Shepparton Family History Report

A number of activities have been undertaken by our group since our last newsletter.

Over the years our computer numbers have grown from one very slow machine running Windows 3.1, with various other purchased or donated computers gradually being added. The result has been a number of computers all differing in their operating system's, method of operation etc with some CD's only able to be used on certain machines.

Recently we received the news that our application for a grant in the Federal Governments FAHCSIA Volunteer Grants Program 2008 was successful. This has enabled us to purchase a number of new networked computers which should mean that anyone doing research will be able to work on a similar computer each time they visit our rooms. The computers will all be linked to our central photocopier / printer / scanner giving us much greater flexibility with less printers to maintain.

Two tier shelving is planned for our research room. This will house the computer modules, freeing up the working space around the monitors and also give us some much needed extra bookshelf area.

Some members are working to tidy up the library area, rebinding the indexes, rearranging files and books to make better use of valuable space.

The City of Greater Shepparton council have recently installed a reverse cycle split system air conditioner in our research room. This will be a great relief to members and guests, especially during the hotter months, as our room was getting very cosy during summer when the single fan battled to keep a large number of people cool.

Several of our members spent many hours collating information for the Shepparton High School reunion, a more detailed report is included later in this newsletter.

This year denotes 25 years since the formation of the Shepparton family History Group. The initial members must be amazed at the change in research methods over this time. Those early times of spending days staring at a microfiche reader, sometimes trying to decipher poor quality script writing and writing all the results into paper notebooks or waiting for weeks to receive a certificate by mail, are now almost a memory as computers, CD's and the internet have revolutionized family history research and record keeping. The original members still joke about packing all our records into a shoebox when they had to move to a new premises. Our library now consists of several hundred CD's, and numerous bookshelves filled with information collected, collated, indexed and catalogued over those 25 years.

Some family trees have beautiful leaves, and some have just a bunch of nuts, but remember, it is the nuts that make the tree worth shaking.

Making "The News"

Shepparton News Item 14/4/1908

Shepparton has just had a big advertisement as a health resort. It seems that people simply will not die there, and as a result the trustees of the local cemetery are in a pretty pickle. Their bone-yard is earning nothing, and it has been found necessary to cut down the grave-digger's wages from 36s to £1 till such time as the people start dying again. The trustees blame the shocking falling off in business to the recent sanitary improvments in Shepparton.

Possibly all this is a cunning scheme on the part of the trustees. Sick and frightened people all over the country, reading that there is no dying in Shepparton, will rush there, and the sudden invasion of cripples and chronics must presently result in a boom in burials. As things go, however " as poor as a Shepparton undertaker" threatens to be incorporated into the language as a most popular figure of speech. We reminded a theatrical manager of the dilemma of the Shepparton cemetery trustees and he retorted-"How the deuce can they expect the place to pay when they admit only dead-heads?"

ALL ACCOUNTS owing to me to 31st December 1892, have now been in the hands of those for whom intended for some considerable time, and I must confess to a sense of surprise at the comparatively poor response they have elicited. Fortunately, there are many who make it a point to be prompt in their payments, and I take this opportunity of cordially thanking such for their consideration, and assuring them that the remarks contained in this notice do not apply to them. There are many others, however, who receive their accounts with indifference, never troubling with the indifferent matter of settling up. To such as these is this notice intended, and although police court prosecution is foreign to my policy, my ledger shows so many hardened sinners in this respect that I have definitely arranged that all accounts OVER TWELVE MONTHS will be sued for if not paid by the end of the present month and REMEMBER I MEAN IT! JOSEPH MARCHANT. 1/5/93.

The name of the postal town now known as Sheridan will, from the 8^{th} April, be altered to Kyabram, and the present post office designated Kyabram, will be altered to Kyabram West.

Shepparton News Item 28/5/1886

Shepparton High School Snippets

The centenary celebrations for the Shepparton High School were conducted over the weekend of April 17th to 19th 2009. More than 800 people en-

joyed the celebrations starting with Friday afternoon's registration followed by the evening launch of the centenary book. Saturday's activities included a district bus tour, roll call at the school assembly hall and centenary dinner at Eastbank. A Church service on Sunday morning followed by a concert then a sausage sizzle to close the weekend's celebrations.

Amongst the older students were several 90 plus year olds, one starting at S.H.S in 1922.

Former principal Allan McLean was quoted in "The Shepparton News" as saying "It showed what a special place the school has in the history of the city and it's residents."

Mr. W.H.Callister was Headmaster from 1913 to 1924. During this period the enrol-

ment increased to more than 200. Mr. Scott, appointed as H.M in 1925, introduced the "House" system to the school. "Callister" house being named after the former H.M. The other houses being; "Sutherland", "Rodney" and "Goulburn"

No words at our disposal can express our regret at the death of Mr. W.H.Callister, who passed away last Monday evening at his late residence, 52 Alexandra Av, Canterbury, at the age of 62 years. The funeral took place at Creswick yesterday, and was attended by a large number of sorrowing relatives and friends, among the latter being Mr.W Gilchrist, manager of the Shepparton High School farm, who was closely associated with the deceased during his twelve years in Shepparton, and whose grief, when he learned his old friend had died, was extreme. Many beautiful wreaths covered the coffin, one of which was sent by the Shepparton High School and another by the High School Council.
