#### THE VOYAGE OF THE "GIPSY BRIDE" :

Henry and Hannah Chester from Bendigo wrote home to the family in England on 7th May 1859 and concluded the letter with this poem.

It was written as a song by one of the passengers of the "Gipsy Bride" whilst on the journey.

On the tenth day of December between eight and ten o'clock, The Gipsy Bride she did set sail out of the Princes Dock. With three hundred gallant passengers, a noble crew beside Bound for the town of Melbourne on board the Gipsy Bride.

It was in two days after, her anchor she did weigh, Some of our gallant passengers then gave three cheers that day. Some mourning for their sweethearts as the waves did gently guide And wished they ne'er had come to sea aboard the Gipsy Bride.

She was as fine a vessel as ever crossed the main. Her Captain is Paul Murphy of honour and of fame. He says by boys ne'er be afraid I'll take you o'er the tide And land you safe in Melbourne town from off the Gipsy Bride.

Our mate is called Fitzgerald, a man of noble skill, He does command the sailors and they are at his will. He orders them to go aloft and spread the canvas wide While we are fighting for our grub on board the Gipsy Bride.

The wind did blow fair with us until we crossed the line, And every ship that came in sight we left them far behind. I hope the Lord will prosper us, he is our only guide. And land us safe in Melbourne town, from off the Gipsy Bride.

Hoe to conclude and finish, I hope we shall live long And if we ever meet in Melbourne, I'm sure we'll have a song. We'll fill our glasses to the brim, no matter what betide, And drink a health to all that came on board the Gipsy Bride.

#### South Australian Records :

Information quoted on Birth, Death and Marriage Certificates :-

BIRTH: Name, Date, Parents' names including maiden name, Gender, Place, Father's occupation.

MARRIAGE: Names, Ages or full age, Date, Place including denomination, Father's name (after 25/8/1856), Occupations, Residences.

DEATH: Name, Age, Date, Place, Occupation, Sender, Cause of death.

Cost of certificates has risen to \$13.00 in South Australia. Further indexes to S.A. Marriages and Deaths up to 1913 have been released.

#### Queensland Certificates :

Queensland certificates are now \$14.50 for a typed certificate, \$20.00 for a photocopy plus \$7.50 for a five year search and a further \$5.00 at the same time, for a ten year search.

#### New Zealand Certificates :

Certified copies are now \$14.00 NZ but remain \$5.00 for photocopied entries if details are supplied.



## LIST OF WANTS ON NORFOLK ISLAND - 5TH. OCTOBER, 1795. :

A clergyman; cattle and sheep; 1500 men and women in proportion; artificers of all kinds much wanted; flaxdressers, weavers and ropemakers; looms and other necessary utensils for flax dressing; weaving and rope-making - none on the island; cloathing for men, women and children; combs, large and small; seives for cleaning wheat; LIST OF WANTS ON NORFOLK ISLAND - 5TH. OCTOBER, 1795. cont.

tools of all kinds for agricultural purposes; lead; grindstones; iron pots; stationary; boulting-cloths; very much wanted; a printing-press of a small size, with materials; nails of all sorts are much wanted; necessaries for the sick and medicaments (particularly ipecacuanha) are very much wanted.
