The MILLER HOMES

Situated between Wyndham, Maude, Knight and Rea streets in Shepparton, the Miller homes are one of the district's better known places of self contained aged accommodation units. Few people are aware of the story and the person behind the building of these icons.

Extracts from "The Shepparton News" have provided us with the following information.

"The Shepparton News" 30/6/1919.

Alex Miller's Estate

The trustees have just advised the Rev R Taylor that they have accepted the tender of Mr M Chapman, of Shepparton, for the erection of the set of the Memorial Homes at Shepparton, and that the work will be taken in hand at an early date.

"The Shepparton News" 26/9/1932

Mr Alex Miller Founder of the "Miller Homes"

In a series of articles in the "Geelong Advertiser" by Mr J.H.Bettrell, appears the following reference to the late Mr Alex Miller, founder of the Miller Homes, some of which are a well known feature of Shepparton, where the late Mr Miller also had one of his branch stores in the premises now occupied by Mr J.P.McLennan:

On leaving school, the little boy, Alexander Miller, wishing to become a draper, entered the service of Messers Warren Hastings Brown and George Brown, whose business was established in Mercer St (*Geelong*). He remained with that firm for a long time and then he went with the firm of Messrs Hall Bros. He first started business for himself in West Geelong in premises known in after years as Mr Coxon's. Some time after he opened a drapery shop in Moorabool street.

He sold this business and went for a trip to the Old country. On returning, he bought back the establishment and afterwards he purchased Mr Hall's old shop which he demolished and erected on its site the splendid shop which is Mr Isings today. Throughout his life he was very fortunate in all his business ventures. Like Midas, everything he touched turned to gold. As time went on he opened businesses in several up-country towns, at Benalla, Echuca, Euroa, Shepparton, Numurkah, Maryborough and Rushworth.

For a long time before his death he had no shop in Geelong, but all his businesses were controlled, until he removed to Melbourne, from his office in Rannoch House which was under the guidance of his wonderful accountant Mr W.P.Thomas. By strict attention to business and owing to his industrious habits, he had at the time of his death ac-

cumulated a very large sum of money.

Some time before his death he had started building homes for ladies who were getting up in years. Those in Chilwell were built first, and then those in Ashby. He also built some in Ryrie street at the junction of Sydney parade in memory of his sister, Mrs James, who had died. In this way he saw the happiness he had brought into the hearts of so many.

One day whilst travelling to Melbourne with a friend, the latter suggested to him that he should leave his money so that after his death his trustees could build more homes.

Since his death the trustees have built a large number of these homes. In Geelong there are 77 and they are being erected in every town where he had a business. Electric light, repairs, alterations, painting, and up-keep of gardens are paid for out of trust funds. The house is fully furnished, including crockery, bedding linen etc and when new linoleums or curtains are needed they are supplied. The inmates pay no rent, rates or taxes. Therefore the ladies living in the Miller Homes are among the happiest persons in Geelong. Mr Miller made it clear that these homes are not to be considered as charity homes but are for respectable persons who are not in affluent circumstances to whom rent would be a worry.

There is no grand monument to Sir Christopher Wren, who built St Paul's, London.

"The vast bulk of that stupendous frame, Known by the Gentile's great Apostle's name."

But in the crypt where he lies above his tomb is the legend (in Latin) :" If thou seekest his monument, look around"

So in Geelong and other parts of Victoria the "Miller Homes" stand as a monument to this benevolent man.

<u>A Survey of Riverside Cemetery, Queanbeyan, New South Wales.</u>

An extract from: "The Village Burial Ground—A Survey of Riverside Cemetery, Queanbeyan, New South Wales" by Dr Margaret Park, Dr Peter Dowling and George Imashev, Trust News Australia Volume 1 No 4 May 2008, National Trust, pg 16-17

The decision to design and construct Australia's new national capital out of the landscape of the Yass / Queanbeyan region of New South Wales would forever link these satellite towns with the history of Canberra, its people and places.

One such place unequivocally linked, the Riverside Cemetery, was the first dedicated European burial ground in the area. As its name implies it is situated just above the Queanbeyan River, a factorwhich played an important role in the Cemetery's history which began in the mid-1840s.

Unlike most other histories, cemeteries document the lives of the rich and poor, the prominent and the humble. Cemeteries established in the nineteenth century contain the last resting place of a region's pioneers and as such contain a permanently accessible record of our cultural history.

Our Survey identified the graves of those pioneers who lived in a pre-1911 Federal Capital Territory (FCT) and who contributed to the district's social and cultural expansion. While the project was funded by the ACT Heritage Grant Program, its success depended on the cooperation of the Queanbeyan City Council as the custodians of the Cemetery. This assistance combined with the records available enabled us to locate the pioneers more easily.

What makes a pioneer? How do we judge who was a pioneer of Canberra and the ACT? Which generation of pioneering families to include? It was necessary to formulate a set of criteria. Firstly in order for people to be included it was essential that they "must have lived within the current border of the ACT". This identified 1,113 burials. Then they were required to be either in the *Australian Dictionary of Biography* or had made some notable contri-



bution to the history, social or cultural development of the Territory and/or the National Capital/Federal Government, have a street or place named in their honour, or had a strong association with a place of heritage in the ACT. When it came to identification of family groups of pioneers, the original pioneering family should be included rather than subsequent generations. This resulted in a total of 56 ACT pioneers, many of whom were a husband and wife team.

Our project team, comprising an archaeologist, historian and heritage professional, recorded each pioneer's gravesite, assessed its condition and made recommendations on the future conservation and interpretation to the ACT Government and Queanbeyan City Council. An important aspect of these recommendations featured an identification program for the 'unmarked' pioneer graves. Included in the list of recommendations, apart from the conservation work is the erection of plaques and interpretation signs place at relevant sections and dedicated to all of the ACT pioneers as we fast approach the centenary of the establishment of the capital and its naming day between 2011 and 2013.

Goldfields Research by Bruce Manson

Our journey commenced at Talbot on market day, we arrived early in the afternoon and spent some time viewing the displays. We went to the large Amherst cemetery and had a good look over the headstones etc. At Amherst the only building left standing after the 1985 bushfires was the original school building, now a private residence.

Sunday morning we were at the Avoca Family History building at opening time. Their records covered entries of Amherst etc and we obtained the information that one child relation had been immunised but still three children died very young. We then went back to Talbot via Amherst, had lunch and visited the Heritage building and found there are two cemeteries at old Amherst, one directly opposite the school - only one headstone exists - in the middle of a ploughed paddock.

Monday was spent at the Ballarat offices of PROV and we were able to access all records, from there we went across the road to the library and did further research. Tuesday we again spent most of the day at PROV and the library and found a "new" relative, born in 1854, died in 1855, just before the mother was married, after arriving from England.

Wednesday we visited the Creswick cemetery then on to Castlemaine for lunch etc, to Bendigo Library - did not have time for much research but obtained some good ideas for further research.
