

More Research Records

Victorian Government Gazettes

A number of Victorian Government Gazettes have been given to our group by the Shepparton Heritage Centre. These complement the existing gazettes we already have in our library. We now have copies from 1871 thru 1995 with only the years 1930, 1931 and 1932 missing.

Later years may only have the information pertaining to the Goulburn Valley but are still very useful for locating a families land acquisition, acceptance of government tenders etc.

Government Gazettes are available online but as we know the scanned information may be faulty or misread and a name search may bring up zero results, whereas the physical copy will have the correct information albeit requiring a time consuming search.

Telephone Directories

We have a range of area code 058 directories in our library. The years 1965 through 2021 are nearly complete with only 1966, 72, 75, 76, 81 & 85 missing. Several early phone books for the Shepparton district are also available for research namely 1912, 23, 28 & 48.

We would like to locate, for our records, copies of any of the missing years as they can be a great reference for a family's time in our district.

Electoral Rolls

Electoral rolls are another valuable resource for family history researchers. We have local rolls for the Murray electorate for years 1964, 68, 70, 72, 75 & 82, any copies apart from these years would be very welcome.

If you have any of the above wanted books, at home or find one at a garage sales, etc, our librarian, Kerry, would love to obtain them for our ever expanding library.

Public Records Office Victoria Rules for opening records

Are records open to the public once transferred to PROV?

All records transferred to the custody of PROV are on open access to the public unless they are specifically closed under a section of the Public Records Act 1973.

There must be a justifiable reason to restrict or close access to records.

Acknowledgement that records are to be on open access is provided by the head (or their delegate) of the Victorian government agency responsible for the records.

Access arrangements are negotiated between the agency responsible for the records and PROV. The access status should be assessed and agreed to as soon as possible in the transfer process as it may determine how the records are processed.

When are records closed to public access?

Closure of records is a formal process that requires Ministerial approval. Records may be closed under the following sections of the Public Records Act 1973:

Section 9 Closure

This section allows for the closure of 'personal or private' records to prevent the violation of personal privacy. It covers such material as personnel records, medical records, police and prison records and case records concerning students, welfare recipients, children in government care or compensation claimants.



Sorry the Archives are Closed Today



First pour one quart of boiling water into a basin, add a piece of common washing soda about the size of a marble, place a towel over the head so that it will cover the basin. Inhale for about 10 minutes, then rub the face and neck till dry. Next apply Featherstone's Pneumonia Ointment to the forehead, nose, face and neck. A little should be put inside the nostril. This will also stop the bleeding of the nose. Take a dose of castor oil or a strong aperient if necessary.

If there is any reaching or gastric trouble use Featherstone's Gastric Powders. Stay in bed. Have hot compress towels which have been immersed in water containing washing soda, similar in quantity to above, placed first on the stomach, then upwards to the neck. About three towels will do. The same should be repeated on the back and a good amount of the Pneumonia Ointment rubbed in. Grease proof or oil paper should then be placed on top of the ointment to prevent the clothing from absorbing the ointment. The same applies to the chest as well. Featherstone's Dysentery Drops should be taken if the heart is weak as they stimulate and accelerate the heart. Then Featherstone's Blood Mixture should be taken according to directions to assist the blood circulation and to throw off all poison. Pneumonia is a blood poison.

Influenza Again

State school teachers in Victoria have been warned to see that no "flu" contacts come to school, and each morning a "contact muster" is held, and the kiddies from infected homes are sent back to them. The combout has come to be speedy, and assertions of the children made at a "hands up contact" rally in each class-room are accepted.

The teacher in one classroom suspicious of a bright lad, who had said his mother "had it pretty bad," made an independent enquiry by letter. The father, a returned Digger, replied as follows:- "If more ladies were suffering from his mother's complaint there would be a better chance for a White Australia. Mother's influenza is a girl."

COMBATING INFLUENZA

New Organisation Formed

ADVICE TO SUFFERERS

DUTY OF HOUSEHOLDERS

With the advent of the second wave of the influenza epidemic, the Victorian Government has renewed the efforts which proved so successful in mitigating the effects of the first visitation. Guided by experience gained early in the year, the authorities have provided a special organization to take charge of the various activities connected with checking the outbreak. At the head is Mr. John McWhae, M.L.C., who in the absence of Mr. Bower through ill health, is acting as Minister for Public Health. He has called to his assistance a number of experts who have each been given a certain section of the organization to control. By this scheme the Government hopes to secure a general staff which will effectively cope with all the difficulties that arise during the present or future outbreaks.

The personnel of the Emergency Organization is as follows:- Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Robertson; Hon. Advisers, General Williams and Mr. E. G. Dyason; Secretary, Mr. D. Barry; Medical Controller, Dr. W. S. Newton; Controller of Equipment and Supplies, Mr. J. Love; Controller of Publicity, Mr. A. S. Whyte; Controller of Transport, Dr. R. E, Weigall; Controller of Nursing, Miss L. Jones; Supervisor of Voluntary and Municipal Aid, Cr. M. Balfe; Controller of Finance, Cr. E. Ward.

This organisation has already taken steps to increase the facilities for dealing with the present outbreak, and plans are now being laid to cope with any future visitation of greater magnitude.

Already a small pamphlet has been issued by the Health Department dealing with signs of the disease, how the patient should be treated, and precautions to be taken to avoid infection. The following extracts may prove interesting.

Signs of Disease

The disease must be deemed as probably present in every case of fever with headache and pains in the back and limbs. There is usually more or less prostration, frequently with signs of catarrh, and sometimes vomiting, diarrhoea, bleeding at the nose, &c, indicate serious complications.

In every case the patient should be placed in bed and a medical practitioner summed as speedily as possible.

