New shelving has been purchased and some older magazines relocated to ease the pressure on our librarian. Digitisation of more records may be the future answer to this problem but this will require more members with a lot of spare time to devote to digitising.

We are lucky to have a member who is very keen on indexing our library's history books which have been published without an index. This has made searching for family names so much easier for both members and fellow family historians. The Indexes are available for purchase from the SFHG.

A display in the Shepparton Library, for one month each year, highlights the array of resources held in our library. This is a great way of promoting our group to the general public.

New lease of life for Victorian* Cemetery

A £6.2m project has seen West London's Brompton Cemetery restored to its original glory, once more revealing its architectural splendour, uncovering listed monuments and structures, and conserving its historic landscape and wildlife haven for the local community.

The four year project to restore the Grade 1-listed cemetery, where more than 200,000 people are laid to rest, was part funded by the Heritage Lottery and Big Lottery funds with a investment of £1.7m from The Royal Parks—the charity which manages the Victorian cemetery - along with generous donors, and support from The Friends of Brompton Cemetery. The cemetery has subterranean catacombs where, since 1840, more than 500 coffins have been deposited, the last one in 1926. Many of the triple-shelled coffins are covered in velvet, and in some cases the original floral tributes still survive, revealing how the Victorians commemorated their loved ones and their attitude to death.

Bendigo Court of Petty Sessions Records

For the past twenty or so years the Bendigo Regional Genealogical Society [BRGS] have been transcribing and indexing these records. This project started at the Bendigo Court House, prior to the records being transferred to the Public Records Office Victoria [PROV].

To date the 'index' has grown to in excess of 50,000 records and contains all of series 1 and 14 units of series 2. These are now available on the BRGS computers in the Bendigo Library.

Understanding the English Census

The census is a head count of everyone in the country on a given day. The object was to provide information about the population, listing everyone by name on a single night.

- A schedule was given to every householder
- The first census was in 1801 and every 10 years since except 1941.
- Pre 1841 few survive.
- The Census was always taken on a Sunday evening.
- 1841: contains surname and first forename, no relationships, place of birth limited to county, occupation for head of household unless a servant.
- 1851: Full address, relationship to head and marital status, occupation for all, exact place of birth.
- 1861: Same as 1851 but many pieces missing.
- 1871: Same as 1861, disability column introduced.
- 1881: Same as 1871.
- 1891: Same as 1881,but records if employer or employee.
- 1901: Same as 1891, but records if someone works at home.
- 1911: Different, many more different sets of hand writing, includes deceased children.

The 1921 census could be released in 2022. It appears there is a 100 year rule applied to it.

The 1931 census of England and Wales was destroyed by fire during the Second World War when fire razed the storage place.

No census was taken in 1941.

The 1939 Register is not a census, it was taken after the outbreak of the war. The information was to produce identity cards and to issue ration books. Military personnel were not recorded.

The Advertiser 6th July 1916
SHEPPARTON WHEN AN INFANT.
HISTORICAL LETTER.

(To the Editor "The Advertiser.")

Sir,-In last Monday's issue of "The Advertiser," was published the following paragraph: "Shepparton in 1875.-A local resident has kindly handed us a book on "Notes on the Colony of Victoria, Historical and Geographical," by the late Mr H. H. Hayter, Government Statist, and published in 1875.

'The population of the town of Shepparton in that year is shown to have been only 33 souls, while the occupied houses totalled 6!"

I will now give you a account of the houses and people for the year 1874. I landed here on November llth., 1873, as an employee of Mr J. Furphy, sen. There were then two hotels in full swing-one, the Prince of Wales, owned by Mr Fraser, sen, and kept by. Mr John Dooly (family of 4, besides boarders); the other, the Commercial Hotel, kept by Mr Stewart (family of 4). Then there was the Bush Inn (Wilson's, family of 8), in construction; and also the Criterion Hotel (Mr Day, sen, family of 7), which was opened early in 1874. These four houses show a total of 23 in their families; while the other residents numbered 75, giving a total of 98. The residents were: Police camp, 4; punt-man, 1: post office, 1: surveyor, 1; Mr Rowe, 2; Mr Longstaff's; Mr Furphy, 5; Mr Dolly, sen. 10; Mr Drummond, 6,; Mr Campbell, 6; Mr Drysdale, 4; Mr Moller; Rev Mr Gribble, 7; Mr O'Brien, 2; Mr Leahy, 2; Williams Bros, butchers, 6.: Mr Rowe, 7.

