


Waanyarra Historic Cemetery

The first rush to this area occurred in 1853 and brought with it deaths from mining accidents, illness and disease. The oldest surviving marked grave in this historic cemetery is that of John Gibson Brown, who died on October 10th, 1859. The recorded history of this rich gold-mining region indicates, however, that many burials must have taken place prior to this date.

Before the introduction of wooden coffins it was usual to enclose a body between two sheets of bark for burial. Local identity Mr Cheetham is credited with making the first wooden coffin used here. It was made for the burial of a child.

Initially the cemetery was situated to the south of this site, but seasonal flooding of Jones' Creek resulted in it being moved to this higher ground.

When Phillip Chauncey surveyed this area in 1861 a reserve for a cemetery was marked out on the north side of the Dunolly to Tarnagulla road, west of this site. The site, however, was not favoured by local residents and was never used.



These people organised the butials and kept the cemetery in good condition for many years. It was totally funded by public subscription, but as time passed and the population of the area declined, money dried up and the public interest in maintaining the cemetery made the task of the Trustees very difficult and they resigned their positions. A new team of Trustees unsuccessfully attempted to rekindle community support and the cemetery closed officially in 1891.



Despite its official closure, local fiamilies continued to use the cemetery for many years without permission, preferring to be buried in fiamily graves in the district in which they had lived for most of their lives.

As far as can be ascertained, Mrs Deborah Chapple (nee Corrie) is the only person to have gained official permission to be buried here since its official closure. Debbie, as she was affection-

ately known, had been a tireless worker for the maintenance of this cemetery:

The Shire of Bet Bet became the Tirustees of the Wianyarra cemetery in 1965 and receives annual grants for its maintenance.

Since 1988 an informal group, The Families and Friends of Waanyarra, has dedicated itself to maintaining the historic significance of the area. They placed the bronze plaque recording the names of those buried here without a marker and have cooperated with the Tarnagulla Recreation Parks Committee, the Bet Shire and its Development and Tourism Committee in the erection of this signboard and in the renewal of the front fience and gates.

The NEW hours of opening will be: 9.00 am to 4.30 pm, Monday, Tuesday and Friday 9.00 am to 6.00 pm, Wednesday and Thursday.

Further information about the move will be provided, in our search rooms and on our homepage (http://www.vicnet.net.au/~provic/).

Staff from both the Public Record Office and Australian Archives will work together in the joint reading room to provide an advisory service about the holdings of both institutions. The full range of services of both institutions will continue to be offered and researchers will be able to request access to records of both the PRO or Australian Archives on the one visit.

While the search room advisory service will be a shared operation each institution will remain a separate entity governed by its own legislation and existing differences in certain procedures and fees will continue.

SACRED GROUND

It was during a recent visit to Glasgow, Scotland that I came upon them. There they were, laid out at the fork of a road in three neat rows. There was an even dozen and they looked spic and span in their white granite surface with the readily identifiable A.I.F. insignia set into the centre top of the stone.

I'm talking about the last resting place of 12 Australian Army personnel, all except one from the First World War.

It all started with my younger sister's retirement in Glasgow some two years ago. As a retirement hobby, she decided to take up family history, Later, with my elder sister, she decided to track down the burial of some ancestors. Their investigations lead them to a cemetery in Glasgow that carries the grand name of the Western Necropolis, St. Kentigerns, Lamhill, Glasgow

The first visit to the Necropolis struck gold, with the help of the local gravedigger (what wonderful people they are when you are looking for information about *their cemetery*.), they soon found the last resting place, complete with headstone, of my maternal grandparents and two of their infant children. To the family history buff, this was like winning Lotto, well almost.

We certainly felt like a rather large hole in our "tree" had been partially filled [since this discovery, we have found another grave with the headstone going back to 1825, this time in the Greenoch area of Scotland, so it's all happening].

All this happened just before my wife and I arrived in Glasgow on 28th June 1996. We didn't waste much time visiting the Necropolis - the next day, the 29th June it was into my relatives' car and off to see my grandparent's headstones.

It was while we drove along the road leading to the main entrance, and took the left road at the fork that I immediately recognised the A.I.F. insignia set into the somewhat standard war grave headstone.

My shout of "stop" shook my brother-in-law, the driver, to the core as he jammed on the brakes - he thought I had just spotted his rear wheel rolling past us. There were no car problems. It was just that I wanted to get out and look over this little piece of Australian war history set in the midst of a huge Glasgow cemetery so far from home.

I couldn't find out any details of how these troops ended up in Glasgow, so I thought the best thing to do was to take down the details of the headstones, and follow it back up in Australia. So to this end, I have much pleasure in presenting this information through the Mid-Gippsland Family History Group newsletter.

In conclusion, let me say that all the graves are well looked after, and with the soft Scottish rain falling on them will remain ever green.

ON THE RIDGE - The Shire of Mirboo 1884-1994 by John Murphy

Mirboo has never known in which direction to look - to the north towards the La Trobe Valley where the main railway line went to Melbourne, or to the south and the large towns of Leongatha and Korumburra.

