CENSUS RECORDS

notes of a Janet Reakes seminar taken by Jill Cain

Scottish Census records are virtually the same as the English and Wales Census Records, with the main difference being additional information contained in the later Scottish Census Records - eg:

how many children go to school
how many rooms in the house had windows (they
had a window tax)
are you employed or an employer
Can you speak Gaelic?

Most Scottish women retained their maiden name, so it is not uncommon to find a married women listed on the Census under her maiden name.

The 1891 Census is available on microfilm, not on microfiche.

IRELAND CENSUS RECORDS: The earliest census for Ireland was taken for Ulster in 1636. It names the large landlords & the names of the men who could produce in times of need. No ages were given, but it is assumed that the men were aged between 16 and 50.

1652: South County Down inhabitants were listed in a census by area. Personal descriptions, relationships ages.

1654-6 List of Landlords

1659: Census of Ireland. This was published by the Dublin Stationery Office in 1939. It gives only names of landowners & the total number of English and Irish residents on the townlands. - Cavan, Galway, Mays, Wicklow and Tyrone Counties not included.

1664, 1665, 1666: Some of the Hearth Money Rolls for these years survive, and lists the names of the householder & the number of hearths on which he was taxed.

1740: Lists of Protestant householders in the Counties of Antrim, Armagh, Donegal, Londonderry & Tyrone. Not printed although a partial index and typed copy exists. Only lists names of householders. Available at the Genealogical Office, Dublin Castle.

CENSUS RECORDS (cont)

1749: most of Roscommon, part of county Sligo & nine parishes in Galway. Heads of households, occupations, religion & number of their children. Number, sex and religion of servants; occasionally the wife's name. Unindexed and held at the Public Records Office

1799: detailed census of Canick-on-Sien, County Tipperary, arranged by street, given names, age, religion, occupations of 10,901 inhabitants together with relationship to the head of the house.

1821: Majority destroyed except parishes A-T in county Meath, parishes A-D in county Offialy (Kings), parishes A-R in county Fermanagh, parishes A-M in county Cavan. Names all members of family, ages, occupations and relationships.

1821, 1831,1841,1851, 1901: available through the LDS genealogical libraries.

1848-1864: listed under Grif fith's Valuation Records, available through LDS libraries.

1901: Earliest record for the whole of Ireland. Information supplied very good.

CHECK AT LDS LIBRARIES. Most census are on microfilm. Use the FAMILY HISTORY CATALOGUE for IRELAND - CENSUS.

AUSTRALIA CENSUS RECORDS Australian census records do not survive as it is government policy to destroy the information after it has been obtained and analysised.

Pre-federation Censuses which do exist are listed in Janet Reakes' book titled Census & Musters

"O'KEEFE, Michael Joseph (42 years). O'Keefe was a miner. The cause of his death on 25th October 1911 was due to phthisis.

O'Keefe was born and raised at Red Jacket on the Jordan, son of the late Ann Lanigan and Michael O'Keefe of the Jordan Hotel, Red Jacket. His parents were among the first to be issued with a hotel licence on the Jordan goldfields. John, an older brother and mine owner was the informant of death.

Michael O'Keefe was survived by his wife, Annie McIntyre, and three children, Annie, Margaret and Thomas William."

WOOD POINT CEMETERY 1863-1920 & transcriptions

Woods Point on the Great Dividing Range situated within the North Gippsland goldmining district of Victoria was an important mining town during the 19th and early part of the 20th Century.

The cemetery records were destroyed along with the town of Woods Point in the 1939 Black Friday bushfires. Fortunately, most tombstones survived and in time the town was rebuilt.

Using information obtained from the headstones, obituaries, and newspaper records, this new publication reconstructs the stories of no less than 640 people interred in the cemetery.

Included are two historic maps of Woods Point and a locality map. Also included is information about the cemetery, a short history of the area, some photographs and sketches of tombstones, statistics relating to causes of death and definitions of medical terminology.

Anyone with an interest in Woods Point history, or those with ancestors buried at Woods Point Cemetery, or alternatively those interested in genealogy or family history will find this publication a useful addition to their library.
