

MEMBER'S PROFILE
MARY GEORGE

My interest in family history began when Dawn Cowley spoke to the Probus Club of Moe, to which both my husband, Lindsey, and I belong.

Our family of five were all grown up, married with their own families, or just moved to their own homes, and I thought family history was something that I could make a new part of my life.

My great great grandfather, Malen Rumbelow, his wife Alice and their 8 children came from England, arriving here 9th October, 1854. I have a copy of his diary covering the day to day events on the 112 day journey. I have also a photograph of Malen and Alice believed to have been taken at the time. They settled in Victor Harbour, S. A., and their descendants still live there today.

I am also searching the Cakebread, Schonfelder, Matcott and Reid Families of South Australia. I feel that my immediate ancestors are of interest as my mother, Martha Ivy Schonfelder, and my father, August William Reid, were first cousins. So, as well as being the daughter of my parents, I am also their second cousin.

Sally Shine has been very helpful in tracing my Schonfielder Family, who went to New Zealand. I am very grateful to her.

I was born in Carlton, lived in Yarragon for 10 years, Since then, I have always lived in the Moe Newborough area, except for 10 years on a farm at Erica.

I am a member of the Mid-Gippsland Family History Society and also the Genealogical Society of Victoria.

POSTMAN'S PARK

To the east of the General Post Office in London, is Postman's Park, which was opened in 1880, and is made up of the churchyard of St Leonards, Foster Lane, St Botolphs, Aldersgate and the graveyard of Christchurch, Newgate.

Its name derives from the fact that it is opposite the offices of the GPO. In a sheltered area on the west side of the park are many plaques, placed there to commemorate men, women and children who sacrificed their lives so that others might live. This idea of a memorial was conceived by Mr G. F. Watts, English painter and sculpter, in 1887.

ROYAL IRISH CONSTABULARY INDEX

This index, compiled by Janet Reakes & friends, combines RIC records into one index showing name, age, county of birth, marital details and reference number for access to the complete document. The index also includes whether or not the person emigrated, sometimes indicating country: 'emigrated to USA'.

The index included over 80,000 entries, and had to be split into two parts: 1816-1881 and 1882-1921.

Janet Reakes commented on the number of non-Irish applicants (from Kuala Lumpur, Arabia, Brazil, Australia, NZ, USA, France etc.) who appear in the second part of the index.

The index is held by the LDS library in Traralgon.



MATTHEWS FAMILY REUNION GARFIELD PUBLIC HALL 12 MARCH 1995

James Matthews married 10/4/1831 at Paul, Cornwall to Margery Matthews. They arrived in Geelong on the Andromache 8/11/1848 with their six children: James (16), Margaret Jane (15), John (11), Josiah (9), William Henry (5), and Mary Martha (2). Three more daughters were later added to the family: Elizabeth Beaden (1851), Annie Maria (1854) and Emily (1856).

James, the son, married Susannah Johns in 1858. They had 14 children and eventually selected at Benambra. Margaret Jane married John Nicholas, a Cornish cousin, in 1853. They had 12 children and eventually selected at Poowong. This farm 'Trevithal' still belongs to a Nicholas descendant.

John Matthews was a carpenter and in 1861 married Mary Ann Ray Green. Nothing more is known of this couple. Nothing is known of Josiah Matthews. It is thought that he possibly went to N.S.W. William Henry was a miner and was married at Ballarat in 1867 to Jane Facey. There were four daughters born, but nothing more is known of this family.

Mary Martha moved to Newcastle where she married Edward Bartley in 1869. They had 8 sons and 2 daughters. Elizabeth Beaden was also married at Newcastle in 1871 to George William Davies. Their 8 children were all born under the name Davis. Annie Maria married in 1879 to James Ford. They had 6 sons and lived in the Devenish district of Northern Victoria. Emily was married in 1878 to John Richard Webber. They had 10 children and lived in the Geelong area.

A reunion is planned for March 12th in Garfield Public Hall.

Glad Macreadie is a great grand daughter of Jane Nicholas, the second child