Towards the end of 1874 and the beginning of 1875, men and families were camping all over the place. There were Messrs Geo and Thos Evens buildings, the Royal Hotel and large families of all description: Swallow and Ariell's store, and my own house, built as I was to be married in 75, which came to pass on November 9th. United Methodist Church was built and opened in 1875.; and buildings were going up all over the place. In fact, I estimate that there were over 200 people in Shepparton from the commencement of 1875; and every other day mail and passenger coach (Cobb and Co's) would be arriving from Seymour and Echuca.

(To the Editor, "The Advertiser.")

Sir– I read Mr U.W.B.Robinson's letter in your last issue (July 6th) with much interest. You head it "Shepparton when an Infant," but how it has deteriorated in its old age. Smarvelous! Fancy 75 "other residents" keeping four pubs going; what rorty old times they must have had: no talk of 6 o'clock closing then. I believe the population of the town proper is now 3800, so, pro rata, we should have about 200 hotels and we've only 10. The town is decadent; no wonder we can't afford a Town Hall or decent roads.

A trooper named Justin Macarthy, of Shepparton, met with his death a few days ago in the following singular way. A robbery of jewellery having been committed at the Westburn Home Hotel, deceased went in pursuit of the robbers, and on his way arrested a man on suspicion of horse stealing, and conducted him on a led horse towards Shepparton.

While thus proceeding, the horses became restive, and deceased was thrown with violence against a tree, the blow causing concussion of the brain and instantaneous death. The affair was witnessed by a hawker, who supported the statement made by the man in custody. The latter also sustained some injury by a fall from his horse. He has since been discharged, the evidence against him being insufficient.

The Clothesline

A clothesline was a news forecast to neighbours passing by; There were no secrets you could keep when clothes were hung to dry;

It was also a friendly link, for neighbours always knew if company had stopped on by, to spend a night or two.

For then you would see the 'fancy sheets' and towels upon the line;

The line announced a baby's birth from folks who lived inside.

The Golden Era of Family History

The Victorian period is rich for family historians, when the state took record - keeping of our ancestors' lives very seriously.

The month of May 2019 saw the 200th anniversary of the birth of Queen Victoria. With the exception of the present Queen, no other British monarch has presided over such a long reign and period of momentous change.

During the reign of Queen Victoria, the most important records for genealogists were created. Civil registrations, documenting births, marriages and deaths were commenced in England and Wales in 1837, just 11 days after the new queen's coronation.

Before 1837, baptisms, marriages and burials were only recorded in parish registers and bishops' transcripts, hence the golden age of record keeping had begun.

PASSION FLOWER:

Symbol of Christ's passion, sacrifice, suffering and redemption



POPPY:

Eternal sleep; sometimes associated with war-related death



HOURGLASS:

Symbolic of time and life running out, quickly reaching its end and this can be emphasised by giving the hourglass wings. Time can also be represented by a scythe, clock or sundial.



CHILD SLEEPING:

Victorian motif for death



KNOT:

Interlaced Celtic knot indicates resurrection and life everlasting. Tied knot indicates marriage and unity



LETTER (IHS):

First three letters in the Greek spelling of Jesus



LETTERS (XP OR PX):

The letters XP, or Chi-Rho, are the first two Greek letters in the name 'Christos' and refer to being buried under Christ. Today the letters may be reversed as PX to represent 'pax' or 'peace'



COMPASS/DIVIDERS:

Masonic symbol together with set-square. Also indicative of architects and surveyors. In ecclesiastic art indicates divine measuring and dividing of the world



DOG:

Signifies loyalty, fidelity, vigilance and watchfulness



LAMB:

Innocence; marks the grave of a child or the sacrificial lamb of God

*The panopticon is a type of institutional building and a system of control designed by the English philosopher and social theorist Jeremy Bentham in the late 18th century. The idea is that from the central tower, a limited number of guards could be utilized to watch over a large number of prisoners.

Does your family tree have roots in Scotland?

You're in luck! You can now search for your tartanclad ancestors for free at FamilySearch! The <u>Scotland Census</u>, 1901 contains almost 4.5 million records for those living in Scotland on Sunday March 31, 1901.

These records are comprised of enumeration forms that were distributed to all households before the census night and the complete forms were collected the next day by the enumerators. Included in this series are returns from ships of the Royal Navy at sea and in ports abroad.
