

BOOK LAUNCHING

On Sunday 15th August, 50 people, including many members, attended the launch of the book, Lonely Graves of the Central Gippsland Goldfields and Greater Gippsland at Gippsland Heritage House in Maffra.

Written by Gaye Rogers and Nelly Hellyar, the book details the stories of over 700 lone graves, showing the everyday fact of death and the drama of tragedy in nineteenth century Gippsland.

The book contains a wealth of carefully researched biographical and genealogical information about early Gippslanders. The authors have used contemporary newspaper and police reports to background many of the people.

Detailed maps clearly illustrate the localities covered; drawing and photographs of graves and grave sites are liberally sprinkled amongst the entries.

Lonely Graves of the Gippsland Goldfields and Greater Gippsland is an informative reference book. It is written in flowing readable style.