Isolation

By far the most important measure is the isolation of the sick. If the patient is not removed, he or she should be kept in bed in a well-lighted, wellventilated room. No visitors should be permitted.

Only one person in charge of the patient at any time should enter the room, and such person should take all possible precautions. The usual rules should be observed to prevent the disease being carried to others by drinking vessels, spoons, towels, &c, after use in the sick room. Cases with complications should be kept separate from simple cases.

Prevention.

Crowds of all kinds should be avoided in streets, trams, trains, and indoor gatherings. The disease is largely spread by patients with mild attacks, convalescents, and "carriers" coughing without restraint, so that fine particles are shot into the air. All coughing should be smothered by handkerchief or rag, which should afterwards be boiled or burnt.

Gargles, sprays and inhalations are decidedly useful. A good simple gargle is made with a flat teaspoon of boracic acid, one of common salt and one of bicarbonate of soda, dissolved in a quart of warm water. It should be used before leaving home and on returning. It may be served as a douche for the nostrils. Inoculation with the special vaccine, according to experience in South Africa, probably lessons the liability of the attack, and in more decided degree protects from complications.

Masks covering the mouth and nose, properly made and properly applied, give considerable degree of protection. They should be frequently renewed, and sterilised by boiling. Those of the simplest, effective make are best. They should be used by all those brought into contact with patients. There is no need for any panic. Fear is cowardly and very injurious. Cheerfulness increases resistance and prevents complications.

Duty of Citizens

With a view to successfully combating all visitation the government has, on the advice of the medical officer, issued a series of regulations.

These provide that the occupier of every home wherein any person suffering from influenza, shall report the occurrence in writing to the Town Clerk or Shire Clerk in the Municipal District in which the house is and give the name, age and sex of the patient. The medical officer has also to make a similar report.

Isolation of Patient

Every patient is to be isolated at his or her residence, or if such residence is unsuitable in the opinion of the Officer of Health, at any special place provided for the purpose and every patient treated elsewhere than a public hospital shall be kept in isolation until the Officer of Health gives consent to his release. It is provided that every contact shall submit to such treatment of preventative measures (which may include isolation) as the Officer of Health specifies and for such period as he directs. No person other than the nurse or necessary attendant shall visit any patient in any private house except under the conditions specified by the Officer of Health.

Penalty for Neglect

It is provided that any person who fails to comply with the regulations or is guilty of any neglect or disobedience of them is liable to a penalty not exceeding £20 and to a penalty not exceeding £5 nor less than £1 for each day during which the offence is continued, beside any cost or expense which may be incurred in remedying his default.

Footnote:

The "influenza" referred to in the newspaper articles is now referred to as the "Spanish Flu" or the "1918 influenza pandemic". World wide death estimates varied from seventeen to one hundred million people with possibly 500 million being infected.

The fee for a legal certificate has increased from \$34.30 to \$51.40.

This fee is for a legal birth, death or marriage certificate

Uncertified certificates are still \$20.

Marungi War Memorial Centenary

November 20 2021 marked 100 years since the opening of a War Memorial in the small village of Marungi, 20 km North of Shepparton.

During the First World War a number of men from the Marungi district enlisted and then served their country in some of the deadliest battles fought by Australian soldiers.

Ten local young men paid the supreme sacrifice in the ensuing years. This was a huge proportion of the district's population and the community banded together to ensure that an appropriate memorial would be constructed. For a village consisting basically of a school, a church and several dwellings, this was a huge achievement.

The names listed on the memorial are:

Alexander C.H., Dale F., Dixon V.S., Fowles E.H., Fowles G.A., Grant D.A., Green H., Groves L., McCrabb L.J., Sullivan C.F..

Today a Lone Pine Tree is growing beside the monument in recognition of the many lives lost.

Shepparton's Heritage Cottage

OUR PAST COMES TO LIFE

Shepparton's Heritage Cottage was officially opened last week* as part of the Australia Day celebrations.

The cottage, designed by members of the Shepparton Historical Society and Family History Group, was opened on Thursday by former Shepparton mayor Mr. Bruce McNeill.

The cottage on the corner of High and Welsford Sts, offers valuable information about the district's history and will provide research and meeting facilities for history groups.

The site on which the heritage centre has been built holds a lot of local history.


Just west of the cottage is where the town of Shepparton began 145 years ago.

The town's first Post Office was built on the same corner in 1854 and it was at times occupied by Patrick MacGuire who established the punt.

The cottage design, construction and decoration has been based upon a photograph of the old Post Office taken in 1968.

People are invited to visit the cottage on Sundays between 1 pm and 4 pm.




Shepparton News Aug 30 1907

A HOUSE MOVING UP THE STREET

Great interest was taken on Tuesday and Wednesday in the removal of a cottage in Wyndham street, belonging to Messrs Rowe and Co. The place is 30ft x 30ft, and the work of removing it to a site on the eastern side of the railway line was let to Mr A. B. Mason. A gang of men under the guidance of Messrs W. Pryde and W. Wilson, raised the four roomed tenement off the ground and placed it on wheels. Mr. Mason's traction engine backed in about 4 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon and hitching on, hauled the house over the Wyndham street gutter and gradually dragged it up Wyndham and High streets to its destination. A few hundred people looked on and offered gratuitous advice during the progress of the work. The building occupied almost the full width of the streets during its passage and was followed by an interested crowd, attracted by the novel spectacle. The building itself is an ancient landmark, as it was erected by the late Mr A. F. Rowe in the seventies, and was occupied by the first auctioneer in Shepparton, Mr W. H. Oram. Later it was used as banking premises by the National Bank.

Owing to the progress of the town the owners found it necessary to remove the place to make room for a more up to date building on the site.
