped.

DID YOUR PARENTS NAME YOU AFTER ANYONE? PETER

I always wanted to know the answer to this. I think I was given the name of one of my parents' friends who was killed in WW2. There are no other Peters in our extended family.

WHAT IS YOUR FULL NAME?

Peter John Murdoch McNab. John was my father's grandfather Nicholson's name and also my uncle's. Murdoch was a name given to my grandfather McNab by his father Louis Kossuth McNab. My grandfather gave it to my father who passed it on to me. I can only guess why. Luckily, I did not get Kossuth.

IN WHAT CITY/STATE WERE YOU BORN?

I was born in what was known as the Sanitarium hospital in Wahroonga, Sydney.

WHAT DO YOU REMEMBER ABOUT YOUR GREAT-GRANDPARENTS? DID YOU EVER MEET THEM?

I can remember Francis Coster born 1861. I was her only natural great grandchild. She links me to her husband John Nicholson who was born in 1839. To me she was an old lady in heavy clothes who moved slowly. That may be a learned memory based on a couple of photos.

WHERE DID YOU LIVE AS A CHILD? DID YOUR FAMILY MOVE OFTEN? WHY?

My grandparents on both sides moved from Melbourne to Sydney after the First World War. Grandfather McNab had a good job at Nestlé in Sydney. Grandfather Monkhouse ended up a director of McFarlane & Burns which was a paper converting company that made Tiger brand waxed paper. You may remember them. They had factories in Sydney and Melbourne. After I was born, the family moved to Melbourne while Dad worked in that company. We lived in Glen Iris, and I went to Glen Iris Primary School for a few years. We returned to Sydney when dad got a new job as an accountant in a company that recovered precious metals.

WHAT DID YOU WANT TO DO OR BE WHEN YOU GREW UP?

As a youngster, I thought Astronomy was interesting but in fact I followed both grandfathers. Grandfather McNab was a Chemist or Agricultural scientist and grandfather Monkhouse who worked in the paper industry, so I became a Chemical Engineer in a Paper company.

WONDER WHAT SORT OF DR. HUBBY WAS?

True or not, here's the story of Margorie McCall, the woman who died once, but was buried twice:

After succumbing to a fever of some sort in 1705, Irish woman Margorie McCall was hastily buried to prevent the spread of whatever had done her in. Margorie was buried with a valuable ring, which her husband had been unable to remove due to swelling. This made her an even better target for body snatchers, who could cash in on both the corpse and the ring.

The evening after Margorie was buried, before the soil had even settled, the grave-robbers showed up and started digging. Unable to pry the ring off the finger, they decided to cut the finger off. As soon as blood was drawn, Margorie awoke from her coma, sat straight up and screamed.



The fate of the grave-robbers remains unknown. One story says the men dropped dead on the spot, while another claims they fled and never returned to their chosen profession.

Margorie climbed out of the hole and made her way back to her home.

Her husband John, a doctor, was at home with the children when he heard a knock at the door. He told the children, "If your mother were still alive, I'd swear that was her knock."

When he opened the door to find his wife standing there, dressed in her burial clothes, blood dripping from her finger but very much alive, he dropped dead to the floor. He was buried in the plot Margorie had vacated.

The grave of Margorie McCall, who rose from the grave in Lurgan, Ireland

Margorie went on to re-marry and have several children. When she did finally die, she was returned to Shankill Cemetery in Lurgan, Ireland, where her gravestone still stands. It bears the inscription "Lived Once, Buried Twice."
