## PRESIDENTS' ANNOUNCEMENTS

- President Grant announced that because he is away for the next meeting, Deputy President PP Don will be Acting.
- The note in Bulletin No. 2 about the skate park may have given the impression that the Rotary Clubs of Sale were committed to spend \$100K on the project. This is not the case. Such an amount is well beyond the means of the two Clubs.
- Lyndon represented the RC of Sale at the Seaspray Surf Life Saving Club.
- Rotarian and former RC of Sale member, Alan Gamble, passed on his best wishes to the Club.
- Grant reminded Board members there is a meeting on Wednesday at Daniel's office starting at 1700 hours.

Guest Speaker: Don Ripper – Rotary Youth Exchange

Neil briefly introduced the speaker for the meeting, Don Ripper, whose topic was Rotary Youth Exchange.

Don used a Power Point presentation to illustrate his points and commenced by informing members that Rotary Youth Exchange is the oldest of the youth exchange programs and one of Rotary's oldest programs. It is a most powerful force in the promotion of international understanding and over 8,000 students take part each year. The program was started in 1927 and today 82 countries continue to take part.

Participants in the program are high school-aged students who have not completed their secondary school studies. There are long-term (1 year, hosted by 3 – 4 families) and short-term (6 weeks, family to family and only to New Zealand) exchanges. As the aim of the program is to promote international fellowship, students are selected on their capacity to be an ambassador for their community, the Club that selected them and their country and not just on their scholarly abilities.

Students are expected to meet their own airfare as well as some other financial commitments but normal living expenses and accommodation are provided by the host parents who are also expected to take on the role of parenting.

Rotary looks after the logistics, including schooling, at Club (host and sponsoring) and District level. This year District 9820 has 14 exchange students abroad but in its heyday 32 exchange students took part in one year.

In his concluding remarks, Don indicated that Rotary Youth Exchange is a very worthwhile program and that the host parents do not need to be Rotarians.

Don's presentation initiated a number of questions. Col asked why in the program there is not a direct swap. Don pointed out that this is not always possible as an outgoing student's parents may not be suitable hosts or be in a position to host another student. Neil commented that as a former host parent he did feel the responsibility but with children still at home there was no extra commitment. In response to Mike's question, Don reiterated that suitable hosts may be

found in the community who are not Rotarians and he named two or three families in Sale who had done so in the past. Don said that a number of other service clubs and organisations have international student exchange programs. When Don mentioned that the Sale Club began its exchange program in 1963, Emu suggested that since then many things have changed and that the need for such programs may no longer exist. Don pointed out that Sale Central currently hosts a Japanese student and Adrian told of the Latrobe Valley girl who had experienced Indian culture for a year. David C. commented that for the Club to host a student it needs full commitment but that our hearts don't seem to be in it.

Chairman Neil then called on President Grant to thank Don. Grant did this and said that the possibility of hosting a student in partnership with Sale Central would be discussed at the Board meeting

## About Rotary

Rotary is a worldwide organization of business and professional leaders that provides humanitarian service, encourages high ethical standards in all vocations, and helps build goodwill and peace in the world. Approximately 1.2 million Rotarians belong to more than 32,000 clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas.

Rotary club membership represents a cross-section of the community's business and professional men and women. The world's Rotary clubs meet weekly and are nonpolitical, nonreligious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds.

The main objective of Rotary is service — in the community, in the workplace, and throughout the world. Rotarians develop community service projects that address many of today's most critical issues, such as children at risk, poverty and hunger, the environment, illiteracy, and violence. They also support programs for youth, educational opportunities and international exchanges for students, teachers, and other professionals, and vocational and career development.
