OBITUARY.

DEATH OF MR JOHN QUIGLEY

It is with extreme regret that we have to chronicle the death of another old and well-known pioneer of the district, in the person of Mr John Quigley, which sad event took place suddenly at his late residence, Yinnar, on Tuesday last.

Deceased appeared to be hale and hearty and in his usual jovial spirits on Saturday last, when he was present at the football match between Yinnar and Hazelwood, and was cracking heartily for the home team. His death, which was due to heart failure, cast quite a gloom over the township and district.

Deceased, who was 75 years of age, was a native of Ireland, and came to the colony when quite a young man. He was possessed of the traits of character recognised in Irishmen,

and as a result was a man of courage, energy, and even daring, with a desire to do well and be independent. It was this that induced him over thirty years ago to set out with wife and family for the unknown "wilds" of Gippsland.

They endured the usual hardships of those days in setting to their destination, but thought nothing of that. It would have taken a good deal more than the difficulties encountered--and they were many-to have frightened the old pioneers of Mr and Mrs Quigley's stamp. There was not a house or even a hut in Morwell when Mr Quigley, however, was far seeing, and surmising the possibility of the railway station being placed somewhere about where it stands at present, decided to open a store and public house close by.

He then put up the first building erected in Morwell, on the site now occupied by the Club Hotel. The laying down of the railway river was shifted along, and this led to having the progressed the camp at the river was shifted along, and this led to Mr Quigley doing a "roaring" trade.

He, however, saw an opportunity of selecting some fine land near Yinnar, then known as Scrubby Forest, and decided to relinquish business and go upon the land.

He was succeeded in the business by Mr E Kelleber, who still owns the property. In 1880 Mr Quigley was made a Justice of the Peace, but in opening a store and wine licence at Yinnar had to relinquish the office of J.P. in order to secure the wine licence.

The business was successfully carried on for many years by Mr and Mrs Quigley and members of the family until it was taken over by Mr McKendry, some 7 or 8 years ago.

At the same time Mr Quigley was much interested in land. dairying, and cattle raising, and leaves behind him some of the finest land in Gippsland. He was a shrewd and cautious buyer

and in all his transactions proved his keen foresight and business abilities.

He was always of a most cheerful and happy disposition, charitably disposed, and a kind friend to many. His cheery smile and hearty welcome will be missed by all with whom he came in contact.

He leaves a widow and large family, all of whom are grown up, and some married, among whom are Mrs Jas Jansen, of Driffield, Mrs W Bolger, of Hazelwood, and Mrs Walsh, Kyogle, for all whom much sympathy is expressed in their sad bereavement!

The remains of the deceased were interred in the Hazelwood cemetery yesterday, the funeral cortege being one of the largest witnessed in the district. The Very Rev. E J Coleman officiated at the grave, and the mortuary arrangements were carried out by Mr W Tulloch.

The French Revolutionary Calendar

by Hans Rollman (St John's Newfoundland, Canada - (adapted from Albert Soboul: Die Grosse Franz. Revolution [1983]

The French Revolution or Revolutionary Calendar is of some significance for genealogists in that it was used not only in the French official records for the years 1793 - 1805, but also in the German territories to the left of the Rhine, including by parish priests in their baptismal, marriage and burials.

- 1. The calendar was officially used from 22 Sept. 1793 (= Vendemiaire II) until the end of the year 1805.
- 2. The Republican year started always on 22 September (Georgorian) and came to a close after 12 months (of 30 days) on 16th September of the following (Georgorian) year.
- 3. The remaining 5 days (from 17-21 Sept. [Gregorian]) were added as: "jours sansculottides" 1 [17 Sept], 2 [18 Sept], 3 [19 Sept], 4 [20 Sept], 5 [21 Sept].
- 4. During the leap years 1796, 1800, 1804, an additional "jour complementaire" was added.

Months:

Vendemiaire (1-30) = 22 Sept-21 OctBrumaire (1-30) = 22 Oct-20 Nov Frimaire (1-30) = 21 Nov-20 Dec = 21 Dec-19 Jan Nivose (1-30) Pluviose (1-30) = 20 Jan-18 Feb Ventose (1-30) = 19 Feb-20 Mar Germinal (1-30) = 21 Mar-19 Apr = 20 Apr-19 May Floreal (1-30) = 20 May-18 Jun Prairial (1-30) Messidor (1-30) = 19 Jun-18 Jul Thermidor (1-30) = 19 Jul-17 Aug Fructidor (1-30) = 18 Aug-16 Sep Jours sanculottides = 17 Sep- 21 Sep (don't forget the Jour compenentaire in the leap years 1796, 1800 and 1804)
