# The Gippsland Mailman contributed by J. G. Rogers (continued from the April newsletter)

Police Report 13-July-1865

"Mounted Constable O'Connor reports that the Flinn Creek Bridge has been washed away by floods. Most of the Morwell Bridge has been carried away, while the Traralgon Bridge has been carried bodily from the Traralgon side. The mail was obliged to be brought over the back-water by 'tub'. Norris the Mailman was reported drowned, but it was later proven that he had remained at the Moe."

The Times of 25-July-1865 described the washing away of the bridges and the conveyance of the mails over the Morwell River in a hollow log or 'dug out'.

Cyrus Hewitt's plan for an accelerated mail service from 1st Aug 1865 proved successful, and a month later a still more desirable consummation achieved, which enabled the pack-horse to be dispensed with altogether.

The new Coach Road through the forest was opened!

The conditions of contract were a daily mail from Melbourne to Sale in 36 hours for an 18 month term to cost £5,000.

The coaches were only able to run after a track through dense scrub between Shady Creek and Bunyip, to the south of the old cattle route, the most impenetrable part of the forest for several miles being at or near the present Warragul.

1866 - electric telegraph rates - Melbourne to Sale, ten words for 3/-., each additional word 2d.

Steps were taken to get a Telegraph Office at Rosedale

Charles Dennis, an old soldier who had lost an eye at the battle of Inkerman in 1853, took over the Traralgon Post office from Duncan Campbell in 1867. He was also the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages, and the Mining Registrar.

Police Report - 18th March, 1867 - Telegraph Office opens at Rosedale.

So much for the Telegraph lines. They were constantly broken, either from tree limbs, high winds, or bushfires. A line repairer was constantly moving along the length of the line to locate the break & repair same. One worked from Sale, and the other from Melbourne.

Mercury - 1st Sept., 1870 - reports on the dreadful state of the Gippsland Road, and a request to the Telegraph Department for a Telegraph Station & Post office to be erected at Shady Creek with the least possible delay, at the spot known as the Junction Hotel, near Shady Creek - this would be a boon to Gippslanders, especially to cattle drovers, and to the large mining population settled at Crossover, Russell Creek and the Tanjil Diggings.

1870, Robertson & Wagner (agents for Cobb & Co.) were now running the Melbourne to Sale Coach Line, taking over from Cyrus Hewitt. They had offered a bulk tender for 97 mail services at £50, 270.

Mr Hodder of the Sale Telegraph Office was appointed as Postmaster & line repairer at the Shady Creek Telegraph Office, which opened in Jan. 1871.

#### The Gippsland Mailman (cont)

Mercury - 29 May, 1875 -

A contractor talking of tendering for the mail contract from Traralgon to Walhalla was to put in a good price, as he feels sure he will have to supply a boat to carry the mails across the morass.

Mr Thomas Clark of Toongabbie was the successful tenderer.

By 1880, most places had an official Post Office or Telegraph Office, and the steam train had in alot of places superceded the coach lines, except in the mountain regions and back country.

The next time you receive an old certificate from the 1850s and 1860s in the mail, think to yourself the hazardous trip that that certificate had when it was originally delivered.

The Society's extensive microfiche publications include Parish Register Transcripts, 1851 Census Transcripts, Monumental Inscriptions, Owners of land 1873, Electoral Registers 1875.

#### LEGAL DEPOSIT

So, You are planning to publish a "book, periodical such as a newsletter or annual report, newspaper, piece of sheet music, map, paln chart, table, catalogue, brochure or pamphlet".

Remember that under Commonwealth and Victorian law, you are required to deposit a copy of that publication in The National Library and the State Library of Victoria. (The other States have similiar legislation).

According to "Legal Deposit in Australia" (3rd edition), "a work is deemed to have been published if reproductions of the work or edition have been supplied (whether by sale or otherwise) to the public."

## TRIPPING AROUND THE TRACKS compiled by Jean McNally

Whilst reading thorugh all the "swap" newsletters, I noticed that there are a few indexes being made and, as everybody knows these can be very helpful.

From the Peninsula Past Times, Mornington. May 94. no. 55: Mrs Anne Ranse of "Lamont", 6 Lindrum Crt, Holt, ACT. 2615. is compiling a list of as many names as is possible of internments between 1895 and 1942 at Kenmore Hospital Cemetery, Goulburn NSW. If you have a relative buried in this cemetery, Anne Ranse would be delighted to hear from you.

Bellarine Historical Society - Pioneer Register. This Society is compiling a register of early pioneer families who lived on the Bellarine Peninsula before 1900. Very similiar to our Gippsland one.

The Echuca Group are in the process of making as complete a list as possible of internments in the Moama, NSW cemetery. If you have any information regarding this cemetery, especially Death certificates, Echuca would be delighted to hear from you.

Mrs Joyce Holmes, Rmb 5300, Terang 3264 is keen to record burials in the Terang Cemetery from 1839 on. The Register starts in 1868 so there is quite a gap to fill.

Another index in the making is being done by Mrs Andrea C. Hunter, PO Box 1208, Tennant Creek, NT 0861. This index is for the Dunolly & BetBet Shire newspaper and so far has covered 1865-1869. She has offered a mail service for a fee of \$2 plus a SSAE for each name enquiry. If you wish a printout of the article send \$1 and a second SSAE; you can access the films yourself at the Bendigo PRO, or the newspaper room of the State Library.

#### TRIPPING AROUND THE TRACKS (cont)

The Irish BDM Indexes (Ireland 1845-1921) and Eire (1864-1921) are available at the LDS at Cathies Lane, Wantirna. The 1891 Census on microfiche is also there.

THE AIGS have recently acquired new premises opposite the Railway Station in Railway Rd., Blackburn. The big move took place on the Queen's birthday weekend earlier this month.

From The Scots Ancestry Group, Vol. 5, no.'s 1 & 2: State Library Centre: The new room 'and a bit' to house the genealogical material from around the State Library is now in operation, with some bookshelves empty, but five computers, twenty-one microfiche readers, two printers and all the records. Some people say that its a bit of a squeeze when everyone turns up.

Missed OPRs: There are 31,000 OPR's missed entries on order. Maybe that missing ancestor will be amongst these ones. GSV now have these extra entries and they will soon become available in the Library.

Also in the Scottish Ancestry newsletter, there is an interesting article on historic families of Scotland, as well as an article on Celtic Art.

The Glascow & West of Scotland FHS has indexed the 1851 census for Govan, all ten parishes of Glascow City, all eight areas of Barony and three of the four areas of Gorbals, with only Laurieston remaining to be completed. The index, with 342, 443 entries, is held on computer and the Glascow & West of Scotland FHS accept postal enquiries for which they ask a donation of at least £3 per surname searched from non-members plus a large SAE. AS there are many names listed, please send as much information as possible about the family you are looking for, as this will help find the entry
