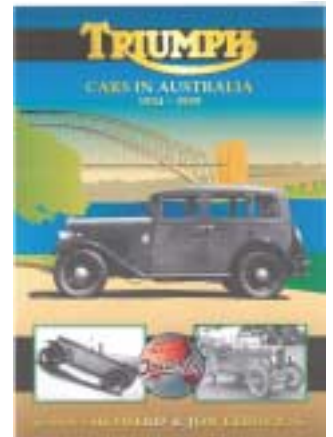


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*The history of Triumph cars before the Second World War in Australia is full of amazing achievements encouraged by the motor trade distributors in selling these light cars. The Triumph's forté was long distance record breaking road events, hill climbs and reliability trials organised by the car clubs of the day and the drivers were some notable characters such as Bill Buckle, Charlie East, Eric Armstrong and Theo Trevethan. Many trophies were won and the cars did so well that they set the light car standard for durability and performance. Numerous well known people drove them as daily transport in the 1930s, including Sir Charles Kingsford Smith and Charles Ulm of aviation fame.*