Early settlers found the soil rich and the rainfall good, but the task of clearing the land for grazing a challenge because of the steep terrain, untouched forest, heavy undergrowth and long wet winters.

This book tells their story - of the changes that occurred with the coming of the railhead to Mirboo North, the wars and the depletion of the male population, the development of road transport, the selfsufficiency of the people who lived away from other main centres of population on the highways, the companionship of neighbours in hard times, the smaller centres which have never become big towns.

The index of names would fascinate those who were interested in Mirboo families.

My personal interest was in the families that immigrated as a group from Elaine in 1878. This timing would have coincided with the end of the gold at Steiglitz in the Brisbane Ranges, just near the town of Elaine on the Midland Highway. My maternal grandmother was born at Steiglitz, then lived and married at Elaine.

Inquiry into the Public Record Office

s the Public Bodies Review Committee, which conducted the inquiry into the operations of the Public Record Office, was not reconstituted after the election the Public Accounts and Estimates Committee was requested to finalise the work and to table the report at the Spring Session of

Parliament.

Many of the Inquiry's recommendations are being implemented, particularly with regard to the establishment of a new records centre, for which \$20 million has been allocated, and the development of a government wide policy for the management of electronic records.

The Institute offers a search service of these indexes 1837–1940. For just \$5.00 the Institute wall search a nominated date, plus one year either side—total of three years. Send your research request to St. Catherine's Search Service with the mime and the nominated search date (there is no refund for a nil search).

ENGLISH & WELSH BIRTH DEATH & MARRIAGE CERTIFICATES

We offer a courier service to St. Catherine's House. Reference information from the St. Catherine's House Index is all that is required — Cost \$26.00 posted to your address.

UNRELATED CERTIFICATES

The AIGS Unrelated Certificates Index is comprised of Birth, Death & Marriage Certificates which members have donated to the Library. It covers many thousands of names. A transcript of a certificate can be supplied for \$5.00 per name. The AIGS Unrelated Certificates Index on microfiche is available for sale for \$12.00.

ENGLISH & WELSH PROBATES (Somerset House) 1858-1934

Two services are offered on these Wills and Administrations.

- A five year search service: you supply a person's name and the year of death and we will search that year and the next four years for \$5.00.
- (2) A courier service for the Will/Administration posted to your address; \$8.00 for one name, \$6.00 for each additional name. Probate films and applications forms are available in the Library. Please include an SAE.

PCC WILLS 1750-1857

Two services are offered on these Wills which are not as straightforward to search as the later ones.

- A five year search service: you supply a person's name and the year of death and we will search that year and the next four years for \$10.00.
- (2) A courier service for the Will posted to your address: \$14.00. PCC films and applications forms are available in the library. Please include an SAE.

STERLING CHEQUE SERVICE

Do you require a Sterling Cheque to renew or join an English Society or purchase books etc? The Institute offers a Sterling Cheque service for amounts up to £100.00 for a fee of only \$4.00.

AIRMAIL STAMPS

International Genealogical Index (IGI)

Social Security Death Index (USA only)*
Military Index (USA only)*

Ancestral File

LDS Locality Catalogue

THE IGI: Using the IGI data base, records for the entire British Isles or Canada etc. as a whole can be examined or searched by an individual country or country. It can be searched by using either the Marriage and Christening Index or the Parent Index. The Marriage and Christening Index is arranged in the same format as the IGI on microfiche. The Parent Index contains the same information as the Marriage and Christening Index but is arranged into families, enabling you to identify children you may have previously overlooked.

ANCESTRAL FILE: The Ancestral File contains genealogies which have been submitted by researchers to the LDS.

LOCALITY CATALOGUE: This is used to locate the information that is available through the LDS e.g. Church, Census, History, Taxation Records etc.

THE SOCIAL SECURITY DEATH INDEX and MILIT.ARY INDEX (USA only): This will be of particular interest to researchers looking for later records in the USA. The Social Security Death Index covers deaths reported to the Social Security administration from 1937 through to 1988. The Military Index has two parts, the Korean War and the Vietnam War Veterans. *(The USA Social Security Death Index and the Military Index are not available for searching in the AIGS Library—information is available only by postal enquiry.)

The Institute offers a research service for FAMILY SEARCH on CD-ROM for Family Historians who are unable to attend our Library or any LDS Family History Centre.

For up to a maximum of ten family names, we will provide a computer printout of any available information or will download the information to disc. (For information downloaded to disc this service is restricted to the IGI section of Family Search.)

Cost for this service is \$15.00 per hour. Please send an SAE to AIGS for our research application form.

All these services are carried out by the experienced members of our Research Team who are all volunteers.

Improved access to probate records

equesting wills and probate records has never been easy and is time consuming. The difficulty lies in working out in which series and then in which box [unit] of that series the document you want is stored.

In an attempt to simplify and speed up the process we have developed an electronic data base

which will be introduced into all of our searce rooms in January 1997.

Once a file number for an estate has been obtained from the Probate Index the next step using the computer provided in the search room will be to type in the file number. The Public Record Office series (VPRS) and unit numbers for the files for the estate will appear on the screen
